

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my eleventh Annual Report on the health and sanitary conditions of the District for the year ending 31st December, 1968.

The mid-year population was estimated by the Registrar General to be 5620 a fall of 200 persons since the previous year.

There were 74 live births during the year, giving a crude birth rate of 13.2 per 1,000 population. The adjusted birth rate is 13.1 per thousand which is well below the rate for England and Wales of 16.9.

One infant aged under twelve months died giving an infant mortality rate of 14 per thousand live births.

There were 51 deaths during the year, 27 males and 24 females. The crude death rate was 9.1 per 1,000 population, and the adjusted rate 9.8 per 1,000. The death rate for England and Wales was 11.9 per 1,000 population the ratio of the local adjusted rate to this being 0.83.

There was remarkably little notifiable infectious disease during the year; Measles being the most frequent, with 14 cases. Only one new case of Tuberculosis (non pulmonary) occurred.

Mill House, the block of flatlets for elderly people, was completed and opened during the year. It contains 12 single and 8 double flats, and will I am sure be greatly appreciated.

Steady progress continues to be made in the closing or demolition of unfit houses and cottages, and the number of pail closets is being constantly reduced. During 1968,34 were done away with and the remainder now total 200. Many of these will disappear as the sewering of the four villages is completed. Work at Mereside and Forty Foot is now under way.

Rodent control has been constantly watched throughout the year. A private firm carry out treatments on behalf of the Council, and the farmers have co-operated well.

I wish again to thank the Members of the Council and their Officers and Staff for all the help which they have given me during the year

# TO THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

Sir,

I beg to submit my report for the year ending 31st December, 1968.

# Housing:

No statutory notices for disrepair were served during the year. Necessary repairs to dwelling houses were secured by informal action. A twenty unit old persons block of flats with warden's flat attached were completed during the year and all but three let. The flats are centrally heated by gas fired ducted warm air, and have a communal lounge, T.V. lounge, laundry and hobbies room provided.

The rents appear high to some of the applicants on the waiting list but once a tenant has moved in they soon appreciate the amenities provided and I feel Mill House will be a valuable addition to the council's housing accommodation.

Seven unfit cottages were vacated during the year with either closing orders, demolition orders or undertakings not to relet being given by the owners.

Twenty three houses were demolished during the year, several of which have been standing empty for many years.

#### New Housing:

There were 145 active applicants on the list for Council houses at the end of the year 41 of these requiring one bedroom or single persons accommodation. 42 families were rehoused during the year.

22 houses were erected during the year by private enterprise.

#### Improvement Grants:

- 7 applications for Standard Grants were received and approved during the year.
- 8 Standard Grant works of improvement were carried out during the year.

A scheme to modernise 28 Council houses, outside the proposed sewerage scheme has been let to the contractors. 12 houses were completed by the end of the year. The improvements included bathrooms, sink units, internal W.C.'s, hot water systems and drainage systems to glass fibre septic tanks.

# Sewerage and Sewage Disposal:

22 new drainage systems were installed and tested during the year.
20 alterations to existing systems were also tested.

The Council give a free cesspool/septic tank emptying service where necessary - 197 cesspools/septic tanks being emptied in 1968.

The Council give a free cesspool/septic tank emptied in 1968.

At the end of the year there were still 200 pail closets in the outlying areas, 191 of which are emptied twice weekly by a contractor. 9 pail closets are in remote cottages and are emptied by the occupiers.

Of the five groups of Council houses outside the proposed sewerage schemes, four are in the process of being improved and provided with septic tank drainage.

The fifth group of 8 houses are in poor shape and will be closed as the present tenants are rehoused.

Stage one of sewering the four villages is under way, rising mains and sewers have been completed at Mereside and Forty Foot. Work is continuing at the two pumping stations, an ejector station at Bodsey and extensions to the main sewage works.

# Water Supry:

33 water samples were taken from householders taps on the mains water supply and taken to the Public Health Laboratory, Peterborough. Two samples were unsatisfactory one had one coliform bacillus per 100 m.l. but no Bact. coli.(type1) the other had two coliform bacilli per 100 m.l. but no Bact. coli. (type 1.)

The water company were informed and the service pipes and mains flushed and further samples proved satisfactory.

The water supply (Cambridge Water Company) contains less than 0.2 parts per million of fluoride.

There are 6 houses without a mains water supply, three are on the slum clearance programme. The three remaining are houses built since 1900, owner occupied but are over half a mile, up a drove, away from the nearest water main.

#### Swimming Baths

There is a medium sized outdoor swimming pool at Ramsey Secondary Modern School, an indoor learners pool at Ramsey Junior School and an outdoor learners pool at Ramsey St. Marys County Primary School. They all have teachers responsible for filtration and chlorination of the water and a system of testing the free chlorine available is carried out regularly whilst the pools are in operation.

All the pools have continuous filtration and chlorination plants.

10 samples were taken during the year, only one sample having a count of 64 colonies per m.l., all the other samples had a count of less than 6 colonies per m.l. None of the samples tested had coliform bacilli.

At the end of the year there were still 200 pail closets in the outlying creas, 9t of which are sapiled twice weekly by a contractor. 9 pail closets are in capte cottages and are sapiled by the occupiers.

#### Refuse Collection and Disposal

Refuse collection is carried out by direct labour, two driver/loaders and one loader providing a weekly collection to the whole area. The town is given a weekly backdoor collection and the outlying areas a weekly kerb-side collection. Where elderly people are unable to put their bins at the kerb-side the men will call and give a back-door service.

A 35 cubic yard Bedford/Eagle Crushload refuse vehicle is used and apart from Mondays and Fridays usually manages to hold a complete day's collection.

Refuse is disposed of at Ramsey Heights Tip, which involves a 10 mile round trip for emptying the vehicle. Refuse is burnt and then tipped in fingers. Topsoil from the next tipping area being scraped and stockpiled for final cover of the refuse. Since the refuse has been burnt daily at the tip no fly nuisances have arisen and only two small rat infestations have occurred.

Test weighings of the refuse were taken during the summer and winter to enable a reasonable estimate to be made of the weight of refuse collected. Summer weekly collection weighed 22 tons 1 cwt lqr and the winter collection 24 tons 1 cwt lqr giving an average weekly weight of 23 tons 4 cwt lqr and an estimated gross tonnage of 1,206 tons 17 cwts of refuse collected and disposed of annually.

# Rodent Control:

Rentokil have continued to carry out treatments to dwelling houses and council property on contract. There was no test baiting of the sewerage system as there was frequent flooding from August onwards and suitable conditions never occurred. Only at Westfield was there any evidence that sewers were infested.

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#### Rodent Control:

Properties other than sewers

The long drawn out harvest and mild conditions prevailing at the latter half of the year gave ideal breeding conditions for rodents. Happily very few infestations have occurred in the town area and most farmers in the district are carrying out treatments for rats voluntarily.

Rentokil still have several farm contracts for carrying out rodent control on farms and another contractor Ratsouris also operates in the urban district.

The Ministries Officers also help by reporting infestations on farms which they visit and in all cases the farmers concerned have co-operated in treating the infested areas. There has been no need to serve written notices on occupiers.

#### General:
