

SIR,

Herewith I beg to submit to you my Twenty-second Annual Report, viz., that for the year 1894.

It is highly satisfactory to be able to state that the *General Death Rate* of Newcastle is the lowest on record, being 18.0 per 1000; that for the previous year was 20.8. Details as to the general mortality in the different Registration Sub-Districts will be found at pages 39 and 40.

The Marriage Rate (see page 14) which in last report was shewn to be continuously declining, exhibits this year a still further decrease. In the year ended 31st March, 1894, 1,812 marriages only were registered in the Registration District of Newcastle-upon-Tyne (which includes the sub-district of Benwell and Fenham), being 80 less than during the previous twelve months. With this reduction, it is not surprising that the Birth Rate during the calendar year under report should be below the normal,—30·9 per 1,000, or 2·7 per 1,000 less than the corresponding figures for 1893 (page 39).

Zymotic Diseases, including Diarrhea, have caused 385 deaths, against 461 in the previous year. This improvement is partial only, and requires some elucidation. Thus—Measles, one of the diseases of the Zymotic Class, has been very much less fatal in 1894 than in 1893 (94 deaths against 208). On the other hand, Whooping Cough has been much more fatal (149 deaths against 33). The combined deaths from the two diseases are almost equal in the two years.

NOTIFIABLE DISEASES (see page 19) caused 86* deaths in the year under report, as compared with 82* in the former. Small-pox and Typhus are again absent from the factors of mortality. Two cases only of the former and none of the latter have been notified during the year.

Scarlet Fever shews a slight increase of deaths (27* against 23*). The total mortality from this disease is almost insignificant now in comparison with the returns of some former epidemic years. Thus, in 1873-74 together, there were no less than 709 deaths from this disease; in 1879, there were 284, and in the three years ended 1885, the number of fatal cases of Scarlet Fever was 363. Scarlet Fever seems, therefore, during the past quarter of a century, to have been undergoing a gradual change of type-from severe to mild. The rate of mortality of this disease, which, during the early part of the period in question, used to run occasionally as high as 25 or 30 per cent., has now fallen to 3.3 per cent; in this respect being the reverse of Measles, which, though formerly considered a trifling ailment, is now one of the most fatal of the Zymotic diseases. 826 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified in 1894, an increase of 133 on the returns of the year before.

Enteric (or Typhoid) Fever caused 30* deaths, against 25* in the previous year. The rate of mortality to cases notified is 18:3 per cent., as compared with 17:7 in the year 1893. The number of cases notified (164) is 23 in excess of the previous year's return.

During the course of the year I reported to your Committee on Enteric Fever in 1893 in connexion with the pail system of refuse removal, as follows:—" Examination of the returns as to the comparative prevalence of the disease in households, on the water-closet or pail-closet system respectively, shews that of the houses on the water-closet system only 0.3 per cent. have been infected with the disease, whereas in houses on the pail-closet system the rate has been 0.6 per cent."

Diphtheria has caused 27* deaths, against 28* in 1893. The rate of mortality is 24·1 per cent. The total number of cases notified is less by 59 than that of the previous year.

Diarrhæa, in persons aged 4 years and upwards, was made a notifiable disease from 15th August to 31st October. The number of cases reported was 402. Of these cases two only were fatal. There was no suspicion of Asiatic Cholera in any case.

Infant Mortality.—The deaths of Infants under one year of age number 171 below those of the year before (see pages 13 and 48).

Uncertified Deaths, which in 1893 shewed the lowest return on record, are the same in number (37) for the year under report.

The number of Cases of Infectious Diseases Notified by Medical Practitioners (see page 14) is 1,129 against 1,051 in the previous year.

The Work of the Health Department.—The work of the Health Department generally is increasing year by year. The Reports of the Inspectors are given on pages 33-37, and the returns of their respective work will be found in Appendix A (Tables XIV. to XIXD).

The inspections of tenement property are statistically increasing (29,317 last year as against 21,642 in 1893). At the same time the return of contraventions of the Bye-laws is decreasing (1,286 against 1,410). In last Annual Report a corresponding diminution was noted as an indication of improvements in sanitary habits.

The number of nuisance cases heard before the magistrates (138) is an increase over the previous year's return.

The number of prosecutions under the Food and Drugs Acts (see Table XVIII.) is the same as that of the year before, but the penalties (£17 10s.) are greater in amount.

The returns of inspection of Common Lodging Houses are given in Tables XIX. to XIXD. Those of Suspected or Unwholesome Provisions dealt with shew a continuing increase on the numbers of previous years. The fines amount to £25. One person, a Butcher, convicted for exposing tuberculous meat for sale, was imprisoned for two months without the option of a fine.

The Report of the Inspector of Dairies, Cowsheds, and Slaughter Houses is given on pages 36-37.

Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890.—Representations respecting 13 Sandgate and Wrangham's Entry, Sandgate (1st and 2nd houses on east side of Entry) were submitted to the Sanitary Committee in October. At the close of the year, the matter was under the consideration of the Committee.

Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1891.—Applications respecting 43 houses and the block of Industrial Dwellings at Garth Heads comprising 108 tenements, have been made during the year for Certificates of Exemption from Inhabited House Duty. Certificates for 4 of the houses have been granted.

