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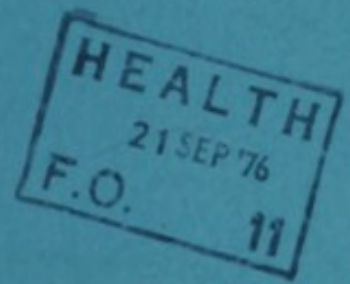

To: The Chairman and Members of The
River Tees Port Health Authority.

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1975.

As you will see there has been a reduction of ships arriving in the port to the extent of 302 vessels and slightly over one millions tons less than used the port last year. This is no doubt due to the general economic recession in world trade during 1975.

During the year we have seen the opening of the pipeline delivering oil direct from the North Sea with the result that the River Tees has now become an oil exporting port. I think we can look forward to a substantial increase in shipping due to this important development.

I should also like to record my gratitude to the staff of the Tees and Hartlepool Port Authority, H.M. Customs and Excise, Immigration Officers and the Tees Pilotage Authority for their help and co-operation, and I must pay tribute to the invaluable work of Mr. K. Abigail, Clerk to the Authority and his staff.

Finally, I take this opportunity of thanking personally you, Mr. Chairman, and Members of the Port Health Authority, for your support and encouragement throughout the year.

THE TEESSIDE ORDER, 1967**ARTICLE 32**

1. In the River Tees Port Sanitary Order (1925(b)), for the second schedule—
 - (a) in article 5(1)(a) for “the number of members of the joint board shall be increased to twenty-five” there shall be substituted “the number of members of the joint board shall be seventeen.”
 - (b) for the second schedule thereto there shall be substituted the schedule set out in Schedule 9.
2. The members of the River Tees Port Health Authority other than the members appointed by the council of the county borough of Hartlepool shall retire on the appointed day. Members shall be appointed by the new county borough council to come into office on the appointed day and hold office until 4th June, 1969.
3. If the Hartlepool Order 1966 is not approved by a resolution of each House of Parliament paragraph (2) and Schedule 9 shall have effect with the substitution for the “council of the County borough of Hartlepool” of “the rural district council of Stockton.”
4. Article 59 of the County of Durham Review Order 1936 (c) and article 54 of the County of Durham Review Order 1937 (d) shall cease to have effect.
5. The River Tees Port Sanitary Order 1925, the River Tees Port Health Amendment Order 1938(e), the Port Health Authorities (Election and Retirement of Members) Order 1950(f) and this article may be cited together as the River Tees Port Health Orders 1925 to 1967.

RIVER TEES PORT HEALTH AUTHORITY

JURISDICTION

The River Tees Port Sanitary Authority was constituted by an Order of the Local Government Board in 1886, the jurisdiction of the Authority being so much of the Ports of Middlesbrough and Stockton as lie between the bridge which crosses the River Tees at Stockton and an imaginary straight line drawn from and including the South Gare Breakwater to a point at which the Port of Middlesbrough joins the Port of Hartlepool, together with the waters of the said port within such limits, and the places for the time being appointed as the Customs Boarding Stations for the said portions of the Ports of Middlesbrough and Stockton above described and every other place for the time being appointed for the mooring or anchoring of ships within the said portions of the said ports, under any regulations for the prevention of the spread of diseases issued under the authority of the Statutes in that behalf. And the Watersides of the District constituted as aforesaid and the Docks, Basins and Creeks belonging to the said portions of the said ports which are included in such district.

This comprises about 10 miles of river with the wharves and docks, etc., on both banks.

There is no barge traffic on the River Tees.

SECTION V — WATER SUPPLY

1. (a) Source of supply for the district: The water is drawn from the Teesside Water supply, which is maintained by the Tees Valley and Cleveland Water Board. This water is kept under constant supervision and is abundant and of good quality.
- (b) For shipping: Vessels obtain their supplies from hydrants on the wharves and docks, the town supply serving these hydrants. There are no water boats in service on the Tees.

Some of the tugs in service in the port are occasionally called upon to supply drinking water to ships that have been delayed at anchorage in Tees Bay.

2. Precautions taken against contamination of hydrants and hose pipes. Hydrant Boxes are covered by close fitting steel covers when not in use, and all hoses are kept in specially constructed lockers. Frequent checks are undertaken to see that these arrangements are strictly complied with.
3. One hundred and twenty-two samples of drinking water were taken from vessels and hydrants during the year under review and submitted for bacteriological examination.

No adverse report was received in respect of four samples taken from various hydrants and hoses. Water supply personnel are to be commended on the way they have carried out their duties which at times can be under most adverse conditions for without the efficient maintenance of hydrants, stand-pipes and supply hoses it would not be possible to ensure 100% potable supply of drinking water.

Ten of the remaining one hundred and sixteen samples proved to be unsatisfactory. In all instances of adverse bacteriological reports the Master of the vessel concerned is notified, tank cleaning procedure is carried out followed by chlorination of tanks, pipeline systems, etc. Follow up samples are taken after the necessary work has been completed to verify that the contamination has been eliminated. Excellent co-operation has always been given by the vessels owners and masters.

In the event of the ship sailing from the port before the results of sampling is known the owners are given detailed information should the sample prove to be unsatisfactory. Instructions are then passed by them to the Master.

When the vessel is proceeding coastwise, the U.K. port health authority concerned is given full details of the condition prevailing onboard for any necessary action they think fit.

