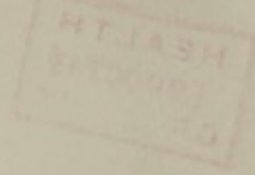

Report of Engineer & Surveyor.Mickleover.

A storm relief manhole has been constructed adjacent to the Memorial Hut, Station Road, Mickleover, to carry away the storm water entering the Council's sewer from Station Road. The storm water discharges into a ditch into which the County Council also discharges its storm water.

Hatton.

The Sewage Pumping Station at the Hatton Sewage Works has now been completed and brought into operation.

Repton.

Three sludge beds were under-drained and a new distributor fixed to one of the filters to replace one that was defective.

Willington.

Work on the construction of the sewerage and sewage disposal scheme for this parish is continuing slowly. The pumping station and irrigation area are practically completed, and the thirty Council houses in Twyford Road, together with other properties in the village, have been connected to the new sewers, which has eliminated the sewage nuisance at the above Council houses.

Woodville.

Work is nearing completion on the proposed Pumping Station at Occupation Road to replace the existing one rendered useless by mining subsidence. It is hoped that this Pumping Station will be brought into operation in March, 1943.

Sunny Hill, Stenson (34 Houses).

A scheme has been prepared for the treatment of sewage from the thirty-four houses and the elimination of flooding from the Shardlow sewer. The scheme has been submitted to the Ministry of Health, and it is expected to be considered as a post-war proposal.

Church Broughton.

A sewage disposal scheme has been prepared and submitted to the Ministry of Health for the village of Church Broughton, and it is expected that this will be considered as a post-war proposal.

Burton Road, Overseal.

A tender has been accepted for the laying of a 6" foul sewer to receive the foul drainage from houses Nos. 270, 272 & 274, Burton Road (which at present discharge into individual septic tanks), and so abate an existing nuisance. The Contractor is expected to commence the work immediately.

WATER SUPPLY.Chlorination of Water Supply.

Chlorination plant has now been installed in each of the Council's three water schemes, namely, Woodville and Overseal Joint, Hartshorne, and Ticknall. The plant was supplied by the Candy Filter Co. Ltd., and the chlorine is applied to the water through the plant in the form of a hypochlorite.

HOUSING.

No plans for houses were passed during the year ended 31st December, 1942.
