Vaccination of B.C.G. contacts was carried out at the Chest Clinics. The skin testing of contacts is normally carried out by the Health Visitor - Miss Walsh.

HOME HEALTH SERVICES

The Health Visitors follow up all cases discharged from Hospital if asked to visit - mainly from Maternity Units.

There are no arrangements for Health Visitors to work in conjunction with General Practitioners. The home nurse/midwives however work harmoniously with the doctors in their districts.

Health Education

Although no Health Education Officer is employed every effort is made, through the exhibition of posters and direct contact between the Health Department staff and the general public, to promote health education.

Material for display is distributed to infant welfare centres, schools, the School Dental Service and the Schools Meals Service.

During the Year the Dental Officer held a competition for a poster on Dental Health and arranged for a Mobile Dental Exhibition to be in attendance at the Annual Show of the Rutland Agricultural Society.

Smoking and Health

The after care of mental health cases discharged from the Hospitals continues to be undertaken by the Mental Welfare Officer who visits them when requested to do so by the Hospital, and he is usually successful in obtaining remunerative employment for them.

The following draft Agreement was approved at the November Meeting of the County Council -

OAKHAM RADIO STATION

The Postmaster General to give permission to the Rutland County Council to erect an aerial to the Post Office Tower situated at Cold Overton Hill near Oakham, subject to the following rights.

1. Subject to the conditions set out in Para. 7 the right to erect, alter and maintain one aerial on the Post Office Tower, to instal radio equipment in its own building, and to provide cable connections between this equipment and the aerial. This right also subject to the prior approval of the plans by the Postmaster General, and to the Rutland County Council obtaining the necessary planning approval.
2. Right of access to the site and tower for maintenance and installation purposes subject to suitable arrangements being made with the Post Office Engineer, Telephone Number, Melton Mowbray 2289, on each occasion. Should the Postmaster General incur extra charges in providing attendance on the Rutland County Council in the exercise of its right of access then the Rutland County Council will reimburse the Postmaster General with the cost thereof.
3. The term is to be for 21 years.
4. The rent for the aerial to be £25. per annum.
5. The Rutland County Council to make their own arrangements for the provision of the electricity supply for their equipment.
6. Both parties to have the right to terminate the lease by giving to the other party 2 years notice in writing.
7. The following conditions shall be observed by the Rutland County Council.
 - (a) No radio equipment aerials or feeders shall be installed or modified until drawings and full details of the installations or modifications have been submitted to the Postmaster General, and approved by him in writing.
 - (b) The Postmaster General shall have the right to supervise all installation or modification work performed by the Rutland County Council and Rutland County Council will bear the cost of any such supervision required.
 - (c) The Rutland County Council will maintain the radio equipment, aerial and feeder system in accordance with good engineering practice and to the satisfaction of the Postmaster General.
 - (d) If the activity of the Rutland County Council in relation to the installation, subsequent to the lease, shall cause interference with the Postmaster General's service, etc., Rutland County Council shall take immediate remedial action.
 - (e) If at any time subsequent to the lease the Rutland County Council's installation obstructs works or improvements on the Postmaster General's site or installation the Rutland County Council will divert or modify its installation at its own expense.
 - (f) In installing or maintaining equipment on the tower the Rutland County Council will observe the Post Office Safety Regulations insofar as they apply to work or masts or towers.
 - (g) The Rutland County Council will provide and maintain fire fighting appliances and observe all such fire precautions as the Postmaster General may require.
 - (h) In the event of the Postmaster General having to perform any work or provide any service the cost of which is proper to be borne by the Rutland County Council, then the Rutland County Council will reimburse the Postmaster General with the cost thereof.
8. The Rutland County Council will at all times give full co-operation should the Postmaster General or other body acting within the permission of the Postmaster General desire to erect or maintain any aerials or towers on the site. The Post Office agree that the Rutland County Council should be informed of any intention to allow another tenant on the site.

GENERAL RADIO SYSTEM

The Postmaster General to give permission to the National County Council to erect an aerial on the Post Office Tower situated at Cold Overton Hill near Gidley, subject to the following rights.

1. Subject to the conditions set out in Part 7 the right to erect, alter and maintain one aerial on the Post Office Tower, to install radio equipment in its own building, and to provide cable connections between this equipment and the aerial. This right also subject to the prior approval of the plans by the Postmaster General, and to the National County Council obtaining the necessary planning approval.

2. Right of access to the site and tower for maintenance and installation purposes subject to suitable arrangements being made with the Post Office Engineer, Telephone Inspector, Mailed Hovary 2289, on each occasion. Should the Postmaster General incur extra charges in providing assistance on the National County Council in the exercise of its right of access then the National County Council will reimburse the Postmaster General with the cost thereof.

3. The term is to be for 25 years.

4. The rent for the aerial to be £25 per annum.

5. The National County Council to make their own arrangements for the provision of the electricity supply for their equipment.

6. Both parties to have the right to terminate the lease by giving to the other party 2 years notice in writing.

7. The following conditions shall be observed by the National County Council.

(a) No radio equipment aerial or towers shall be installed or modified until drawings and full details of the installation or modification have been submitted to the Postmaster General, and approved by him in writing.

(b) The Postmaster General shall have the right to supervise all installation or modification work performed by the National County Council and National County Council will bear the cost of any such supervision required.

(c) The National County Council will maintain the radio equipment, aerial and feeder system in accordance with good engineering practice and to the satisfaction of the Postmaster General.

(d) If the activity of the National County Council in relation to the installation, subsequent to the lease, shall cause interference with the Postmaster General's services, etc., National County Council shall take immediate remedial action.

(e) If at any time subsequent to the lease the National County Council's installation obstructs works or improvements on the Postmaster General's site or installation the National County Council will divert or modify its installation at its own expense.

(f) In installing or maintaining equipment on the tower the National County Council will ensure the Post Office Safety Regulations insofar as they apply to work on towers.

(g) The National County Council will provide and maintain fire lighting appliances and ensure all such fire precautions as the Postmaster General may require.

(h) In the event of the Postmaster General having to perform any work or provide any services the cost of which is proper to be borne by the National County Council, then the National County Council will reimburse the Postmaster General with the cost thereof.

8. The National County Council will at all times give full co-operation should the Postmaster General or other body acting with the permission of the Postmaster General desire to erect or maintain any aerial or towers on the site. The Post Office agrees that the National County Council should be informed of any intention to allow another tenant on the site.

Overnight accommodation can be arranged at Northampton if desired for people wishing to attend from Rutland.

Church Services and Club activities are also held at Peterborough to which Rutland people usually go.

Three men, and one lad recently left school, are in full employment. All arrangements have been made for one of these men, nearing retirement age to go to a very nice Home for the Deaf when he reaches retirement.
