PREFACE

To the Chairman and Nembers of the Royston Urban District Council.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1971.

The population showed an increase on the previous year of 180 largely due to an increase in births rather than to migration. The birth rate remained higher than the remainder of the country and the county as a whole.

The infant mortality rate was slightly higher than the previous year but remained below the national average.

There were no maternal deaths.

The number of deaths from all causes showed a very slight increase on

The number of deaths from all causes showed a very slight increase on the previous year, the commonest cause of death again being diseases of the heart and blood vessels; the death rate was below the national average.

As in the previous year no deaths occurred from tuberculosis or any other infective disease.

There was a slight increase in the number of illegitimate births.

There were no outbreaks of serious epidemic disease during the year and the state of the public health in Royston remained satisfactory.

The Health Education programme was greatly expanded during 1971.

A working party was set up during the year to discuss ways in which general health education could be further developed and a monthly clinic display programme formulated. The working party has met at regular intervals and allowed increased communication.

There has been increased contact with the Teacher Centres and this resulted in a two day conference. Health education was also featured in the North Hertfordshire In-Service Programme for teachers and a full day on health education is planned for 1972. In addition various discussion groups within the teacher centres have been held on the subject of drugs and venereal diseases.

Advice has been given to schools on health education within the school curriculum and a special programme for fifth and sixth formers was introduced and evaluated. This was concerned with the attitudes and behaviour affecting health.

Two experiments into motivation of mothers to accept health education were carried out as a pilot study in maternal attitudes.

Publicity campaigns on venereal disease, smoking and health, mental health were carried out in a number of factories. As a result, talks were given on subjects of personal hygiene, food handling (in conjunction with the public health inspector) venereal disease and mental health.

Talks have been given to various groups including Young Wives, Womens's Clubs, the elderly, St. John Ambulance Association, Parent Teacher Associations, Youth Clubs, etc. Topics included health and hygiene, accident prevention, drug addiction (in the form of panels) smoking and health, mental health and venereal disease. There has been increased involvement with the Home Safety Committees for the area.

An anti-smoking clinic was started during the year as a pilot experiment with a view to offering a service for general practitioners to refer patients who wish to give up smoking basically on health grounds. It was decided to run this clinic for one year in alternate months and this project was evaluated through the year. In view of its sucess on a group basis it was decided to run a pilot clinic for overweight women, gain to offer a service for general practitioners and hospital consultants to refer patients who needed to reduce weight and in the case of consultants particularly prior to operation. One feature has been that the group referred are mostly middle-aged and upwards and many aspects of health education have been discussed within the clinic setting. The demand has been overwhelming and has necessitated establishing a second clinic to relieve the waiting list with the Stevenage area and it is anticipated that a third clinic at Letchworth and a fourth in Hitchin will be necessary.

It is my view that the future role of health education lies in group and community projects. In many areas voluntary groups are providing varied activities appropriate to particular needs. Health education has a major role within these groups and some attempt at co-ordination of local authority and voluntary agencies on all matters of health education would be desirable. There is at the present time a mutual lack of awareness of roles which has created duplication of effort.

I would like to express my thanks to all the public health and health and welfare staff in Royston, including those concerned with administration, for their help and co-operation during the year.

The staff of the home nursing service in Royston at 31st December, 1971 consisted of two full time district nurse/midwives. The staff who are able to drive cars are either authorised to use their own vehicles on official business, or have been provided with county owned motor vehicles.

The following are statistics relating to the work of the home nurses in 1971. It will be seen that they made 4,980 visits to 231 patients. 44% of the patients nursed were aged 65 or over and they were visited on 3,311 occasions. 66% of all visits, therefore, were made to this age group.

ENVIRONMENTAL HYGIENE

Water Supply

The water to the Urban District is supplied in its entirety by the Lee Valley Water Company. No difficulties have been experienced over the year in either the quality of the water or the quantity of supply. The Company have reported upon 151 bacteriological and 5 chemical samples taken by them during the year all of which have been reported upon as being satisfactory and a purity suitable for a public water supply. A number of further samples from various sources in the Town have been submitted by the Public Health Inspector to the Cambridge Public Health Laboratory and these have also been reported upon as being satisfactory.

The total hardness of the water is shown as 250 milligrammes per litre which is relatively hard and, therefore, no problems of plumbo solvency are likely to arise.

Fluoride at 0.2 milligrammes per litre is shown as a natural constituent.

SWIMMING POOLS

The Green Plunge Swimming Pool now operated by the Council maintained its popularity during the year. Regular sampling was carried out by the Public Health Inspector and all samples were reported on as being satisfactory. Testing for chlorine and Ph was done by the Pool Superintendent at intervals each day and any departure from normal standards was immediately rectified.

Two school swimming pools remained in use both with filtration and chlorination plant and are regularly sampled by the County Health Inspector.

HOUSING

New Properties

During the year 1971 163 houses and 5 flats have been erected by private enterprise and 41 houses and 12 flats by the Local Authority.

Qualification Certificates

The Housing Act 1969 provided a new system for Qualification Certificates so that owners of rent controlled property, can, by applying to the Local Authority, obtain a Qualification Certificate so that these rents can be changed into regulated rent. During 1971 11 such applications for Qualification Certificates were received, of these 7 were approved as indicating the house was fully fit and rent change could be made, 4 however were refused on the grounds that some major defects existed in the houses which ought to be rectified before a Certificate could be issued.

CARAVANS AND GYPSIES

Three single caravan sites only exist in the Urban District and these during the year have been well conducted. The problem of gypsies camping on waste ground in the district has again not arisen as their favourite site is now developed into the York Way Industrial Area.
