

To: THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE RIVER TEES PORT HEALTH AUTHORITY.

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1969.

This Report has been prepared in accordance with the various directions from the Department of Health and Social Security.

During the year, 4,198 ships entered the Port which showed an increase of 208 as compared with the previous year. At the same time there is a trend towards larger ships and this is illustrated by the fact that in 1959 2,873 ships arrived with a net tonnage of 4,940,029, whereas in the current year the 4,198 ships had a net tonnage of 8,854,587.

Discussion took place with H.M. Customs and the Harbour Master to the Tees and Hartlepools Port Authority on Standing Exemptions and Mooring Stations. Details of the discussions are included in this report and the River Tees Port Health Authority have approached the Department of Health and Social Security in respect of the limits of the Port which were laid down in the River Tees Port Sanitary Order of 1886. These limits are now totally outdated and inadequate for the size of shipping using the Port today.

The need for a launch to replace "Mercie II" also came under consideration during the year and as an experiment the launch was laid up for six months to see if the normal work of the inspectors could be carried out without it. The final decision on this will be taken during the current year.

Mr. Thomas J. Warwick retired as Rodent Searcher after giving 37 years to the Authority and we wish him many happy years in retirement.

I would like to record my appreciation to Chief Inspector G. A. Richards and his Staff for their loyal and conscientious service.

The co-operation and valuable assistance given by the staff of the Tees and Hartle-pools Port Authority, H.M. Customs, Immigration Officers, and the Tees Pilotage Authority, has been greatly appreciated.

Once again I would like to record my appreciation of the help and encouragement of the Chairman and Members of the Port Health Authority.

THE TEESSIDE ORDER, 1967

ARTICLE 32

- 1. In the River Tees Port Sanitary Order (1925 (b), for the second schedule-
 - (a) in article 5(1)(a) for "the number of members of the joint board shall be increased to twenty-five" there shall be substituted "the number of members of the joint board shall be seventeen."
 - (b) for the second schedule thereto there shall be substituted the schedule set out in Schedule 9.
- 2. The members of the River Tees Port Health Authority other than the members appointed by the council of the county borough of Hartlepool shall retire on the appointed day. Members shall be appointed by the new county borough council to come into office on the appointed day and to hold office until 4th June, 1969.
- 3. If the Hartlepool Order 1966 is not approved by a resolution of each House of Parliament paragraph (2) and Schedule 9 shall have effect with the substitution for the "council of the County borough of Hartlepool" of "the rural district council of Stockton."
- 4. Article 59 of the County of Durham Review Order 1936(c) and article 54 of the County of Durham Review Order 1937 (d) shall cease to have effect.
- 5. The River Tees Port Sanitary Order 1925, the River Tees Port Health Amendment Order 1938(e), the Port Health Authorities (Election and Retirement of Members) Order 1950(f) and this article may be cited together as the River Tees Port Health Orders 1925 to 1967.

SECTION V-WATER SUPPLY

One hundred and Sixty four samples of drinking water were taken from vessels and hydrants. Nineteen samples of drinking water taken from vessels and submitted for bacteriological examination proved to be unsatisfactory. In each instance when the vessel was still in port the Master was notified and the necessary measures taken to ensure a potable supply. In the case of vessels not returning to the Tees the owner and/or next ports were advised of the unsatisfactory conditions prevailing.

There are no water boats in service on the Tees. Some of the tugs used at the port are fitted with suitable fresh water tanks and are available to supply drinking water to ships that have been delayed at anchorage in Tees Bay.

MERCHANT SEAMEN TREATED AT THE SPECIAL TREATMENT CENTRE, MIDDLESBROUGH GENERAL HOSPITAL DURING THE YEAR 1969.

(Kindly supplied by the Consultant in Charge)

The number of British seamen attending for treatment or observation was almost identical to the previous year. A rise in the numbers of Commonwealth and Foreign seamen was noted (159 as against 122 during 1968).

SYPHILIS.

Three cases of Primary Syphilis diagnosed during 1969 were German seamen who had acquired their infection outside the United Kingdom. One of these patients admitted to having had intercourse with a local girl before treatment. The contact was traced and she was persuaded to attend for examination. No evidence of infection was found and after completing a period of observation she was regarded as being free from infection.

Two of these cases of syphilis were given intensive courses of penicillin therapy as In-patients before being repatriated, the third was given initial treatment at this clinic, issued with a travelling book and advised to leave his ship on arrival at his home port of Hamburg. There he could complete his treatment.

