## SOCIAL CONDITIONS

. 31 BOO Children were evacuated to this district from Birmingham under the Government Evacuation Scheme during September. The management of these cases was the responsibility of this department and the problems arising were many. No nursing assistance was provided by the Evacuating Authority and the work of school inspection fell rather heavily on some of the district nursing Associations. Several cases of skin disease were sent home and owing to the unexpected development . 11 of the war, many mothers and children returned on their own account.

#### GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

#### (a) LABORATORY FACILITIES

Laboratory facilities are the same as those given in my previous report.

#### (b) AMBULANCE FACILITIES

The ambulance for non-infectious, accident and maternity cases was taken over in September by the Urban District Council and the vehicle is kept at the Fire Station.

The service is, in my opinion, inadequate, as there is no attendant in the vehicle. A trained ambulance attendant is essential to deal with any contingencies which may arise during conveyance.

3,908 patients received treatment at the Smallwood Hospital during the year and 734 at Birmingham and other Hospitals and Convalescent Homes. The number of cases dealt with at the Smallwood Hospital continues to increase. No structural alterations were made to the hospital buildings during the year and the bed accommodation (35 beds) remains the same.

Structural alterations are still in progress at the Joint Isolation Hospital which serves five county districts.

An acute shortage of institutional accormodation for infectious diseases has again been felt during 1939 and additional expense has been incurred by the Redditch Urban District owing to the necessity of transferring cases to other hospitals.

#### MATERNITY AND NURSING HOMES

The Council is not a Local Supervising Authority but there were two Registered Nursing Homes in the area during 1939.

The extension of the mains supply from Headless Cross to Ham Green and Eleceks Brook was completed, but the scheme for the continuation of the main from Feckenham to Berrow Hill, although approved by the Ministry, was, with their permission, suspended for the time being, on account of the labour shortage and the difficulty of obtaining materials as a result of the National situation.

## (ii) DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

It is unfortunate that several agencies have hindered the carrying out of the sewerage scheme which was started at the end of 1938. A rapidly increasing population and the recent erection of several hundred new houses makes the sewerage problem a health matter of the first magnitude. The overloading of the old sewerage works is serious and the need for speed in the completion of the new works cannot be over-emphasised.

Work is proceeding slowly on the new sewage disposal works off Studley Road and several lengths of main sewers, totalling 3.5 miles, have been laid.

#### RIVERS AND STREAMS

The pollution of the River Arrow continues to be a menace to the public health. Factory development has aggravated the position. Complaints are frequently received concerning the state of the river below the sewage works.

## (v) ERADICATION OF BED BUGS

One council house and eight other houses were found to be infested with bed bugs. Liquid insecticide is used for disinfestation and "Zaldecide" is found to be the most effective. The premises are examined 10 - 14 days after treatment.

#### SECTION D.

#### HOUSING

It was unfortunate that the second Slum Clearance Scheme of the Council could not have been carried through before the National situation brought the scheme to an abrupt ending. A more vigorous housing policy would have provided the new houses which are now so badly needed and at the same time would have cleared away much old property which now disgraces our town.

The advent of new factories and the increasing demands of labour have found us without housing accommodation for the workers. A test survey of lodging accommodation was carried out early in 1940 but this revealed that insufficient voluntary loding accommodation was available to meet the anticipated expansion of the population. If, and when, new houses are built, their reservation for munition workers will create strong criticism from townspeople who have patiently avaited the keeping of the Council's promise to provide then with houses. The war commenced just when a programme of expansion was about to be undertaken by the Council. A new Civic Centre had been approved and important road widening schemes were only half completed.

#### INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

#### (a) MILK SUPPLY

The Register contains 107 dairy farms and 105 retailers of milk. The progress made during the year of bringing premises up to the standard required was fully maintained. Improvements were effected at the undermentioned farms:-

During the year 149 inspections were made.

(b) MEAT AND OTHER FOODS

There are ll slaughterhouses in use in the district, (l registered and l0 licensed). The condition of the majority of these premises is far below standard. Some are wooden structures in a dilapidated condition, insufficiently lighted and improperly drained. Only four of these slaughterhouses are connected to the sewer, the remainder have primitive drainage, making the premises unsuitable for the preparation of food. At the end of the year a special report was prepared on the premises in accordance with the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938. This report was not considered by the Health Committee until early 1940.

During the year, 1127 visits were made to slaughterhouses, shops and stalls.

#### SECTION F.

### PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIONS AND OTHER DISEASES.

1. SCARLET FEVER.

67 cases (38 males and 29 females) were notified compared with 17 in the previous year. 56 were removed to hospital and 11 were isolated at home. The disease was, on the whole, mild in type and 2 "return" cases were reported.

2. DIPHTHERIA.

46 cases (23 males and 23 females) were notified compared with 29 in the previous year. There were 3 deaths (one an evacuee) none of which had been immunised. All the cases were removed to hospital.

#### 3. TYPHOID.

One case of typhoid occurred in a schoolboy on July 22nd. He was one of a party who visited a seaside resort for the day. The scurce of the disease was traced to ice cream. No further cases resulted.

#### 4. MEASLES and WHOOPING COUGH

These were made compulsorily notifiable at the end of October, principally for the purpose of dealing with evacuees. The objection of the notification of these diseases is to reduce to a minimum exclusions from school. It is not fully realised how serious are the complications of Measles and Whooping Cough in children under 5 years. The procedure is only a temporary one as in the last war and is likely to be revoked when the evacuation problem ceases to exist. There were 48 Measle and 1 Whooping Cough

### IMMUNISATION

298 children were immunised in 1939, (of these 113 were under school age) compared with 175 in 1938. The total of immunised children in Redditch now totals 1992 (i.e. Dec. 31st 1939). The following tables show the numbers treated at the various schools in 1939:-
