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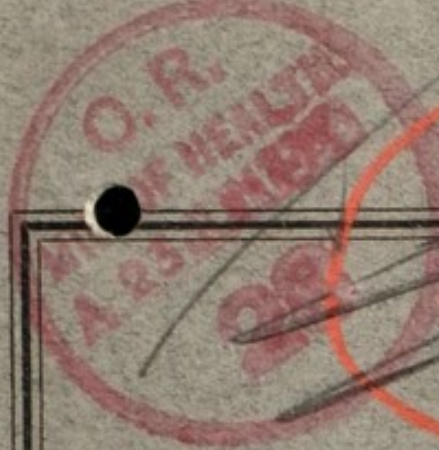

Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1935

To the Chairman and Members of the Council

Gentlemen,

The Annual Report is a summary of the conditions affecting the health, as well as the statistics of the District, drawn up in accordance with the requirements of the Ministry of Health.

The rates in Royston compare favourably with those of the County in general except in the case of the very low birth rate. This is really the most important figure of all, and it will soon become a deciding factor in our National Life if the birth-rate does not improve. It is particularly regrettable in a place like Royston, where the conditions for bringing up a healthy, happy family, are in most cases present.

The chief causes of death have been :—Tuberculosis 3, Malignant disease 7, Disease of the Heart and Arteries 20, Respiratory Disease 4

There was no death from whooping-cough, Measles, Infantile Diarrhoea or other infectious disease.

No woman died in child-birth nor was there any fatal case of puerperal sepsis,

PREVALENCE and CONTROL of INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

One case of Scarlet Fever and one of puerperal fever were notified during the year. The record for infectious disease generally has been excellent. Arrangements have now been made for infectious cases to be taken to the Hitchin Rural and Letchworth Urban Hospital. This is a modern well-built Hospital in a healthy situation. Small-pox cases if they occur can be removed to the Hospital at Langley which now belongs to the county. The Isolation Hospital possesses a Motor Ambulance. The Council pays for the examination of swabs and the provision of anti-toxin if necessary.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

Public Health Officers comprise :—

One Medical Officer of Health (part time)

One Sanitary Inspector, who also acts as Surveyor

The Sanitary Inspector is designated officer under the Housing Acts, and also carries out the Inspection of Meat, being a duly qualified Meat Inspector.

MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.

There were 166 children examined during the year and the following defects were found.

The children from the Shaftesbury Homes keep up the number examined in the schools. These children have their defects remedied, and there is an improvement in the others. We lost our School Nurse who had worked hard to better the health of the Royston children. Cases requiring operation and surgical and medical attention are dealt with at the Royston General Hospital. This is a good Hospital run on modern methods.

It will be seen by the report of the newly appointed Sanitary Inspector that he has been working hard since taking up his duties. A preliminary survey of overcrowded houses shows that there are 10 cases which will have to be dealt with.

WATER SUPPLY

The whole of the district is supplied with water from the chalk by the Royston Water Company.

SEWERAGE & DRAINAGE

21 houses have been connected to the Council's sewers. 1 house has been drained into a cesspool, the Council's sewer not being available. A short length of sewer has been relaid at a greater depth to allow of the drainage of a row of cottages thereto.

CLOSET ACCOMMODATION

Constant endeavour is made to replace old insanitary types of hopper closets by wash-down pedestal closets and to provide proper flushing cisterns thereto. 9 new water closets have been built during the year. 2 earth closets have been converted into water closets. 8 earth closets have been abolished. 19 hopper closets have been replaced by wash-down pedestals. 54 water closets have been provided with flushing cisterns with water laid on thereto. 51 water closets have been provided with light and ventilation. 10 water closets have been repaired.

REFUSE REMOVAL & DISPOSAL

Towards the end of the year the system of refuse collection was re-organised, and the practice of requiring householders to place receptacles on or near the roadway ready for removal was discontinued and the Council's staff now collect the refuse from the premises where the receptacle is kept.

House refuse is removed weekly except in an outlying portion of the district which was added to the area of the Council by the Hertford County Review Order 1934, from the cottages in this area a monthly collection of incombustible refuse has been commenced.

