

The health of the district remains good and this is borne out by the vital statistics. The death rate remains relatively very low at the same level as last year. The birth rate shows a slight increase and is well above the average for England and Wales.

Yet again no case of either Poliomyelitis or Diphtheria has occurred. There was, however, a protracted mild epidemic of infective jaundice, which for the most part affected the school-child population in the 10-15 years age group, with the peak number of cases occurring in the summer months.

During the year much time and deliberation was given to the question of the provision of a main drainage scheme for the town. This is long overdue and the general public will know now that application for loan sanction has been made to the Ministry for the comprehensive Scheme This Scheme allowing as it does for re-sewering as necessary, will make it possible for all properties to gain access to a sewer and will therefore allow us to dispense with a night soil collection, and should also eliminate nuisances arising from flooding and surcharging of sewers. The Interim Scheme, if adopted, would make little or no tangible contribution to these ends, although by replacing the existing septic tanks, which are completely unsatisfactory and inadequate, by a modern treatment works, it would eliminate the nuisance caused by the discharge of the present highly offensive effluent.

The question of the adequacy of the water supply has and is causing anxiety, though it is hoped that it may not be very long before a scheme may be implemented by the Ramsey and St. Ives Joint Water Board to Johain water from Cambridge, which would enable the Council to lift the severe restrictions imposed by necessity on the use of water.

One cannot, however, but draw attention to the relatively high cost to the Council of both these Schemes. Costs which have risen steeply since 1946 and may well be double in the case of the main drainage scheme since the original estimate in 1946-7.

Reference was made last year to the housing circumstances of the district, and it can hardly be said that the year has shown improvement. The number of houses which it has been possible to complete (21, of which 8 were built by the Council), has made little impression on the list of housing applicants, and does not allow us to apply ourselves to the task of slum clearance, even though the relative number of properties ripe for demolition is relatively high.

In conclusion, I should like to thank Members of the Council for their kindness and consideration to me during the year, and to all officers of the Council for their never failing help and co-operation.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

(a) Laboratory Facilities:

No change has taken place in the general arrangements during the past year. Bacteriological specimens from Practitioners in the district are examined at the Pathological Department of the Memorial Hospital, Peterborough, or by the Pathological Laboratory, Tennis Court Road, Cambridge.

(b) Ambulance Facilities:

- (1) For the removal of infectious cases a motor ambulance is available at the Isolation Hospital, Huntingdon.
- (2) For non-infectious and accident cases, ambulances are provided by the Huntingdon County Council from their depot at Huntingdon.

(c) Nursing in the Home:

Nursing in the home is carried out by three qualified nurses employed by the Huntingdon County Council. All nurses are certified midwives and attend the majority of maternity cases under the Domiciliary Midwifery Scheme.

All cases of Tuberculosis are visited by the Tuberculosis Health Visitor and a report with details of home conditions and circumstances is completed.

(d) Clinics and Treatment Centres:

Infant Welfare Clinics are held at the Health Clinic on the 2nd and last Wednesday every month from 2-4 p.m.

Milk Supply:

Three milk distributors are registered and three Supplementary Licences for Tuberculin Tested, Pasteurised and Sterilised were granted during the year.

Water Supply:

Samples from the water supply are taken at regular intervals and forwarded to the Pathological Laboratory, Memorial Hospital, Peterborough. During the summer months the supply caused concern and it was extremely difficult at times to meet the demand. In order to conserve as much water as possible restrictions were imposed on the use of water for non-domestic purposes and no new applications in this connection were granted. Negotiations are in hand for a supply from the Cambridge Water Works, a much softer water, which will considerably improve the present position.

Drainage and Sewerage:

The necessity for an up to date system of sewerage is more pronounced than ever, especially in view of the development which continues to take place. The erection of a new Secondary Modern School, too, accentuates the need for modern sewerage, and as a result the Council instructed their Consulting Engineers to prepare a comprehensive scheme for the town. At the time of going to press the Council had agreed to proceed with the scheme and to apply for the necessary loan sanction.

Meat and Food Inspection:

Occasional emergency slaughter takes place at the local slaughter houses, and during the year 19 pigs were inspected. There were 3 carcases of which some part or organ was condemned; none were affected with tuberculosis.

Regular slaughter of animals was still carried on at St. Ives.

The amount of condemned foodstuffs has been so small as not to require any special arrangements.

Refuse Collection:

The refuse collection scheme for the town, with labour on a contract basis, and collections at weekly intervals, continue to run smoothly. Refuse is satisfactorily disposed of at the controlled tip at Stocking Fen and very few complaints are received.

In the outside areas collections are made by contract on a fortnightly basis and all refuse brought to the one tip at Stocking Fen.

The collection of night soil is carried out by contract twice weekly in the town and weekly in the outside areas. Although this is an absolute necessity, it is a system which is full of complaints and one which can only be abolished by the provision of a proper sewerage scheme.

Moveable Dwellings.

During the year 16 licences were granted to erect station and use moveable dwellings under Section 269 of the Public Health Act, 1936. All dwellings are inspected from time to time to ensure that the sanitary arrangements are satisfactory.

In conclusion I would like to express my appreciation to the Council for their consideration and interest during the year, the Medical Officer of Health for his enthusiasm and advice, and the Staff and workmen for their work and co-operation.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

During the year the protracted epidemic of infective jaundice provided us with 22 notified cases. For the most part the disease was mild. Nevertheless, 2 cases were fairly severe and took some months before making a satisfactory recovery.
