SHIP CLEARANCES—3,732.

Ship Clearances during the year ended 31st October, 1961, totalled 3,732, a decrease of 338 on the comparable period for 1960.

NET REGISTERED TONNAGE-5,770,076 N.R. Tons.

The Net Registered Tonnage of vessels which cleared the Ports of the Tees during 1961 totalled 5,770,076 tons, a decrease of 441,187 tons on the comparable period for 1960.

IMPORTS-5,421,351 Tons.

The total volume of Imports to the Tees during 1961 amounted to 5,421,351 tons, a decrease of 783,254 tons on the comparable period for 1960. Principal decreases were in the importations of Iron Ore, Coal and Scrap.

EXPORTS-1,549,153 Tons.

The total volume of Exports from the Tees during 1961 amounted to 1,549,153 tons; the comparable figure for last year being 1,536,418 tons. Decreases in the export of Iron and Steel Manufactures and Sulphate of Ammonia, were offset by an increase in the exportation of Slag.

The total volume of IMPORTS and EXPORTS to and from the Ports of the Tees during 1961 amounted to 6,970,504 tons. The comparable figure for 1960 being 7,741,023 tons.

MERCHANT SEAMEN TREATED AT THE SPECIAL TREATMENT CENTRE, MIDDLESBROUGH GENERAL HOSPITAL DURING 1961.

(Kindly supplied by the Consultant in charge).

During the year 1961, the number of seamen receiving treatment or investigation for venereal disease at this clinic continued to rise to a total of 236 an increase of 22% over the previous year. The cases are sub-divided as follows:

British Seamen	 	102
British Commonwealth	 	41
Foreign Seamen	 	93

Of the above number, 201 cases gave a recent history of exposure to possible infection and received initial investigation and treatment at the clinic. The total number of cases attending have been classified by country and in cases of fresh infection by disease.

The incidence of acute gonorrhoea in merchant seamen attending doubled over the previous year.

It is noteworthy that during the year 19 male cases of gonorrhoea showing varying resistance to antibiotics were dealt with at the clinic and of those cases 15 were M.N. seamen who had acquired their infection in Brazil and had been treated aboard their ships by non-medical personnel with a variety of antibiotics drugs in a variety of doses varying from a few hundred thousand units to several million. This practice would seem to indicate how resistant strains of Gonorrhoea are being introduced into the British ports and it would be wise to ensure that all seamen who have been treated for suspected venereal disease aboard ships, on arrival in port should go to an authorised V.D. Centre for examination.

- 3. Organisation of work:

The Port Medical Officer is notified of all alien passengers, including stowaways arriving in the Port and arrangements are made for a medical officer to examine them on board before they are allowed to disembark.

4. Nature and amount of aliens traffic :

The majority of alien passengers arriving in the Port are pleasure visitors to this Country, chiefly from the Scandinavian countries. A number also arrive regularly from Denmark bound for the Far East. These passengers are granted temporary shore leave during the vessel's stay in Middlesbrough. Stowaways occasionally arrive from West African ports.

The total number of alien passengers arriving in the Port during the year was 572 (including temporary shore leave passengers).

5. Accommodation for medical inspection and examination:

Aliens are generally examined on board, but accommodation is available at the Health Department, 26 Southfield Road, if it should be required. 561 alien passengers landed at the Port during the year. In addition 11 alien passengers not landing in Middlesbrough were granted temporary shore leave.

One stowaway was refused permission to land.

SECTION XVI.-MISCELLEANOUS.

Arrangements for the burial on shore of persons who have died on board ship from infectious disease:

Dead bodies of persons who had died on board from infectious disease would be removed to the mortuary at West Lane Isolation Hospital, whence they would be buried.

LAUNCH "MERCIE II".

The motor launch "Mercie" II continues to give satisfactory service. The gear box was dismantled and removed to Gardner's representatives at Newcastle for a thorough overhaul and certain parts were renewed. It was the first time the gear box had been dismantled since the vessel was built in 1948.

FOOD INSPECTION.

Consignments of imported food have been systematically examined during the year. These consisted of: Ham, luncheon meat, Vienna sausage, butter, onions, lettuce, dried peas, lemons, evaporated milk, canned chicken, crab, salmon, pineapple, tomatoes, cucumber, pears, carrots, sugar, potatoes, cheese, tea, fruit pulp, gooseberries, syrup, sago flour, tapioca and desiccated coconut.

During the year 180 samples of desiccated coconut were taken from 37 cargoes. With the exception of one cargo these proved to be negative for salmonella contamination. Three bags from one cargo which were positive for salmonella contamination were condemned and destroyed.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PEST ACT, 1949.

Again, no rodent control certificates were issued during the year. All coasting vessels arriving in the Port were in possession of an international deratting or deratting exemption certificate.

The amount of shipping entering the Port during the year showed a decrease over the previous year: 3,054 ships against 3,502 in 1960. Comparison with 1938 is given below.
