

The principal imports were coal, cement, stone, oil, timber, glassware, building materials, tomatoes, onions, potatoes, cauliflower, citrus fruits, apples, pears, peaches, nuts, chocolate and general cargo traffic, from France, Italy, Holland Belgium, Germany, Sweden, Finland, Norway, North Africa, Spain and Channel Islands.



In principal exports were pitch, machinery, screp iron, fertilisers, oxide, barley and general cargo.

- (3) The smallpox consultant is Dr. I.M. McLachlan, Physician Superintendent, Infectious Diseases Hospital, Portsmouth (Tel. 22531).
- (4) Facilities for laboratory diagnosis of smallpox exist, by arrangement with the Portsmouth and Isle of Wight Area Pathological Service, at the Contral Laboratory, Infectious Diseases Hospital, Portsmouth.

 - (4) When necessary, rat guards are placed on ropes between ships and quays.
