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



To the Chairman and Members of the Repton Rural District Council.

Sir, Madam and Gentlemen,

The statistics contained in this Annual Report on the Health of the District for the year 1946 show that the change from war-time has had no signal effect upon the general health of the District, which remains good.

The Vital Statistics again compare favourably with the previous years, although there are increases in the deaths due to cardio-vascular disease and cancer, and these two complaints, as usual, form the main cause of decease.

The Birth-Rate shows a satisfactory increase, and the fall in Maternal Mortality is a cause for congratulation. I am grateful to the medical and nursing profession in the Council's District for their work in producing this happy state of affairs. The honour must go to them as no appeals for assistance have been forthcoming during the year.

In the Infectious Diseases, Whooping Cough has shown a marked increase but happily has not been of severe character and no deaths have occurred. Dysentery at the County Mental Hospital is less rife than in 1945. Tuberculosis shows an increase both in incidence and death.


Consideration has been given to the problem of enlisting the interest of parents in the remote parishes in Diphtheria Immunisation. To this end, we have co-operated in the "First Birthday Card" Johnme, and the effects of this measure will not appear until the next year. There is an increase in the number of children immunised over last year, and the B.M.A.Scheme of the actual immunisation being carried out by the family doctor is working well.

The pollution of wells by flooding in the Hatton, Foston, and Scropton areas has again given rise to anxiety. I am grateful to the County Medical Officer again arranging for a reduction in the fees for water analysis by the County Laboratory. It is a great pleasure to know that the County Laboratory will now undertake all the examinations both of water and public health samples free of charge under the Public Health Emergency Laboratory Service under the aegis of the Medical Research Council. This valuable assistance to the Public Health Department is much appreciated and will help greatly the preventive measures necessary for social medicine to reach higher levels.

During the year, the Staff of the department has been greatly depleted by ill-health and resignation. The loyalty and hard work of the remainder have been greatly encouraging to me, and the Council will appreciate that the satisfactory state of affairs is due to their earnest enthusiasm. I should have been helpless without them, and their diligent work throughout the difficult time of the fuel crisis is worthy of every commendation, and I should like to have the Department fully staffed before the arrival of Dr. Allan.

As this is my last Annual Report to the Council, I cannot let the occasion pass without reference to their unfailing interest in the work of the Public Health Department. Your new Medical Officer of Health will give his whole-time to Public Health, the larger part to the Repton District, part to the Swadlineote Urban District, and part to the Derby County. This appointment shows the progressive outlook of the Council, and I sincerely wish Dr. Allan the pleasure of the happy relationships I have experienced during my term of office. To the Council, the Clerk and its Officers, I express my very best thanks for their confidence and co-operation during my pleasant occupancy of the post of temporary Medical Officer of Health.

#### WATER.

During the year 63 samples of water from private wells were sent for analysis, 48 of which were from wells in flooded areas. Of these, 12 were found satisfactory, and on re-sampling, 8 more were found satisfactory. Further flooding has, however, occurred and may again have affected these wells.

## Annual Report of Engineer & Surveyor for Year ending 31st December, 1946.

#### 1. SEWERAGE DISPOSAL.

The majority of the Council's Sewage Disposal Works are in a satisfactory condition, which is verified by the analyses of the final effluents.

The Council's housing programme will necessitate the eventual enlargement of certain of the existing sewage works where large scale building operations are in progress, and in parishes where there is no sewage works the construction of a Works.

Plans are in course of preparation for Sewage Disposal Works at the undermentioned parishes:-

#### Egginton.

The Council have recently taken over a small sewage disposal works situated in the grounds of Egginton Hall. It is proposed to re-sewer the whole village and treat the foul sewage at the above Works, which will be enlarged to deal with the increased flow.

#### Hilton.

Sewage from a part of the village at present is discharging into the Hilton Brook. It is proposed to re-sewer the whole village and direct the sewage to the existing War Department Sewage Works situated within the grounds of the War Department Camp.

An agreement has been made with the War Office for the Council to take over the Sewage Works, and carry out any necessary additions, and treat the sewage together with that from the Camp.

#### Notherseal and Overseal. .

Plans are in course of preparation for the re-sewering of the village of Netherseal, and treat the sewage jointly with that from Overseal at one disposal works. The existing sewage works at Overseal is overloaded, and the Council have been informed that this Works will be affected through mining subsidence within the next few years. Consequently this Works will become redundant when the new Works is constructed.

During April and May, 1946, considerable subsidence took place at Woodville Road, Overseal, necessitating the road to be raised by the Derbyshire County Council approximately 4 feet. This subsidence caused the foul sewers to sink, preventing the sewage from the houses being drained to the disposal works. The affected sewers were taken out and relayed in cast-iron pipes, so that in case of further subsidence the sewer can be raised to the limit of allowing the houses to be drained, and the cast-iron pipes raised.

#### Coton-in-the-Elms .

A small disposal works has been constructed to treat the sewage from a total of 20 new houses, six of which now discharge their sewage to this Works.

#### Rosliston.

The Council have taken over a small disposal works, which has been enlarged to treat sewage from 20 houses in addition to the existing Prisoner of War Camp.

#### SEWERAGE DISPOSAL (contd).

#### Drakelow Sewage Scheme.

Plans have been prepared for the treatment of the sewage from the whole of the village of Coton-in-the-Elms and Rosliston in one Disposal Works, together with the sewage from Cauldwell and Walton-on-Trent.

