Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report of the Borough of Ryde for the year 1947.

The year has again brought the appointment of a new Medical Officer to your Corporation, for, in November, 1947, Dr. H. C. Calvey resigned his post on his appointment as Senior Clinical Tuberculosis Officer to the County of Kent, and, on December 10th, I had the honour to be appointed to fill the vacancy.

As Dr. Calvey continued in office until December 31st, the report appended consists only of a summary of the vital statistics of the Borough and a precis of the work of the department under Dr. Calvey's direction.

The standard of health of the Borough remained satisfactory.

I have to report a continued rise in the birth rate, but for the first time for some years there has been a rise in the death rate.

The infantile mortality figure continues to fall and the maternal mortality figure remains low.

The outstanding feature epidemiologically was the outbreak of infantile paralysis which occurred throughout the country in the summer and autumn of the year. The Borough escaped relatively lightly as compared with the rest of the county as a whole, only five cases being notified and there being no deaths from the disease.

In addition, there was a sharp outbreak of measles in the early months of the year, in all 198 cases of the disease being notified, but again we were extremely fortunate and escaped without a single death from this cause.

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ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1917

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Two cases of diphtheria occurred and, when the immunisation figures are examined and it is found that the percentage of pre-school children considered to be immunised has fallen from its already extremely low figure to 24.2%, it is felt that the situation is now such that it gives cause for quite genuine alarm.

All facilities for free immunisation exist and the apathy of parents is difficult to understand in having their children protected against this highly dangerous, prolonged, disabling and, even yet in some cases, fatal disease.

If the risk of a diphtheria epidemic is to be avoided, an all out effort will be required to encourage parents to fulfil their obligation towards their children and have the relatively painless, simple, and easy procedure carried out so they may reap the benefit they have the security medical science has offered them.

There has been a considerable increase in the total estimated population and the housing shortage in the Borough is now desperately acute.

There are many cases of gross overcrowding being brought to the attention of the health department and several houses are now in such a condition that in the ordinary way they would merit the request of a closing order.

The almost complete absence of alternative accommodation leaves the department powerless to alleviate the condition, and the consequent domestic difficulty, unhappiness and consequent ill health is impossible to compute.

There has been a considerable increase in the total estimated population and the housing shortage in the Borough is now desperately acute.

There are many cases of other overcrowding being brought to the attention of the health department and several houses are now in need of a condition that in the ordinary way they would merit the request of a health order.

The almost complete absence of alternative accommodations leaves the department powerless to alleviate the condition, and the consequent demand for difficulty, unpopularity and consequent ill-feeling is impossible to combat.
