The Port Medical Officer is notified of all alien passengers, including stowaways arriving in the Port and arrangements are made for the Medical Officer to examine them on board before they are allowed to disembark.

(4) Nature and amount of Aliens traffic:

The majority of alien passengers arriving in the Port are pleasure visitors to this country, chiefly from the Scandinavian countires. A number also arrive regularly from Denmark bound for the Far East. These passengers are granted temporary shore leave during the vessel's stay in Middlesbrough. Stowaways occasionally arrive from West African ports.

The total number of aliens arriving in the Port during the year was 555, excluding alien passengers arriving but not landing at the Port.

(5) Accommodation for medical inspection and examination:

Aliens are generally examined on board, but accommodation is available at the Health Department, 26, Southfield Road, if it should be required. 186 landed at Middlesbrough during the year. In addition 369 alien passengers not landing at Middlesbrough were granted temporary shore leave.

LAUNCH "MERCIE II".

The motor launch "Mercie II" continues to give satisfactory service and is invaluable to the medical and inspectorial staff, particularly for visiting vessels moored at the buoys in the river, and for landing sick persons.

FOOD INSPECTION.

Consignments of foodstuffs have been systematically examined during the year. These consisted of:—Canned meats, canned fruit, meat paste, fruit pulp, cheese, margarine, lard, onions, apples, pears, dates, rice, currants, syrup, confectionery, biscuits, tea, prunes, chocolate, sardines, figs, coffee, cucumbers, lettuce, cabbages, cooking fat, nuts, butter, desiccated coconut, tomatoes, grapefruit, sausages, eggs, cauliflowers, icecream, canned fish, sugar, and general groceries.

They were all in good condition at the time of inspection.

It was not found necessary to take any action under the Public Health (Imported Food) Regulations 1937, the Public Health (Imported Milk) Regulations 1926, and the Public Health (Preservatives, etc., in Food) Regulations 1925-1940.

A sample of imported strawberry pulp was obtained and submitted for analysis. The analyst's report stated that the sulphur dioxide preservative contained was within the prescribed limits.

Twenty-two samples of water were obtained from ships and water boats supplying water to ships. Most of these were satisfactory. When otherwise, the waterboat or ship was instructed to clean the tank out and a fresh sample was then taken.

Eleven samples of crushed bones from India were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for analysis. In none of these samples was any trace of Anthrax found.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PEST ACT, 1949.

16 Rodent Control Certificates were issued to coasting vessels under this Act.
