

To the Chairman and Members of the Repton Rural District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1952.

The vital statistics and clinical observations show that the general health of the people of the District remains good.

Cver the year the incidence of infectious disease has been comparatively slight, and even the small incidence was mostly Measles of a mild nature, so that out of a total of 178 cases only 4 were admitted to Hospital. From the table recorded under Diphtheria Immunisation in the body of the report, it will be seen that the remarkable decline in Diphtheria deaths and cases has continued. Once again it is gratifying to report that not a single case of Diphtheria was notified from the Rural District during the year. The very success of the Immunisation Campaign raises a difficulty, for obviously, cases are rarely seen (about 60,000 doctors practice in these islands, and there are less than 400 cases of Diphtheria per year) and therefore liable to be missed and, moreover, there is a great danger of public complacency and indifference regarding immunisation. Diphtheria can be eradicated from these islands, but only by continued and concerted efforts by all concerned, especially parents. Doctors know from experience that Diphtheria still kills and they cannot become complacent, but they will need to become more vocal in order to correct the tendency to complacency in the parents and the general public.

The Central Council for Health Education, which has been so ably supported by the Council over the years, reports that the numbers of posters, leaflets, etc. distributed, has diminished, and some of the reduction is no doubt due to economies, but surely these are false economies. A recent Ministry report showed that £30,000 spent on Diphtheria Immunisation Publicity saved the Country £3,000,000. It is obvious, therefore, that much more could be achieved by comprehensive health education.

During the year the Council has carried on their re-housing policy with energy and vigour, and I know full well that the Chest Physician greatly appreciates your assistance with his special tuberculous households, and this re-housing greatly promotes the prevention of the disease. In this connection, it is encouraging to see our work against the larger background of the World Health Organisation's report on tuberculosis mortality, which stated that in 21 countries (including the United Kingdom) with 404.4 million inhabitants in 1950, tuberculosis mortality dropped by about half since 1936. On account of this, 434,000 persons continue to live who would have died during the same period if the 1936-8 conditions had continued without improvement.

The Chief Sanitary Inspector has written an able and detailed account of his work, and there is also a valuable and comprehensive report by the Engineer & Surveyor. I am deeply indebted to both of them for their reports, for it is only by means of this composite report that a true picture of the environmental and personal factors influencing the health of the people can be obtained.

Within the report there is a list of the County Council Clinics given by Dr. Morgan, County Medical Officer of Health.

Once again it is a great pleasure to take the opportunity of thanking the Chairman and Members of the Council, General Practitioners, Health Visitors, heads of departments and staffs, particularly, of course, all the staff of the Public Health Department, especially the Chief Sanitary Inspector.

Annual Report of Engineer & Surveyor for Year ending 31st December, 1952.

1) SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The following Sewage Disposal Schemes have been submitted to the Ministry of Housing and Local Government and immediately approval is received, the Council will invite tenders and commence the work at the earliest opportunity: -

Netherseal, Ticknall, Joint Scheme for Coton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston and Cauldwell, Hilton, Walton-on-Trent, Newton Solney and Woodville.

The following Sewage Disposal Schemes are in course of preparation: -

Etwall, Mickleover (The Bunkers) Repton and Findern.

All the above Schemes are necessary owing to the Council's Housing Schemes and the present system is overloaded.

Mining Subsidence - Parishes of Overseal, Castle Gresley and Linton.

The sixteen Council Houses in Burton Road, Castle Gresley sank to such an extent that the foul drains were below the foul sewer in the road.

In order to cope with the sewage it was necessary to relay the 6" foul sewer at the rear of the houses and connect it to a small Pumping Station, which was also erected at the rear of the houses, having duplicate pumps, each delivering 15 G.P.M. to the nearest high point of the existing foul sewer.

The work was carried out in conjunction with the National Coal Board and is at present working satisfactorily.

Owing to mining subsidence adjacent Castle Gresley Railway Station, the Council were required to construct a Sewage Pumping Station to pump the sewage to a manhole beyond the affected area.

The Pumping Station came into operation in September, 1949. On the 1st July, 1952 investigations after the effects of a heavy thunderstorm revealed that further mining subsidence had dropped the Pumping Station another 5' 6" and that when pumping during rainy periods the sewage overflows at two manholes.

