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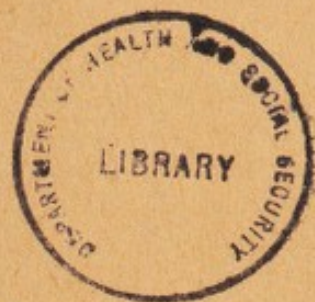

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1972

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1972, compiled in accordance with the direction of the Department of Health and Social Security.

Vital Statistics

The Registrar General's estimate of population for mid-year is 18,272, an increase of 82 on the previous year. The sample Census in 1966 gave the population as 17,610 : 8,550 males and 9,060 females. The 1971 Census gives 18,140 as the population for Portslade U.D.C.

The death rate corrected by the Registrar General's comparability factor of 1.00 was 10.0 compared with a 1971 rate of 10.1. The number of deaths from all causes was 183 (1971-183)—102 males and 81 females. An analysis of the main causes of deaths will be found on page 6 of this report. Deaths from lung cancer 16 (1971-9).

The birth rate corrected by the Registrar General's comparability factor of .90 was 13.2, compared with 20.6 in 1971. The total number of live births 268 (1971-371). There were 12 illegitimate live births, giving an illegitimacy rate of 4% of all live births (1971-5%). The figure for stillbirths 3 (1971-2). Still birth rate per 1,000 total live and still births 11 (1971-5). Infant deaths (under 1 year) 6 (1971-7). Total infant deaths per 1,000 total live births 22 (1971-19). Legitimate infant deaths per 1,000 legitimate live births 23 (1971-20). Illegitimate infant deaths per 1,000 illegitimate live births Nil (1971-Nil). Neo-natal mortality rate (deaths under 4 weeks per 1,000 total live births 15 (1971-13). Early neo-natal mortality rate (deaths under 1 week per 1,000 total live births) 15 (1971-13). Perinatal mortality rate (still-births and deaths under 1 week combined per 1,000 total live and still-births) 26 (1971-16). Maternal deaths Nil (1970-Nil).

Infectious Diseases

93 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified during 1972, compared with 265 in 1971. (70 cases of measles in 1972 against 232 in 1971). Scarlet Fever 20 and Infective Jaundice 3.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

DRAINAGE.

The whole of the public roads in the district are sewered by gravitation on the water carriage system.

All houses in the District are connected to the public sewers with the following exceptions :

HOUSES SERVED BY CESSPOOLS.

There are 8 houses served by cesspools.

All sewerage is discharged into intercepting sewers which are under the control of the Portslade and Southwick Outfall Sewerage Board. Disposal is by means of Sea Outfall owned by the Board.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The destruction of rats and mice has been successfully continued throughout the year, both in surface properties and in the Council's sewers.

During the year 61 rat and 83 mice infestations were dealt with on surface properties and 1 sewer treatment carried out.

The treatment is now free to all properties.

Eradication of Vermin.

During the year 15 houses were found to be in a dirty or verminous condition and of these, 13 were disinfested by spraying with insecticides.

This work has been carried out by the Council and the cost of materials has been charged to the Owner or Occupier.
