### C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

1. (i) Water Supply.—Both the Northern and the Southern schemes were completed towards the end of the year. Connections to private houses continue to be made.

38 samples of water were examined, 26 chemically and 12 bacteriologically. 15% were safe, 2% reasonably safe, 15% suspicious, and 68% unsafe.

- (ii) Drainage and Sewerage.—There has been no change. Contemplated schemes are held up.
- 2. (i) RIVERS AND STREAMS.—No complaints were received during the year.
- (i) Closet Accommodation.—Whenever and whereever possible conversions to the water carriage system are effected. During 1941 16 privy-middens, and 4 pail closets were abolished, and more sanitary conditions provided.
- (ii) Public Cleansing.—4 vehicles of modern type are now in use and 25 parishes are scavenged by direct labour. The labour difficulties have been great, and it has been necessary, if a regular collection is to be assured, to let out two parishes to contract.
- (v) Camping Sites.—There are only two camping sites in the District; these are reasonably well maintained.

## D. HOUSING.

Full particulars of the usual table have been compiled and are being kept for Record purposes.

1. General Observations.—No houses either singly or collectively were represented during the year. Defective houses, however, continue to receive attention, and whenever possible repairs are carried out, although it should be remembered that even this has its difficulties owing to scarcity of men and materials.

It is not considered practicable to take any action regarding overcrowding for obvious reasons.

# E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Milk Supply.—Inspections have continued and improvements have been obtained. Seven cowsheds have been modernised during the year.

For chemical analysis 7 samples were submitted and 5 were genuine. One sample was lost in transit, and the other was adulterated; investigation of the latter case showed that there was no attempted fraud.

Five samples submitted for the phosphatase test were satisfactory. 28 samples were submitted for bacteriological examination. All were delayed in transit, and not fit for examination.

(b) Meat Inspection.—Your two Sanitary Inspectors maintain close supervision of slaughterhouses, meat shops and vans.

Bakehouses.—These were, as in the past, generally maintained in a satisfactory condition.

Diphtheria Immunisation.—The campaign for the immunisation of school children commenced during 1941, and up to December 31st 1,222 children had been treated in the schools and 129 either privately or at Infant Welfare Centres, making a total of 1,351.
