I have pleasure in presenting my twelfth Annual Report on the health and sanitary conditions of the District for the year ending 31st December, 1969.

The mid-year population was estimated by the Registrar General as unchanged since 1968, and to be 5,620.

There were 71 live births during the year, this being 3 less than in 1968. The crude birth rate was 12.6 per 1,000 of the population, and the adjusted rate was 12.5. This is low when compared to the rate of 16.3 for England and Wales. Seven per cent of the births were illegitimate, as against eight per cent for England and Wales.

Two infants aged under twelve months died during the year, and there was one still-birth. As the number of births are small this makes the infant death rates high this year, but over the previous five years these rates had been very good.

There were 62 deaths during the year, 35 males and 27 females. The crude rate was 11 and the adjusted rate 11.9 per 1,000 of the population, which corresponds exactly with the national rate.

Sixty six cases of Measles occurred during the year, but apart from this there was very little infectious disease. No new cases of Tuberculosis were notified during the year, neither did anyone die of Tuberculosis.

The sewerage scheme for Mereside and Forty Foot was under construction throughout the year. When all four of the outlying villages are sewered the number of pail closets in the area will decrease rapidly. Good mention has recently been made by the Gt. Ouse River Authority of the quality of the effluent from the sewage works. Now that the scheme for sewering the adjoining village of Bury has been completed the two Councils are able to implement the agreement made between them and we are now accepting for treatment the sewage from Bury.

The water supply throughout the District is satisfactory, but contains less than 0.2 parts per million of fluoride. This District is agreeable to fluoridation of its water supply, but we are awaiting negotiations between the Cambridge Water Company and other bodies before more can be done in the matter. There are no standpipes in the area, and there are only about five houses in the District which do not receive mains water.

I am most grateful to the Members of the Council, and their Officers and Staff for all the help which they have given me during the year.

Sir,

I beg to submit my report for the year ending 31st December, 1969. Housing:

One statutory notice was served to secure the repair of a dwelling house. Repairs to other dwellings were secured by informal action.

Mill House Old Peoples flatlets are now occupied and the tenants seem satisfied with the facilities provided. Single persons and old couples still make up approximately one third of the applicants on the Housing Waiting List and the need for one bedroomed accommodation is self evident.

10 unfit cottages were vacated during the year.

13 cottages were demolished during the year.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal:

26 new drainage systems were installed and tested during the year. 37 alterations to existing systems were also listed.

The Council give a free cesspool/septic tank emptying service where necessary. 203 cesspools/septic tanks being emptied in 1969.

At the end of the year there were still 165 pail closets emptied twice weekly by a Contractor. A further 7 remote cottages have pail closets emptied by the occupiers.

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The Council have agreed to close and ultimately demolish the 8 Council houses which are not worth improving and laying outside the proposed sewerage scheme at Ramsey St. Mary's.

The sewerage scheme for Mereside and Forty Foot is proceeding and is hoped to be operational by April, 1970. Once this is completed, works of improvement will be necessary to the pre-war Council houses.

Water Supply :

31 Water Samples were taken from dwelling house cold water taps and taken to the Public Health Laboratory, Peterborough Hospital. One sample had a coliform count of 4 on MacConky 2 days 37°C. with no B. Coli Type 1. The remainder were satisfactory. The Water Company replaced stop cock washers and flushed the service pipe to the house giving the suspicious result, and further tests by the Water Company and ourselves proved satisfactory.

Swimming Baths :

The year proved to be a very unsatisfactory one as one school pool was never used during the year and the large outdoor pool at the Secondary Modern School was only used for about two months at the early part of the Summer due to work starting to cover the pool with a glass fibre dome. St. Mary's Junior School was used all through the season and was provided with changing room adjacent to the outdoor pool by the Parent-teachers association. 4 satisfactory samples were taken, two from the Secondary Modern School and two from Ramsey St. Mary's C.P. School. 2 unsatisfactory results were also obtained, one from each pool, but one was due to a breakdown in the chlorination plant and the other was taken after roofing operations had commenced.

Meat and Food Inspection :

There are no slaughter-houses in the district.

Unfit food is condemned following notification by the shopkeeper or during routine inspections under the Food Hygiene Regulations.

Three refrigeration breakdowns during the year resulted in a considerable quantity of frozen foodstuffs having to be condemned.

Refuse Collection and Disposal:

Refuse collection is carried out by direct labour, two loader/drivers and a loader provide a weekly back door collection in the town and a weekly kerbside collection in the villages. The 35 cubic yard Bedford/Eagle refuse vehicle enables the present crew to cope with the rounds easily, and the crew are able to accommodate the new dwellinghouses that are being occupied.

Refuse disposal is at Ramsey Heights Tip and no complaints were received during the year from nearby householders.

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Rodent Control:

Rentokil have continued to do treatments to dwelling houses on complaint and Council properties by regular servicing. A rapid increase in dwelling house infestation occurred during the early winter probably due to the early harvest which contrasted appreciably to the past two years.

A 10% test baiting of the sewer system showed slight infestation (5 partial takes). A fluoroacetamide treatment was carried out to 25 manholes.

Rentokil have several farm contracts in the district and another contracting firm treats Ramsey Estates. Where infestations have been reported or noticed, informal action was all that was needed to have the necessary treatments carried out. No evidence of warfarin resistance in rats or mice was noticed.

General:

The improving of the Council houses at St. Mary's, outside the proposed sewerage scheme and the gradual improvement of cottages in the villages is gradually reducing the number of Pail Closets. This reduction will increase rapidly over the next two or three years as the four villages become sewered.

Rodent Control :

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Appreciation is expressed of the interest and support of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Health Committee, Members of the Council, the guidance of the Medical Officer of Health and the co-operation of the Council Staff.