Owing to mining subsidence in the Southern Area of the Rural District, the existing irrigation area at Linton has subsided, and owing to the likelihood of the disposal works at Castle Gresley and Coton Park subsiding in the future, the Council contemplate concentrating the sewage from the whole of their Southern Area to one Sewage Disposal Works at Drakelow Pool. Circumstances have since arisen such as the intention of the Electricity Commissioners to propose to erect an Electricity Station on the identical site chosen for the Disposal Works (also the Ministry of Health Circular dated 12th May, 1947, which states it is generally uneconomical to provide centralised sewage disposal works unless the properties to be drained lie fairly close together, and that the Council should consider the construction of a number of small disposal works for groups of 20 or more houses).

The above matters are being carefully considered, in view of the mining subsidence taking place in the area.

#### Castle Gresley.

During heavy rain storms the foul sewer overflowed at the manhole opposite to Messrs. Bonas Ltd. factory, and in order to avoid this occurrence a 6" sewer was laid to divert the sewage from the Mount Pleasant area direct to the existing 9" sewer in Linton Road.

Since this diversion has been carried out no further complaints have been received.

#### Bretby Lane, Bretby.

In order to abate a sewage nuisance from existing cesspools to 8 houses in Bretby Lane, Bretby, the Council propose to lay a 6" foul sewer from the existing manhole at the rear of the houses situated on the Northern side of Bretby Lane. The length of the proposed sewer is 218 yards.

#### . EFFECT OF FLOODS.

#### Parishes of Scropton and Hatton.

Intensive rainfall in the upper reaches of the River Dove during February caused the River to rise to such an extent as to overflow its banks and flood the villages of Scropton and Hatton. The flood waters also isolated the Scropton Lane pumping station, and rose to such a height as to submerge the pumps and put them out of action.

The Council are investigating this matter with the authorities concerned, with a view to minimising the flooding.

#### Parishes of Willington and Egginton.

Portions of these villages became flooded during heavy rains. The flooding is usually caused by the rise of the River Trent and the water backing up the brooks flowing into it and overflowing over the roads and adjoining land. Measurements of the height of the February flood taken at the Willington Sewage Pumping Station revealed the river rose to a height of 10 feet above the normal summer level.

#### 3. WATER SUPPLY.

Piped water supplies are provided by the following water undertakings to the undermentioned Parishes. The whole of these water supplies are chlorinated, and no adverse reports have been received as to their quality.

The waters vary in hardness from 18 to 40, and no plumbosolvent action is experienced.

The quantity of water available is generally sufficient to meet the demand, with the exception of the supply to Woodville from the Smisby well.

#### Parish of Woodville.

This water scheme supplies water to 80 houses situated in the Ashby Urban District area in addition to the parish of Woodville, and as the yield from the Council's Smisby well is insufficient for the demand, water is purchased in bulk from the Swadlincote & Ashby Joint Water Board, whose supply in turn is inadequate.

Proposals for an adequate supply of water to Woodville have been submitted to the Hinistry of Health.

#### Parish of Overseal.

The supply to this village is adequate, the water being purchased in bulk from the South Staffordshire Waterworks Company off their trunk main passing through the village.

#### Parish of Hartshorne.

This supply is obtained from a spring situated in "Several Woods", and is satisfactory.

#### Parish of Hatton.

This supply is purchased in bulk from the Tutbury Rural District Council.

Owing to the demand of the Tutbury Rural District Council, and the number of new houses that will require a supply in the near future, any increase of the supply to the Parish of Hatton cannot be anticipated from this source.

The Council have therefore included this parish to be supplied with water from the proposed Dalbury Lees and District Water Scheme.

#### Parish of Ticknall.

The yield and quality of this supply is satisfactory.

The existing oil engine is continually requiring attention, and the Council propose to replace this engine at the first opportunity.

#### Dalbury Lees & District Water Scheme.

A piped water scheme to supply the 12 Northern parishes has been submitted to the Ministry of Health. The water will be supplied through the Belper Rural District Council's mains, and purchased in bulk from the Derwent Valley Water Board. The mains will be from 9" to 3" in diameter, and of sufficient size to satisfy the N.F.S. requirements in case of fire, in addition to all the farm within the area, the length of the mains being 46 miles.

#### Smisby Water Scheme.

A piped water scheme for the village of Smisby has been submitted to the Ministry of Health.

The mains will be 3" diameter, and the water obtained from the Council's Smisby well.

#### MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS) ORDER, 1936.

There are 17 farms in the Repton Rural District registered with the Derbyshire County Council as producers of Tuberculin Tested milk, and there are 140 farms registered with that Authority for producing Accredited milk; also there is a dairy registered with the Repton Rural District Council for pasteurising milk.

During the year nine supplementary licences were granted to milk retailers from premises outside the Rural District, to retail various kinds of designated milks within the District.

- 1. Heat-treated milk is produced in bulk at the Wilts United Dairies, Ltd., Egginton Depot, and samples of this milk are taken twice monthly for Phosphatase test and Methylene Blue test; these samples are also reported to the Ministry of Food, who pay the Council for examining the samples. During the year 24 such samples were taken by this Council's Inspector.
- 2. Burton-on-Trent Corporation farm at Etwall, and Derby Corporation farm at Mickleover, are licensed by the Ministry of Health for the production of Accredited and Tuberculin Tested milks, and the Inspector takes samples there on the Council's instructions for the Ministry. Fourteen such samples were taken during the year.
- 3. During the year 24 samples of Pasteurised milk were taken from Park Farm Dairies, Ticknall, and one of the samples did not pass the Phosphatase test as being adequately pasteurised. The owner of the pasteurising establishment was interviewed in regard to inadequate pasteurising, and all samples taken since have been satisfactory.
