Mr. Mayor and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1937.

This has been a very important year as the new Borough of Pudsey was formed on the 1st April, 1937.

This has, therefore, been a difficult Annual Report to prepare, as the addition of Farsley and Calverley has introduced a number of problems which can only be solved by the passage of time.

On the 11th October I commenced duties as the first full-time Medical Officer of Health for the Borough and I have, therefore, had only two and a half months' actual experience of the work in the Borough for 1937.

In the matter of **Housing** the main feature has been the Clearance Areas—Waterloo Road (No. 25), Waterloo Place (No. 26), Gibraltar (No. 27) and Bradley Lane (No. 28)—which marks a further step in slum clearance in the Borough. It is hoped to continue slum clearance during 1938 and to be able to complete the Five Years' Plan commenced in 1934.

The work of the Maternity and Child Welfare Department has continued to be heavy.

The attendances at the Monday afternoon Child Welfare Clinic have been very large and the rooms are filled to capacity. A large and increasing number came for medical consultations which is a very satisfactory feature. I commenced, in October, a series of short five minutes' talks on matters affecting the health of mother and child, and these seem to be appreciated and helpful.

The Wednesday afternoon Child Welfare Clinic has continued to increase until now the average attendance is between sixty and seventy. It is unfortunate that there is no doctor present for consultations at so large a clinic.

The Child Welfare Clinic at Farsley on Tuesday afternoons has had another successful year. The attendances are large and increasing, and a satisfactory feature is that many are seeking consultations with the doctor. I have also commenced five minutes' talks at this clinic.

The Ante-Natal Clinic at Pudsey has had another year of large attendances. Many of the mothers attending the clinic desire to have their confinements at Leeds Maternity Hospital. It is impossible to grant all these requests as the Council has to accept responsibility for the cost of treatment. I, therefore, can only grant those cases, where, on medical grounds, I have any reason to suspect that their confinement may not be straightforward.

In December the new Scheme for Dental Treatment for Expectant and Nursing Mothers came into operation.

The Council has also adopted arrangements for a Consultant Obstetric Service, and the transfer to the Ida Convalescent Hospital from Leeds Maternity Hospital of Pudsey cases requiring further convalescence.

A very important landmark in the Maternity and Child Welfare Services of the Borough was the proposal in October to equip the Calverley Council Offices as clinics. It was hoped to commence there a Child Welfare Clinic, an Ante-Natal Clinic and a Post-Natal Clinic, in addition to a School and Dental Clinic. This should be a great benefit to the people of Calverley if it is carried out. It will, however, necessitate certain readjustments of the present staff arrangements.

The estimated population for the year was 27,350.

The birth rate fell, being 13.67 as compared with 14.61 for 1936.

The death rate also fell, being 14.30 as compared with 14.68 for 1936. The death rate for England and Wales for 1937 was 12.40.

The above figures indicate a decrease in population during the year 1937.

It is very satisfactory to report a low infant mortality rate for 1937, namely 45 as compared with 75 for 1936. The rate for England and Wales for 1937 was 58.

There were no maternal deaths in 1937 which is also a cause for satisfaction.

I should like to express my appreciation of the help and kindness extended to me by the Members and Officials of the Council since my appointment.

Topography.

The Borough is similar in shape to England and Wales with the old Borough in the South and Calverley in the North. It is bounded on the North by the Urban Districts of Aireborough and Horsforth; on the East by the City of Leeds; on the South by the City of Leeds and the City of Bradford; and on the west by the City of Bradford.

Altitude.

The height above sea level varies from 150 feet along the Aire and Calder Canal to 625 feet at Greentop.

Geology.

This is a coarse grained gritty sandstone with beds of shale, limestone, and coal. The subsoil consists of clay, clayey loam, and shale.

The textile industry is the staple industry of the Borough, both woollens and worsteds being manufactured.


In addition there are engineering works, tanneries, basket works and cabinet making.

BIRTH RATE FOR THE 20 YEARS 1918-1937.



DEATH RATE FOR THE 20 YEARS 1918-1937.





ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTORS FOR 1937.

TO THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

Sir,

I herewith submit the Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1937, showing the work carried out including the abatement of nuisances, removal of house refuse under the Public Health Acts, the supervision of slaughterhouses and the condemnation of meat as unfit for the food of man.

As you are aware the Borough was enlarged by amalgamation with Farsley and Calverley, the acreage having been more than doubled with many additional farmsteads, several of which require to be dealt with in the near future.

With respect to housing work, since the amalgamation there has been considerable activity under the new Housing Act, 1936. During the year there were inspections and Ministry of Health Inquiries into eight clearance areas, all of which were confirmed. Inspections for a further fourteen areas were made and evidence completed for a

further inquiry.

The scavenging of the Borough has been reorganised somewhat but I am of the opinion that another motor vehicle is necessary for the Farsley area. This motor vehicle would render the use of the Farsley tip unnecessary, the hire of which is costing approximately £108 per annum, as the refuse collected could be transported to the Tyersal tip. Further, two horses and carts could be dispensed with thereby effecting another additional saving. By placing the tip man from Farsley at Tyersal, the latter tip would be better controlled and the work more satisfactorily carried out.

Many new Orders have been issued by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries which will entail more supervision with regard to the production of clean milk and the inspection of cow-sheds by this

Department.

Further attention will have to be paid to slaughterhouses and

the inspection of cattle etc., slaughtered therein.

In conclusion I would like to state that legislation respecting this Department is for ever on the increase and for the efficient carrying out of inspections, which is impossible at the moment, clerical assistance will have to be provided.
