## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE DISTRICT

### Nursing

A domiciliary nursing and midwifery service is available throughout the district, as part of the County Council's scheme under the National Health Service Act.

District Nurse/Midwives are stationed at Pocklington, Bubwith, Drifffield and Melbourne. A District Nurse is stationed at Market Weighton.

### Laboratory Facilities

Bacteriological samples are examined at the Public Health Laboratory situated at Hull.

Routine samples of water are sent to this Laboratory for examination.

### Treatment Centres

Child Welfare clinics are held weekly at Pocklington, fortnightly at Market Weighton, and monthly at Stamford Bridge, Wilberfoss and Barmby Moor.

Relaxation Classes are held weekly in Pocklington and Market Weighton.

Orthopaedic Clinics are held at York, Drifffield and Beverley.

Tuberculosis Clinics are held at Drifffield, Beverley and York.

Venereal Disease Clinics are held at York and Hull.

Cytology Clinics are held in Pocklington.

Family Planning Clinics are held monthly at Pocklington and Market Weighton.

An Ophthalmic Clinic is held monthly at Pocklington.

### Ambulance Service

Ambulances based at Pocklington are available.

### Hospitals

General medical and surgical cases are admitted to hospitals at York and Beverley. Maternity cases go to Fulford, Westow, Drifffield and Beverley.

### National Assistance Act, 1948



# WATER SUPPLY

The supply and distribution of water supplied within the Rural District is controlled by the East Yorkshire (Wolds Area) Water Board and the following details and figures are given through the co-operation of the Engineer to the Board, Mr. H. Ackroyd, whose ready assistance is acknowledged.

The quality of water supplied in the area has been good, only occasionally have any bad samples been reported and these have been due mainly to pollution at the source. All water in the area is chlorinated before passing into supply.

Pocklington Rural District Council's area receives water from four sources which are listed below. From each source a bacteriological examination of raw water is taken once a fortnight and a bacteriological examination of treated water before passing into a supply is taken every week.

## REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

The system of household refuse collection embodies a weekly collection throughout the District and in built-up communities collections are made from the rear of each property. In the outlying area collection is made from the kerbside.

The paper sack system introduced the previous year continued to give satisfactory service and it was fully realised that this had brought about a major improvement in the collection system.

Considerable trouble was experienced during the year with the indiscriminate dumping of refuse in various parishes but these nuisances were more confined to the larger communities and although consideration was given to a remedy no definite conclusion was reached.

The Council had decided to join a consortia of Authorities in Work Study of their working force and preliminary consideration was given in the form of a feasibility study. It was decided that the first service which should be given a study was refuse collection and it was anticipated that an examination of the Council's system would be carried out in 1972.

The Council does not possess a refuse tip but an Agreement is in operation with a private firm for the reception of refuse from the Council in a tip centrally situated within the Rural District. The control of such tip is the responsibility of the Owner and the Councils only commitment is the payment of charges and rodent control.

# SEWAGE PURIFICATION AND DISPOSAL

Capital works during the year was confined to the completion of the sludge drying plant at Pocklington and it was brought into service in June. Certain minor troubles were experienced in the first few months of working and in general terms much satisfaction was gleaned from the new system because the volume of sludge had been unmanageable previously, using the system of drying beds.

The Council gave further discussion to future schemes and first priority was given to the extension of the Pocklington Disposal Works to meet the demands of the increased flow and trade effluent. The other scheme which was examined was for the Fangfoss-Bolton-Wilberfoss Works, which are to be extended. This was a departure from the original idea whereby this area was to be included in the Northern Area scheme. It was felt, however, that this scheme would be delayed indefinitely through other matters concerning a proposed prison etc., and the Engineer was given instructions to prepare a proposal whereby sewage would be delivered to Wilberfoss Works from the villages concerned.

This departure made inroads in the Council's system of grouping the villages and thought was given to splitting Millington from a pre-determined group and dealing with the sewage from that community independently by delivering it to the Pocklington Works through a rising main from a pumping station in the village.

## HOUSING

During the year discussion was focused on extension to existing housing sites and alternative proposals were brought forward in varying forms. There were no conclusions at the end of the year as to how and when the programme should be finalised.

The scheme for the replacement of the Aluminium Prefabricated bungalows continued speedily in the early part of the year and by July both sites were completed and the tenancies taken up. This method of replacing the sub-standard dwellings has proved satisfactory and early indications are that the tenants are well pleased with their new accommodation.

The Welfare Bungalows at Wold Garth were completed towards the end of the summer and the finished appearance lived up to the promise that had been shown on the drawings.

Improvements to Council Houses continued satisfactorily and the Council gave approval to further improvements to dwellings throughout the Rural District and the aim was made clear that all dwellings owned by the Council should be up to modern standards. A programme was pursued that would ensure the renovation of those falling short of this requirement.

It had been noticed during the previous year that there was an upsurge in the Improvement Grant applications through the increased grants that were available and during the year this progress was maintained and in fact accelerated.

Applications were lodged in respect of Qualification Certificates in respect of dwellings containing all standard amenities but these were few and made no impact on the normal running of the department.
