ANNUAL REPORT.

During the year 1949 the health of the district has been satisfactory with the exception of an outbreak of measles when 236 cases were notified - fortunately the disease was mild and no deaths occurred.

Again Portland was fortunate in having no cases of Infantile Paralysis.

Following visits to various shops and cafes I have formed the opinion that generally speaking, conditions are satisfactory, but there are still some people who do not appreciate how their health is affected by uncleanliness.

Two cases of food poisoning were investigated during the year the cause was probably due to infected duck eggs - both persons recovered.

Active measures were taken during the year to obtain pure ice cream - where the necessary sanitary facilities were not available the retailers were asked to sell only pre-packed ices.

Again, I would remind the Council of the difficulties under which the Public Health Department is working, owing to lack of adequate clerical assistance - and that proper supervision of the health of the district cannot be maintained while the officers are tied to office work.

WATER SUPPLIES

The water is piped from a borehole at Friar Waddon - it is plentiful in quantity, there has been occasional contamination, especially after heavy rain, but all water is chlorinated.

S = Satisfactory. D = Doubtful. C = Contaminated.

It will be noted that suspicious samples were obtained in September both at the borehole and at Portland, in view of this after consultation with our Engineer, the percentage of chlorine was raised. The reason why it was necessary to increase the chlorine was later found to be due to mechanical wear and tear of the chlorine dosing apparatus and it has now been made good.

All houses in the district have a main water supply.

PUBLIC CLEANSING AND REFUSE

The weekly collection of refuse has been maintained - salvage collection has now been dispensed with.

A survey of the sufficiency and adequacy of dustbins has been made during the year and the necessary steps taken to abate any public health nuisance.

Owing to the shortage of houses many persons are living in conditions which pre-war would not be tolerated, they include elderly people who have to live for a further period in houses which ought to be demolished, young married couples and married persons with one or more children, the latter having no hope of obtaining rooms.

I would like to see the building of more "Duplex" type of houses, i.e. traditional houses which temporarily are divided into two flats with 1 bedroom downstairs and 2 bedrooms upstairs. However, in my experience, there must be efficient insulation between the two floors, to stop noise. These would be ideal for say an elderly couple downstairs and a young married couple upstairs with one or two children. Furthermore, it would overcome the difficulties often met my married couples living with in-laws, - the parents could be separate downstairs and the young couple upstairs.

RODENT CONTROL

Sewer baiting was carried out on those sections of the sewer considered likely to be affected, the other sections become surcharged with storm water and of such steep gradients that they cannot remain infested. Control baiting is regularly carried out at the refuse tip, situated at the Council Depot. Minor infestations only have been met with during the year and all complaints attended to as well as possible by the limited staff available.