The method of disposal of refuse at the Sewage Farm Tip was also improved, and a system of controlled tipping commenced, a portion of the ditch running through the site being piped in and covered over to afford access to the area of land to be used for the purpose.

A great deal of labour was expended in thoroughly covering over the existing banks of tins and in crushing and disposing of the large heap of scrap iron and tins which had accumulated at the Tip.

Following this, an intensive campaign of poisoning was carried out to rid the site of rats.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE AREA

96 houses were inspected under the Housing Acts.

69 informal notices were served.

4 Statutory notices were served.

67 notices were complied with.

PREMISES & OCCUPATIONS CONTROLLED BY BYE-LAWS & REGULATIONS

There are no offensive Trades.

There are no underground sleeping rooms.

FACTORIES & WORKSHOPS

There are no factories in the district where more than 40 people are employed.

The workshops in the district are as follows—Bakehouses 3, Bootmakers 5, Bicycle makers 3, Builders 3, Coachbuilders 1, Dress-makers 3, Furniture makers 3, Masons 2, Plumbers 3, Photographers 1, Saddlers 2, Smiths 3, Tailors 4, Watchmakers 2, Wheelwrights 1, Cabinet makers and upholsterers 2. These premises are kept under observation by the Sanitary Inspector.

HOUSING

A great deal of time has been devoted to housing by the Sanitary Inspector during 1935. The Sanitary Inspector also acts as Surveyor

SLUM CLEARANCE PROGRAMME

The Council are dealing with the following 7 areas as Slum Clearance Areas under the Housing Act, 1930 comprising a total of 39 houses to be demolished.

No. 1 or London Road Clearance Area	14 houses
No. 2 or Normans Lane	... 6 houses
No. 3 or Market Hill	... 3 houses
No. 4 or The Mount	... 4 houses
No. 5 or George Lane	... 2 houses
No. 6 or Melbourn Street (South)	... 4 houses
No. 7 or Melbourn Street (North)	... 6 houses

During the year a public inquiry was held by the Minister of Health into two of the Clearance Area Orders against which objections were made. These two areas were No. 1 or London Road Clearance Area and No. 4 or The Mount Clearance Area. These Orders were confirmed by the Minister of Health. The remaining five Clearance Orders against which no objections were made were also confirmed by the Minister.

The Council have considered the provision of new houses to accommodate the people to be displaced by the demolition of houses in Clearance Areas, and land has been acquired for a housing site and plans prepared for 46 new houses of the necessary types.

HOUSING ACT, 1935—OVERCROWDING

The Overcrowding survey required by the above act was not commenced by the end of 1935. It is anticipated that only a small number of houses will prove to be overcrowded when the survey is made.

INSPECTION & SUPERVISION OF FOOD

MILK SUPPLY

There are three milk producers in the district, the remainder of the Dairymen obtaining their milk supplies from outside the area.

There is no Graded Milk produced in the district.

There has been no refusal or revocation of registration of retailers.

MEAT & OTHER FOODS

The Sanitary Inspector acts as Meat Inspector and inspection of meat and other food supplies is carried out systematically and examination of carcasses at the time of slaughter is carried out.

No marking under the Public Health (Meat) Regulations 1924 is in force

The humane killer is used for slaughtering in accordance with regulations adopted by the Council.

There is no arrangement for the disposal of condemned meat, and the practice is to render the meat unsaleable for human food after which it is buried on the land.

There are no public slaughterhouses in the area.

289 visits were made at the three private slaughterhouses in the district and the following carcasses were examined—Beasts 241, Sheep 721, Pigs 478. Meat condemned as unfit for food—1 forequarter of Beef, 54lbs. Beef, 1 Beast's head and tongue, 4 pairs beasts lungs, 6lb. Mutton. Other food condemned 2 6lb. tins of Corned Beef.

All the premises used for the preparation of human food are in a satisfactory state.

There have been no cases of food poisoning in the area.

The Food and Drugs (Adulteration) Act 1928 is administered by the County Council.
