It will be noted that the Infant Mortality Rate of 16.2 compares extremely favourably with that of England and Wales, and that there is an increase in the Birth and Death Rates; the latter can be accounted for by the number of deaths occurring in the District of old folk.

SECTION B. GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

In respect of (a) Laboratory Facilities, (b) Ambulance Facilities, (c) Nursing in the Home, (d) Treatment Centres and Clinics and (e) Hospitals, there are no essential changes to note.

SECTION C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply. The water undertakers for the area are the Southend Waterworks Company who maintained a constant supply of water throughout the year. The Company submitted during the year reports from an independent Analyst upon four samples of water from their mains all of which were reported as satisfying a bacteriological and chemical examination.

During the year 29 houses formerly relying on well and rainwater supplies were connected to the mains of the water undertakers.

The approximate proportion of dwelling houses and the approximate proportion of population supplied from public mains at the end of the year was as follows:-

Direct to the houses - 95.60 per.cent. of dwelling houses. 96.48 per.cent. of population.

By means of standpipe - 1.4 per.cent. of dwelling houses. 1.12 per cent. of population. Drainage. Most of the built up area containing approximately 75.4 per. cent. of the properties is sewered by a sewerage scheme. There were no extensions of the sewer during the year.

Several groups of houses too congested to rely on conservancy systems still rely on this system and nuisances occur from time to time which can only be eliminated by the institution of a sewerage scheme.

There were no new connections to the sewer during the year.

Public Cleansing. Refuse and salvage is collected from house to house throughout the district, and a kitchen waste collection is in operation on the communal bin system. Great difficulties were experienced throughout the year owing to the shortage of suitable labour and although a weekly collection in the shopping centre was maintained, it was not possible to maintain the fortnightly collection, as was planned, in the other roads, eighteen days being the average period between collections.

The results of the salvage collection compared favourably with districts of a similar size and character.

Night soil is collected at weekly intervals by the Council from 66 premises in the district.

Factories Act. 25 inspections were made of factories and 2 defects were found and remedied.

Petroleum (Consolidated) Regulations, 1928. Licences to store petroleum spirit in respect of 13 premises were granted during the year. 26 visits were paid during the year to premises storing or proposing to store petroleum.

General. During the year 975 visits and inspections were made in the detection and abatement of nuisances, the repair and improvement of houses, the abatement of overcrowding, the rehousing of homeless persons, the administration of the Factories Act, Food and Drugs Act, Milk and Dairies Order, Petroleum Regulations, the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, enquiries into cases of infectious disease, water supply surveys, etc.

SECTION D. HOUSING.

Repair of properties was confined to those works necessary to abate nuisances and 66 houses were repaired under this heading. Great difficulty was experienced in obtaining the execution of works owing to the labour shortage and the diversion of labour to war damage repairs.

SECTION E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk. There were on the Register of Dairymen on the 31st December, 1945 14 producers, including 3 producer-retailers, 2 shops from which milk is sold in sealed bottles as received from a registered dairy, and 3 firms who retail milk in the district from vehicles and who are registered at Dairies situated outside the District.

51 visits were made to producers and retailers premises, and samples of milk were taken and submitted for analysis as to the cleanliness of production, bottling, and distribution with the following results:-

Owing to pressure of work, it was not found possible to take any samples during the period 6th June, 1945 to 20th September, 1945, a season when bad samples are more likely.

8 samples of pasteurised milk were taken and submitted to the phosphatase test as to efficiency of pasteurisation and all were reported as satisfactory.

Meat and other Foods. During the year an existing slaughterhouse within the district was adapted and enlarged by the Minister of Food and in August slaughtering commenced. From the date of opening until the 31st December, 1945, the following was dealt with and inspected:

Food and Drugs Adulteration. The Essex County Council are responsible for the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act relating to adulteration and all the 23 samples of food taken in the district during 1945 (including 8 samples of milk) were reported by the Analyst as being genuine.

SECTION F. PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

The bill of health for the district for the year 1945 was exceedingly good. There are no matters of outstanding importance to report, and particulars of all cases occurring during the year will be found in the table on page 9.

It is a great pleasure to record that during the year there was not a clinical case of diphtheria. There was a slight incidence in the number of cases of measles, as was general throughout the country.

One contact to a case of smallpox was kept under surveillance during the required period, and I am glad to be able to report did not contract the disease.

Tuberculosis. I am unaware of any undue incidence of this disease associated with any local cause or condition. The majority of the cases come from outside the District, chiefly from the Greater London area, having already been notified, and are transfers under the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1930

Scabies. The number of cases of confirmed scabies brought to the notice of this department has fallen considerably since the end of the War in Europe, and where in-patient treatment was necessary, this was provided at the County Council's Hospitals and Institutions, although the number of cases coming within this category was very small and not always within my knowledge as scabies is not a notifiable infectious disease in the general sense of the word.

Venereal Diseases. Regulation 33B does not come within the purview of the local sanitary authority.

<u>Diphtheria Immunisation</u>. The scheme in this district is progressing satisfactorily but the migratory nature of the population adds to the local difficulties.

At the end of December, 1945, the percentage of child population considered to be immunised was as hereunder:-