GONORRHOEA.

57 cases of Gonorrhoea were diagnosed and some of the new cases shown as 'other conditions' may have had a gonococcal infection. Treatment given on board ship prior to their attendance—an increasing practice—invalidated microscopic examination carried out at the clinic except in cases of those patients infected with resistant strains of Gonorrhoea.

23 of the gonorrhoea cases had acquired their infection at places outside the United Kingdom, 7 at other ports in this country and the remaining 27 have a history of having had recent exposure to possible infection on Teesside. Ten female patients attended with contact chits issued to seamen suffering from gonorrhoea. A further 14 female cases of gonorrhoea gave as their possible source of infection seamen with whom they had had intercourse whilst the ships were in this port.

SECTION XIV—PUBLIC HEALTH (SHELLFISH) REGULATIONS 1934 and 1948

The Regulations refer to the gathering and sale for human consumption of shell-fish which may be infected.

In 1932 the River Tees Port Health Authority made Regulations under the Public Health Act, 1896, prohibiting the sale of or offering for sale any mussels, cockles, periwinkles or other shell-fish taken from within the District, unless and until such shell-fish have been relaid for such a period as may be directed.

There are no beds laid in the Tees estuary. The River Police keep the collecting of shell-fish from the banks of the river under observation.

All shell-fish in the area are liable to pollution. No action has been taken during the year under the above Regulations or the Food and Drugs Act, 1955.

3. Organisation of Work:

The Port Medical Officer is notified of all alien passengers, including stowaways arriving in the Port and arrangements are made for a medical officer to examine them on board before they are allowed to disembark.

4. Nature and amount of aliens traffic :

The majority of alien passengers arriving in the Port are pleasure visitors to this Country, chiefly from Scandinavia, Germany and Holland.

The total number of alien passengers arriving in the Port during the year was 1,176.

It was not necessary to issue any Certificates in respect of persons of unsound mind during the year.

5. Accommodation for Medical Inspection and Examination.

Aliens are generally examined onboard, but accommodation is available at the Health Department, Teesside House, 108a Borough Road, Middlesbrough, Teesside, for the examination of individual cases. Where ships crews were involved these would be directed to Newlands Clinic, Newlands Road, Middlesbrough, Teesside for examination.

LAUNCH "MERCIE II"

At the July 1969 meeting of the Authority the question arose as to whether a launch was now a vital necessity to the Port Health Service in view of the decreasing number of ships now proceeding direct from sea to a buoy berth, and also the fact that a number of buoy berths have now been withdrawn from service and are not likely to be relaid.

The size of the present day tankers and also a large number of ore carriers is such that they are now too large. both in length and draft to be accommodated at any of the remaining sets of buoys in the river. In addition all riverside quays and docks have excellent road facilities and access no longer presents any problems as it did in former years.

Accordingly the members of the Authority decided to lay up the launch for a trial period of six months as from the 1st August, 1969. the coxswain be retained working on a maintenance basis.

At the end of the trial period a final decision will be made as to whether or not the purchase of new launch is warranted. The outcome of this decision and that of the Department will be contained in the next Annual Report.

FOOD INSPECTION

Container traffic to the Tees continues to expand, regular services now use the port from Rozenburg, Rotterdam, Antwerp, Helsinki.

Systematic inspection of imported food has been carried on throughout the year. These consisted of various canned meats, Butter, Cheese, Chocolate, various canned fruits, sweets, Onions, Cauliflower in brine, Ghurkins in brine, Raspberry, Strawberry and Blackcurrant fruit pulps. Preserved Ginger, Mango in brine, Rice, Hog Casings and Apple puree.

Results in all cases were negative for food poisoning organisms.

No rodent control certificates were issued during the year. With two exceptions all coasting vessels arriving in the Port were in possession of international deratting or deratting exemption certificates.

CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956. DARK SMOKE (PERMITTED PERIODS) (VESSELS) REGULATIONS, 1958.

During the year there were five instances of vessels emitting dark smoke during their stay in port.

In each case the nuisance was promptly abated after warning notice had been given. In summarizing the general emission of smoke it is found the largest amounts of smoke fall in the category of dark smoke or less and the periods of emission are less than those allowed by the Regulations. When black smoke has been observed enquiries have revealed that the cause is mainly due to mechanical breakdown, dirty burners, fan adjustment or inexperience by a minor member of the engine room staff.