SECTION VI — PUBLIC HEALTH (SHIPS) REGULATIONS, 1970

1. List of infected areas :

Lists of infected areas are compiled each week from the Weekly Record of quarantinable disease and copies are supplied to H.M. Customs Waterguard, Tees Pilotage Authority, Tees Harbour Master and Immigration Officers.

2. Radio Messages :

(a) It has not been found necessary up to the present at this port to send permission by radio for ships to enter the district. Arrangements have been made however to send such messages through Cullercoats Radio Station.

(b) Arrangements have been made for radio messages from ships to be sent direct to the duty Port Officer either in plain language or in code using the 1969 International Code of Signals.

3. Notification otherwise than by radio (Regulation 14(1)(b)) :

Arrangements have been made for messages to be sent by morse code in Tees Bay to the Light keepers on the breakwater and such messages are telephoned to the duty Port Health Officer. Ships with infectious disease onboard are held in quarantine until visited by the Port Medical Officer.

4. Mooring Stations (Regulation 22-30) :

Ships which are infected or suspected on account of one of the major infectious diseases will be directed to Ichaboe Buoys. Should this prove impracticable owing to the length and draft of the vessel a quay berth would be allocated to her. Ships entering the Port with a case or suspected case of infectious disease, other than one of the major infectious diseases are allowed to proceed to their place of mooring, but are quarantined until visited by a Port Medical Officer and declared clear.

SECTION VIII — SMALLPOX

Dryburn Hospital must be alerted to the possibility of having to open Langley Park Isolation Hospital and make ready to receive smallpox case. Adequate notice is required. Absolute minimum time required is not less than two hours and this would have to be extended in winter conditions.

Vessels concerned would be quarantined at a berth alongside allocated by the Harbour Master.

SECTION VIII — VENEREAL DISEASE

There are Special Treatment Centres at the General Hospital, Ayresome Green Lane, Middlesbrough ; and North Tees General Hospital, Hardwick, Stockton.

All seamen found to be suffering from these diseases are directed to attend for treatment.

SECTION XII

MEASURES AGAINST RODENTS IN SHIPS FROM FOREIGN PORTS

1. Procedure for inspection of ships for rats :

All ships arriving in the port from foreign ports and as many coastwise vessels as is possible are inspected by the inspectorial staff and a thorough search is made for indications of rodent infestation.

Where indications of rodent infestation are found traps are set and specimens are submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for examination and the vessel is ordered to be deratted, either by fumigation, poisoning or trapping, according to the circumstances.

2. Arrangements for pathological examination of rodents :

Arrangements have been made for the pathological examination of rodents at the Public Health Laboratory, Middlesbrough General Hospital.

3. Arrangements in the district for deratting ships and the methods used :

Deratting of ships at this port is carried out either by fumigation with H.C.N. or Methyl Bromide. In certain cases poisoning is carried out by means of Sodium Fluoroacetate.

SECTION XIV

PUBLIC HEALTH (SHELLFISH) REGULATIONS 1934 and 1948

The Regulations refer to the gathering and sale for human consumption of Shellfish which may be infected.

In 1932 the River Tees Port Health Authority made Regulations under the Public Health Act, 1896, prohibiting the sale or offering for sale any mussels, cockles, periwinkles or other shellfish taken from within the District, unless and until such Shellfish have been relaid for such period as may be directed.

There are no beds laid in the Tees estuary. The River Police keep the collecting of Shellfish from the banks of the river under observation.

All Shellfish in the area are liable to pollution. No action has been taken during the year under the above Regulations or the Food and Drugs Act, 1955.

IMPORTED FOOD (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS, 1973

1. Regular container ship services use the port from Holland and bulk cargoes of cocoa beans and their products arrive from West Africa.

2. The inspection of foodstuffs under the above Regulations continues to occupy a considerable amount of the time of the Port Health Inspectors. 4,161 containers were inspected together with 24,493 tons of cocoa beans and their products.

Containerised foodstuffs consisted of Butter ; Cheese ; Cockles ; Colouring Powder ; Confectionery ; Cooking Fats and Oils ; Fish (frozen) ; Fruit (fresh, canned, dehydrated and pulp) ; Infant Food ; Lard ; Meats (canned and preserved) ; Rice ; Sago Starch ; Salt ; Sardines ; Soya Meal ; Sugar ; Tea ; Vegetables (fresh, dehydrated and preserved) ; Yeast Extract.

28 samples were sent to the Public Analyst for chemical analysis. Results in all cases were satisfactory.

DANGEROUS DRUGS (No. 2) REGULATIONS, 1964

THE POISON RULES, 1960-63

Two rodent control certificates were issued during the year. All other coasting vessels arriving in the port were in possession of international deratting or deratting exemption certificates.

DARK SMOKE (PERMITTED PERIODS) VESSELS

REGULATIONS, 1958

During the year there were twelve instances of vessels emitting dark smoke during their stay in port. In each case the nuisance was promptly abated after warning had been given. In summarising the general emission of smoke, it is found the largest amounts of smoke fall in the category of dark smoke or less and the periods of emission are less than those allowed by the Regulations. When black smoke has been observed enquiries have revealed that the cause is principally due to mechanical breakdown. Fan adjustment or burners require changing.

Excellent co-operation by the Masters and Chief Engineers of vessels concerned has always been experienced and the cause of the nuisance is always immediately investigated with positive results.