The length of the pumping main laid in 1949 was 60 yards, this further subsidence requires a new 6" diameter pumping main 450 yards long and to be laid slung inside a 5 ft. diameter culvert passing under the railway.

Permission is awaited from the British Railways to lay the pumping main and approval of the Ministry is awaited to proceed with the scheme.

The National Coal Board state that a maximum subsidence of a further 3 ft. must be expected during the next five years.

Linton South Sewage Irrigation Area.

The result of subsidence is continually causing difficulty with the treatment of the sewage and the Council have again approached the National Coal Board with a view to finding a successful means of disposal of the sewage by means of pumping to either the Coton Park or the Castle Gresley Sewage Disposal Works. The Council are anxiously awaiting any information from the Coal Board.

Report of Engineer & Surveyor (Cont'd.)

SEWAGE DISPOSAL (Cont'd.)

Parish of Findern.

A 9" defective foul sewer has been re-laid at the rear of eighteen houses fronting Rykneld Street. As continual complaints were being received of sewage nuisance from cesspools at four houses adjacent, the sewer was continued in 6" diameter to include these houses also.

Parish of Hartshorne.

A defective 4" diameter foul drain was replaced with a 6" sewer to abate a continual sewage nuisance from six houses.

2) WATER SUPPLY.

The quantity and quality of the water supply to those parishes having a piped water supply continues to be satisfactory, with the exception of the Parish of Woodville, where the yield from the Smisby Well is insufficient to meet the demand. The total amount consumed by the Parish of Woodville which includes 104 houses situated along Ashby Road within the Parish of Hartshorne and the Urban District of Ashby was 43,368,000 gallons.

The amount pumped from the Smisby Well during the year was 16,690,000 gallons, the remainder was purchased in bulk from the Swadlincote and Ashby Joint Water Board. The whole of the Council's piped water supplies are chlorinated. The hardness varies from 18 to 40 and no plumbo-solvent action is experienced.

Parish of Ticknall.

This Scheme has been satisfactory since the Well was lowered and the new Pumping Station erected in 1951. No shortage has been experienced.

The average amount pumped per day being 14,300 gallons.

Parish of Hartshorne.

The water supply for the Parish of Hartshorne is obtained from a Spring in "Several Woods" from whence it flows to a 20,000 gallon capacity Reservoir. The maximum amount available is 32,000 G.P.D., and when the Housing Estate of 43 Houses now in course of erection in Sandcliffe Road is completed it is expected the demand will have reached the maximum yield.

Northern Area Water Scheme.

The 36 miles of mains ranging from 3" to 9" diameter laid under this Scheme have been completed and brought into service. The Village of Hatton was dis-connected from the Tutbury R.D.C. supply and re-connected to this Scheme. 264 properties in the remaining 11 parishes have already been connected and applications for connections are continually being received. The total number of properties already connected is 630.

Difficulty in obtaining the necessary steel for the construction of the Water Tower (capacity 62,500 gallons) has prevented its construction. It is however expected to be able to construct the Reservoir during 1953.

Report of Engineer and Surveyor (cont'd.)

WATER SUPPLY (cont'd.)

At the present time the water flows through the main to the Booster Area by gravity, but should the properties continue to be connected, a time will come when the daily demand will be so great that the water will not pass over the high point.

Should this eventually occur before the Water Tower is built the Council propose to erect a Stand Pipe at the high point of the Booster Area and pump the water through the Stand Pipe.

Mining Subsidence.

The Council have been required to repair three breakages on the 6" main at Overseal and one on the 3" main at Woodville, due to the effects of mining subsidence.

3) HOUSING.

The number of Council Houses approved by the Ministry of Housing and Local Government up to the 31st December, 1952 is 938.

The number of houses completed is 846.

To the Chairman and Members of the Repton Rural District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit the Annual Report on the sanitary circumstances, and the work undertaken by this Department, in the combined Northern and Southern Districts of the area, for the year ending 31st December, 1952.

The work of the department has proceeded smoothly during the year, and steady progress has been maintained.

Considerable time and effort has been expended in dealing with damage due to mining subsidence, and more particularly with regard to broken drains and sewers in the Castle Gresley area. On these occasions emergency operations are immediately put into effect, and in this connection, your Council's cesspool emptying machine has rendered invaluable service.

