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## HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

- Nursing in the Home.—(a) Three District Nurses, who are qualified Midwives, are supplied by the Ramsey Nursing Association, which is a purely voluntary body. These Nurses also act as Health Visitors, and attend School Inspections. A qualified Nurse is also available for attending Septic Cases, which are not undertaken by the District Nurses whilst on Maternity work.
  - (b) Cases of Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria are usually sent to the Huntingdon Isolation Hospital. Other Infectious Diseases are nursed at home.
- Laboratory Facilities.—Tuberculous Investigations are carried out by the County Medical Officer and all Pathological Examinations by the Clinical Research Association. Water Analyses are performed by the Public Analyst at Cambridge.

## Hospitals.

The local Scarlet Fever and Small Pox Hospitals have been closed and accommodation is now obtained at Huntingdon Isolation Hospital under a joint scheme.

Arrangements are quite satisfactory for the District.

#### Clinics.

The Infant Welfare Clinic has been taken over by the County Medical Officer, who also holds a Monthly Clinic in the Town.

All cases of Venereal Disease are recommended to attend the Peterborough Clinic.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE AREA.

#### WATER.

1. (a)—There is, as yet, no definite Water Supply. All Water used for drinking purposes is obtained from Storage Tanks, Pumps, Wells and Dykes. Analyses show that it is unfit for drinking unless it is first boiled.

A plentiful supply of good water will be definitely available to the whole area, except the outlying Fen districts, in April 1938.

#### DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

(b)—Septic Tanks deal with all Sewerage before it empties into the River. All Refuse is disposed of by a Controlled Tipping System which is working very successfully.

With the advent of the Water Supply, a more complete Sewerage System will have to be considered.

#### RIVERS AND STREAMS.

2. There is no pollution of Rivers and Streams in the Area.

#### GENERAL SANITARY REPORT.

- 3, (a)—Closet Accommodation.—9 new Water Closets were provided and I Pail Closet was converted W.C.'s.
  - (b)—Public Cleansing.—Dry House Refuse is collected in covered carts and disposed of by Controlled Tipping.

Refuse from Earth Closets and Privies is collected at night by carts and is eventually used as manure.

Cesspools are emptied in the same way and the refuse spread on the land. No pumps are used.

#### SCHOOLS.

4.—There are seven Schools in the district, and Sanitary Conditions are satisfactory. Disinfection of Classrooms after Cases of Infectious Disease is carried out immediately by the Sanitary Inspector.

# PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

The incidence of Infectious Diseases in the Area was again low.

There were 7 cases of Scarlet Fever: equivalent to 1.36 per 1,000 of the population, that of England and Wales being 2.33 per 1,000

There were 4 cases of Diptheria, giving a case rate of 0.78 per 1,000 as against 1.49 per 1,000 in England and Wales.

There were no cases of Small Pox, Typhoid Fever or Erysipelas notified.

Fourteen Cases of Pneumonia were notified of which three proved fatal.

A fairly widespread epidemic of Whooping Cough occurred during the winter—there was one death.

One Case of Puerperal Fever occurred during the year. It was not fatal.

There were four positive results from Throat Swabs.

- Cancer.—The Death Rate from Cancer was higher than that of last year. One in seven of the total deaths were caused by this disease.
- Blindness.—Chronic cases are looked after by the Hunts Society for the Blind. Other cases of Eye Disease are attended to at Peterborough by arrangement with the County Medical Officer.
- Tuberculosis.—All cases are referred to the County Medical Officer.
