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

MR. CHAIRMAN,

The area of the district is 6,483 acres. The estimated population at the middle of 1938 was 4,427. This gives a population density of 0.68 persons per acre.

The rateable value is £17,406 and the product of a penny rate £64 2s. 8d.

The number of inhabited houses at the end of 1938 was 1,383.

Birth Rate—There were 63 births, and of these 32 were males and 31 females. One was illegitimate. The still-births numbered 3, 2 males and 1 female, and all were legitimate. The number of still-births represents a rate of 45 per 1000 of live and still births combined. The illegitimate rate was 1'6 per cent of live births. Birth rates per 1000 of population were:

Death Rate—There were 49 deaths, and of these 31 were males and 18 females. The figure for the deaths represents a crude death rate of 11'6 per 1000 of estimated population. For the purpose of comparison with corresponding rates for the whole of England and Wales, the crude death rate is multiplied by '91. The presumption in the use of a factor less than unity is that the age and sex distribution of the population of this district is more favourable to a higher death rate than if the age and sex distribution were the same as in the whole of England and Wales. The comparable, or standard, death rates per 1000 of population were Raunds 10'07, England and Wales 11'6, London 11'4. Fifteen of the deaths were inward transfers. The ages at death according to age groups were:

Infantile Mortality—There was one death under the age of one year. This was a male child and the cause of death was Pyloric Stenosis. The single death is equivalent to an infantile mortality rate of 15'8 per 1000 live births. The corresponding rate for England and Wales was 53.

Measles - There was no death from this cause.

Diarrhœa (under two years)—There was no death from this cause.

Whooping Cough—There was no death from this cause.

Maternal Mortality—There was no death associated with child-birth or pregnancy.

Cancer—Deaths from this cause numbered five, and of these four were males and one female. The five deaths represent 10'2 per cent of the whole deaths, or 1'1 per 1000 of the whole population.

Scarlet Fever—The 1 case gives a notification rate of '22 per 1000 of population, that of England and Wales 2'41.

Erysipelas—The notification rate per 1000 of population was '67, that for England and Wales '4.

Puerperal Pryrexia—No case was notified.

Pneumonia—The notification rate was '4 per 100 of population, that of England and Wales 1'1.

Diphtheria-No case was notified.

Tuberculosis—The only notification was a case of pulmonary tuberculosis in a female of 51. There were four deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis—three males aged 56, 24 and 23, and one female of 23. Two patients entered Rushden Sanatorium in 1938. At the end of 1938 there were on the tuberculosis register five males and seven females pulmonary tuberculosis, and two males and five females non-pulmonary tuberculosis.

No action was taken under the Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1925, or under Sec. 62 of the P.H.A., 1925, or Sec. 172 P.H.A., 1936.

4 houses, East Street, Stanwick, owned by Mr. A. Gates: Outstanding at 31/12/1938.

Defects found in 46 houses not included above were mainly structural and capable of repair by willing owners.

Rehousing—At December 31st, 1938, 82 houses erected by the Council for rehousing purposes were occupied, a further 30 were completed ready for occupation, and 4 were nearing completion.

355 persons had been displaced from unfit houses included in the

Clearance Orders or dealt with individually.

Housing Aet, 1935—Seven cases of overcrowding were abated during the year, six being rehoused in Council Houses and one in a privately owned house.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk Supply—18 dairy and 19 cowshed inspections were made in the period. A reasonable standard of cleanliness was maintained in the dairies and cowsheds generally, but serious complaints had to be made about one dairy and one cowshed. The dairy was dirty and the cowshed was falling into disrepair. Since then both have gone out of use. 94 samples of milk were sent to the County Medical Officer of Health for examination under the Methylene Blue Test, and 6 samples of pasteurised milk were sent for bacteriological examination and coliform count.

The pasteurised samples were all marked "Good," and of the others, 43 samples were marked "Good," 29 "Moderate" and 22 "Bad."

Meat and other Foods—115 inspections of Slaughterhouses, 35 inspections of Butchers' shops, 1 inspection of Market stalls, 7 inspections of Fish shops and 6 inspections of Bakehouses were made. 4 cwts. 2lbs. of meat, a quantity of sausages and 21 lbs. of tomatoes were condemned and destroyed.

Water Supply—The Town's water supply was satisfactory throughout the year, though increasing consumption and decline in yield of the old wells caused an abnormal use of the auxiliary well. The Public Analyst's Reports on the quality of the water are given by the Medical Officer. These reports indicate that the water was satisfactory, but as stated in my report for 1937, the Council have considered the question of installing Filtration and Chlorination Plant at the Waterworks in order to cover any abnormal situation such as was experienced in July 1936, when, during extensive flooding in the Nene Valley, a sample of the supply was reported upon adversely by the Analyst. The scheme mentioned in my last report has now been approved by the Minister of Health and his sanction obtained to the raising of a loan to carry out the work.

No extension to the distribution system was made in the year, and no alterations were made in the source of supply, but new pumping plant was put down to replace a worn out suction gas engine and three-throw ram pump. The new plant consists of a 32 B.H.P. Blackstone single cylinder horizontal Diesel oil engine driving a Pearn centrifugal pump capable of displacing 11,000 gallons per hour against the head

operating on the plant.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal—No extension was made to the sewerage system or to the Disposal Works at Raunds and Stanwick. Trouble in maintaining a satisfactory effluent was experienced at both works and considerable use was made of Aluminoferric in an endeavour to clarify the tank effluent. This had some success, but it aggravated an already acute sludge disposal problem. It is clear that the increased water consumption and the addition of the new tannery effluent has produced a flow of sewage well beyond the capacity of the works which are now approaching the worn-out stage. I have advised the Council to consider the question of providing new disposal works.

House Refuse Collection—A weekly collection of house refuse is made by a motor vehicle properly designed for the purpose from all houses in the area except outlying farms.

Refuse is now disposed of by tipping at a site in Brooks Road outside the built up area of the district. This site is rapidly getting filled up and cannot last for another year.

Destruction of Rats—The Council pay twopence for each rat destroyed in the area by the ratcatcher and one penny for each tail of rats destroyed in the area by any other person. In the year of report 1,668 tails were brought in for which £7 0s. 9d. was paid.

Smoke Nuisances—Several complaints had to be made to occupiers of factories about nuisances caused by smoke from factory chimneys produced by the burning of leather waste, and preliminary notices under section 102 of the Public Health Act, 1936, were served in nine cases. These notices and informal action were generally successful, but proceedings in Court had to be taken against Messrs. Blanson Heels Ltd. of Stanwick who appeared before the Magistrates at Thrapston on April 5th, when they were fined £1 with £5 5s. 0d. costs and an order to abate the nuisance and carry out necessary works was obtained against them.

Towards the end of the year the firm gave further trouble, and as informal action and a preliminary notice produced no abatement of the nuisance proceedings in Court were again introduced. The case came before the Magistrates at Thrapston on January 17th, 1939, when the firm was fined £3 3s. with 12s. costs.