The scavenging of the area is administered by your Public Health Department, and I am pleased to report that, considering the size of the district, very few complaints regarding the service have been received in the year under review.

With the Northern Area Water Scheme nearing completion, the district as a whole, so far as it relates to the provision of a piped supply of water, can be regarded as very satisfactory.

I regret that I cannot report similar progress in the provision of sewage disposal schemes in the various parishes of the district.

During the year 11 houses, the subject of demolition orders, were demolished and the sites cleared.

The maintainance of cottage property still presents a difficult problem, due in large measure to the continuance of the Rents Restriction Acts without modification. Statutory action against owners of property is only recommended as a last resort.

Mr. E. F. Kelly was appointed as Additional Sanitary Inspector, and commenced duties with your Council on the 4th February, 1952.

In presenting this report, I would take the opportunity of recording the assistance and support I have received from the Chairman and Members of the Health and Public Works Committee, the Clerk to the Council, the Medical Officer of Health, and Inspectorial and clerical members of the Public Health Department.

I would also express my appreciation for the efficient and loyal services rendered by your foreman, Mr. C. Stanley, whose efforts have in large measure contributed to the smooth running of the scavenging services.

SCAVENGING.

During the year collections were maintained, and the whole of the scavenging services are now carried out by direct labour, all contract work being finally discontinued in 1951.

All refuse disposal tips were regularly inspected throughout

the year, and no fires have occurred.

At one disposal point in the Southern Area, some trouble was experienced due to an infestation of crickets, and to combat these pests, regular treatment of the tipping area by an approved dressing was carried out during the season.

The fortnightly collection of house refuse over the whole area is generally satisfactory, but in certain mining parishes in the Southern Area complaints were received that a fortnightly collection was inadequate. Arrangements are being made to give these parishes a collection every 10 days during the winter months.

SALVAGE COLLECTION .

Although the collection of waste paper continued on a reduced scale throughout the year, difficulty has been experienced in its disposal. At the end of the year approximately 40 tons was in store at the scavenging depot. This salvaged paper will be disposed of when the market is restored.

ANTI-LITTER COMPAIGN.

Litter bins have been fixed in the following additional parishes:- Hartshorne, Overseal, Netherseal, Linton, Walton-on-Trent, and Woodville.

Regular emptyings are made by the scavenging teams.

ICE CREAM

There were no new premises registered for the manufacture of Ice Cream during the year. Seventeen premises were added to the register of ice cream retailers.

Forty-one samples of Ice Cream were taken for bacteriological examination. One sample was placed in Grade 3, and was classed as unsatisfactory under the provisional Methylene Blue Test.

Where samples have proved unsatisfactory, the matter has been immediately followed up and advice given. With regard to unsatisfactory samples obtained from ice cream manufactured outside the area, the appropriate Authority has been notified.

FISH AND CHIP PREMISES.

No alteration recorded during the year.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES.

During the year the number of slaughter-house licences granted was 22, and the number of licences granted to slaughter-men was 56.

There was also one licence issued for the registration of a knacker's yard.

Apart from the issue of licences to self-suppliers of pigs, the only slaughtering of animals for human food in the Rural District is carried out at a licensed slaughter-house at the Pastures Hospital, Mickleover, where pigs, calves, and an occasional fat beast, are slaughtered from their own farm stock, by arrangement with the Ministry of Food. All other slaughtering is carried out at public abattoirs in Burton-on-Trent and Derby, and despatched to two distributing centres, one in the Northern part of the district and one in the Southern.

INFESTATION ORDER, 1943. PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The Council have the services of a full-time Rodent Operator, and routine inspections were made on all refuse tips and sewage works in the district. Also all sewers were treated according to the methods recommended by the Ministry of Food; only minor infestations were found, and these places were given a second treatment.

A large number of private properties were inspected, and advice given on the best methods to deal with those very minor infestations. In some cases the treatment was carried out by the Rodent Operator.

During the year the new poison "Warfarin" was tried on Egginton Tip and found to be successful.

THE PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS (THRESHING & DISMANTLING OF RICKS) REGULATIONS, 1950.

One successful prosecution was instituted against a threshing contractor, for none compliance of the above regulations during the year.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.
