To the Chairman & Members of the River Blyth Port Health Authority.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present my Annual Report of the work of the River Blyth Port Health Authority for the year 1940.

For the same reasons explained in the Report for 1939, this Report is again presented in a greatly reduced form.

In the early part of 1940, cases were admitted to your infectious disease hospital, but after 23rd June 1940, when the hospital premises were let to the local voluntary hospital, for use as an annex, infectious diseases cases have been admitted, by previous arrangement, to the Newcastle Borough Isolation Hospital.

Not infrequently, the necessary gangways are not available to enable your officers to cross ships to reach a vessel which they intend to inspect, indeed on one such occasion, due to his having to scramble aboard one vessel from another without the use of a gangway, one of the officers found himself suspended between the sides of two adjacent ships. The Board of Trade requires gangways to be placed at the convenience of inspecting officials, otherwise an unnecessary element of risk is incurred.

#### CASES OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE LANDED

Two cases of mumps were treated in your own hospital and two cases of measles and one of Epidemic Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis were removed to Newcastle.

Both cases of mumps occurred on one ship, but the three other patients were crew of different vessels.

Below is given a list of illnesses occurring among the crews of vessels arriving in the Port, and which were boarded by the Medical Officer of Health or Sanitary Inspector, or both. It will be noted that more cases of V.D. had to be directed to the appropriate clinic than were reported in the 1939 report.

## MEASURES AGAINST RODENTS.

7 ships were fumigated with SO2 and H.C.N. and a total of 161 rats were recovered. Traps were set on two ships and 30 rats were caught.

After one of the fumigations 36 mice were recovered.

5 rats were caught from Docks, quays, wharves, and warehouses.

Several rats were submitted for expert Bacteriological examination but in no instance was evidence of disease reported.

The 76 certificates issued included 69 exemptions for deratisation and 7 deratisation.

# HYGIENE OF CREW'S SPACES.

35 structural defects were reported and repairs carried out, this was found satisfactory, also 63 other conditions to health were corrected before the vessels left port.

12 vessels were dealt with for bug and cockroach infestation, the method employed was chiefly fumigation, occasionally insecticides are recommended where infestation is not very marked.

35 vessels were boarded by your officers on account of ships coming directly or indirectly from foreign ports, infected or suspected of being infected with Cholera, Plague, Yellow Fever, or Typhus Fever.