Factory and Workshop Acts.—The number of Workshops reported by the Government Inspector and examined by the Inspectors of Nuisances continues to increase. 113 such Workshops were dealt with last year as against 87 in the year before.

Housebuilding in the City, which was shewn to be decreasing in 1893, was last year in a still more languishing state, new accommodation having then been provided for only 617 families, a decrease of 16 per cent. on the corresponding number for the year before.

(A.)—GENERAL STATISTICS.

During the 52 weeks ended 29th December, 1894, 6,250 births and Births and 3,636 deaths have been registered in the City. The births represent a causes). rate of 30.9 and the deaths a rate of 18.0* per 1,000 of a population of 201,947 at all ages, as estimated by the Registrar General to the middle of the year.

TO THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

SIR,

I beg to present you my report of the work done in my section of the Health Department during the year ending 31st December, 1894.

Common Lodging Houses.—These houses have been Common Lodging fairly well conducted.

Common Lodging Houses

One new house has been added to the Register, and one house has been closed.

Nuisance Abatement.—For details as to the removal of Nuisance privies and ashpits, &c., see Tables XV. and XVI.

The public have during the year freely made use of the staff in the sanitary examination of houses.

Tenement Bye-Laws.—These are still being vigorously Tenement enforced, resulting in great improvement in the condition of the houses, both for cleanliness and repair.

Adulteration Act.—The number of samples submitted Adulteration Act.—The number of samples submitted Adulteration Act for analysis was 190, as against 207 last year. 7 per cent. of the samples taken were certified either to be adulterated or of doubtful genuineness. Of 92 samples of New Milk purchased 6 per cent. were certified to be not genuine.

This rapidly increasing work is being done as well as is practicable without special increase of the staff. All we can do is to attend to the complaints sent us by the Factory Inspector and by workers. We are not able to search for and examine the great bulk of workshops in the City. It will be seen however, by the list of defects, how important is this work. We have had one Factory provided with additional means of escape from fire.

Legal Proceedings Legal Proceedings.—We have not, I am glad to say, been obliged to have much recourse to the Courts for the abatement of nuisances, and yet all the nuisances reported are abated excepting of course those of quite recent date.

The following is the report of Inspector Hedley:-

TO THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH,

SIR,

I beg to report that during the year ending Dec. 31st, 1894, the cattle in the city have continued free from any disease classified under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts.

The supervision of the Cow-sheds and Dairies has been regularly attended to; 1,778 inspections having been made during the year, and, in seven cases, increased ventilation and lighting, or other necessary improvements having been made at the verbal request of the Inspector. No formal notices have been served.

The number of persons keeping cows in the city continues to decrease, seven having declined the business, for various reasons, during the year, leaving only 78 persons who keep cows for the purpose of supplying milk to the public.

Ten old cow-sheds have been pulled down at Spital Tongues to make way for building extensions. This will cause a want of accommodation in that locality, as a large number of cows that depasture on the Town Moor were kept there.

One application was made to begin to occupy an old building as a cow-shed. After being inspected and reported on by the Inspector, the Committee declined the application.

Five outbreaks of infectious disease have been notified in the families of dairymen, viz., two of Scarlet Fever, and three of Typhoid Fever. Precautions were taken to prevent any communication between the patients and the milk supply. No spread of infection is known to have occurred through the milk.

Slaughter Houses.—The Slaughter Houses (18 in number), erected at Byker Hill, after being inspected and approved by the Sanitary Committee, were begun to be occupied in May. At the close of the year three were still unlet. Six Slaughter House Licences have been withdrawn, three at Byker were closed voluntarily, one at St. Peter's by

order of the Committee. As the occupier still continued to use the place, he was summoned and fined 20s, and costs for slaughtering on unlicensed premises. One place in Scotswood Road being pulled down by the owner to make alterations, the licence was not renewed. The licence for the Knackers' Yard at Ouseburn was withdrawn in October, but the occupier was still permitted to use it till he got more suitable premises elsewhere.

In October, the Council approved of 133 places being licensed, as follows: 109 for twelve months, 15 for six months, and 9 are renewed monthly, being an increase of twelve on the previous year. Additional Slaughter House accommodation is much required for the western district of the city, those at the Cattle Market and others being often over-crowded. The majority of those licensed for short periods, owing to sanitary defects, are in that district; but it will be difficult to obtain a site convenient for the trade, and suitable in other respects.

Fish Market, Close.—The supplies of Fish at this Market have been very irregular. The condition on arrival was fairly good. No diseased Fish were detected, but the following becoming stale were destroyed with the consent of the owner or agent :--

A large percentage of the suspected quarters of beef was imported as dead meat from Denmark. In three consignments tuberculosis was found, 19 quarters of beef being affected with the disease. On two occasions 8 quarters were found in a dropsical and emaciated condition. Shortly after the above were destroyed, the importation ceased for the year.

Eight persons have been summoned for being the owners of diseased meat intended for sale as human food. One was fined £10 and costs, two £5 and costs each, two 40/- and costs each, one 20/- and costs. One person was sent to prison for two months without the option of a fine. One case was dismissed.
