

Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the Year 1965

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1965 compiled in accordance with the directions of the Ministry of Health.

Vital Statistics

According to the Registrar General's returns, the mid-1965 population for Portslade was 17,890, which shows an increase of 370 compared with the 1964 figure of 17,520.

The total number of deaths was 198, 3 less than in 1964, with a Death Rate of 11.06 as against 11.47 for 1964. Cancer (all forms) Coronary Disease and Vascular Lesions of Nervous System were responsible for almost three-quarters of the deaths.

The total births, 384 shows an increase of 24 over the 1964 figure, and the Birth Rate rose from 20.54 to 21.46. There were 6 infant deaths.

Infectious Diseases

Apart from a considerable increase in the number of measles cases notified, 351 (1964-65), notifications of infectious diseases showed little variation from last year. There were no cases of food poisoning.

Tuberculosis

3 new cases were added to the Register—all in the 20 to 65 age group and there were in addition 5 inward transfers. Removals by death or other causes amounted to 4 and 1 case was reported as having recovered.

Housing Accommodation

During the year 50 new Council Houses and Flats were built.

DRAINAGE.

The whole of the public roads in the district are sewered by gravitation on the water carriage system.

All houses in the District are connected to the public sewers with the following exceptions:

There are 8 houses served by cesspools.

Houses served by Cesspools

During the year one house found to be drained into a defective cesspool was connected to the Council Sewer and the cesspool filled in.

All sewerage is discharged into intercepting sewers which are under the control of the Portslade and Southwick Outfall Sewerage Board. Disposal is by means of Sea Outfall owned by the Board.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The destruction of rats and mice has been successfully continued throughout the year, both in surface properties and in the Council's sewers.

During the year 88 rat and 49 mice infestations were dealt with on surface properties and 1 sewer treatment carried out.

The treatment is now free to all properties.

Eradication of Vermin.

During the year 12 houses were found to be in a dirty or verminous condition and of these, 3 were disinfested by spraying with insecticides.

This work has been carried out by the Council and the cost of materials has been charged to the Owner or Occupier.
