B. GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

Public Health Officers.—A complete list was given at the front of the Report for 1938. The only alterations are that Mr. Bladon has now obtained his Certificate for Meat, etc., Mr. Allison has entered the Army, and Mr. J. M. Boswell is now the Clerk.

C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

1. (i) WATER SUPPLY.—Both the Northern and the Southern schemes were commenced in 1939, but have been carried out under great difficulty owing to War conditions, hence progress has been slow. The Council has given financial assistance to owners who make connections at the appropriate time.

99 samples of well water were examined, 12 of them bacteriologically. 13.4% were safe, 70.1% unsafe, and the rest unsatisfactory.

(ii) DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.—There has been no apparent progress with respect to the Binley scheme.

2. (i) RIVERS AND STREAMS.—All the premises at Draycote save two, have been supplied with cesspools.

3. (i) CLOSET ACCOMMODATION.—Whenever and wherever possible conversions to the water carriage system are effected. Failing that, conversions to pail closets is requested, and with each conversion galvanised iron dustbins are provided by the owners for household refuse and ashes. During 1939, 26 privy-middens, and 7 pail closets were abolished, and more sanitary conditions provided.

(ii) PUBLIC CLEANSING.—Direct labour has been extended ; there are now two vehicles of the most modern type. 8 more parishes have been added to those set out in the Report for 1938.

(v) CAMPING SITES.—Only one licensed.

D. HOUSING.

Full particulars of the usual table have been compiled and are being kept for Record purposes, but with a view to economy it is not being printed.

4. NUMBER OF HOUSES OWNED BY THE LOCAL AUTHORITY.

The Local Authority have erected 397 houses ; of that number 54 were built under the 1919 Act, 30 under the 1923 Act, 110 under the 1924 Act, and 173 under the 1936 Act. In addition 30 non-subsidy houses have been built.

1. *General Observations (Clearance Areas).*—No Clearance Areas were proceeded with during 1939 ; in the case of 4 Parishes Clearance Areas have been confirmed, but owing to war conditions re-housing is not possible.

Individual Unfit Houses.—During 1939, 6 individual unfit houses were represented, and there were 3 demolition orders made ; undertakings were given in the other 3.

Bye-laws.—Building and Water Supply Byelaws were made during the year.

Housing (Rural Workers) Act.—There was one application (2 houses) for assistance under the above Act during the year.

E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) *Milk Supply.*—Inspection has continued, and improvements in buildings and methods have been obtained.

113 Samples of Milk were taken for bacteriological examination, and 14 for chemical analysis.

(b) *Meat Inspection.*—The Sanitary Inspectors maintain close supervision over slaughterhouses, meat shops, and vans.

14 Samples of Milk were taken under the Food and Drugs Acts—all were genuine.

Bakehouses.—These were on the whole satisfactory.
