SEWERAGE & SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

Willington.

The above sewage scheme has now been completed and brought The sewage is directed from the village to a pumping station. from which it is pumped to an irrigation area nine acres in Owing to the sandy and gravelly nature of the ground, it is ideal for irrigation.

The Minister of Health has approved a scheme by the Council for the conversion of six pan closets into water-closets at the Council houses in Castleway Lane, Willington. The work is expected to be commenced in the very near future.

Woodville.

The new sewage pumping station in Occupation Road, to replace subsidence, is now completed the existing one rendered useless by mining subsidence, is now completed and in operation.

Overseal.

The 6" foul sewer to receive the foul drainage from Houses 270, and the foul drainage 272 and 274, Burton Road, has now been completed, and the foul drainage from these houses can now be connected thereto.

Mickleover.

A scheme has been prepared and submitted to the Minister for the purpose of relieving the amount of sewage flowing to the Bunkers Sewage Works, the foul sewage being diverted to the Findern Works. The scheme also includes the diversion of storm water to a storm water tank. A tender has been accepted, and the work will be carried out immediately the Minister's approval has been obtained.

Castle Gresley.

The Minister has approved the plans and the accepted tender for the work of abating the sewage nuisance in the vicinity of Messrs. Bonas Bros. Tape Factory in Burton Road. The work is expected to commence in August, 1944.

WATER SUPPLIES.

The Council propose to erect a new pumping station and install one suitable pump for the Ticknall Water Scheme. A tender for the pump has been accepted, and the scheme will be submitted to the Minister for approval at the first opportunity.

Smisby. Application has been made to the Minister for permission to lay the necessary mains for a piped water supply to the village of Smisby. The Council have been informed by the Minister that this work should be carried out as a post-war scheme.

Dalbury Lees and District.

Plans are being prepared for the laying of approximately 42 miles of various diameter mains to supply water to the undermentioned parishes:-

> Radbourne Trusley Osleston & Thurvaston Barton Blount Foston & Scropton Hoon

Dalbury Lees Ashe Sutton-on-the-Hill Church Broughton Hatton Marston-on-Dove

These villages are experiencing a considerable shortage of water. The total population is approximately 4,000. The mains will /be

be laid so that the whole of the farms within the above parishes can be connected, the approximate number of farms being 200. Farms and trade premises will be supplied through meters.

The water is proposed to be purchased in bulk from the Derby Corporation, which authority propose to erect a water tower in a field adjacent to Skitteridge's Wood within the Belper Rural District, just North of Station Road, Mickleover. Water will be supplied from this tower to the parishes concerned.

HOUSING.

Post-War Housing.

The Council has become a member of the Ilkeston Group for the Advance Preparation of Housing Schemes, for sites over 5 acres in extent. The various layouts have been prepared and approved by the appropriate authorities, and it is hoped that work will be commenced on the roads and sewers in October, 1944. The number of houses approved by the Minister for the Council's first and second year programme is 446, which houses will be erected in the different parishes

Agricultural Cottages.

The Council has been allocated 16 agricultural cottages within the District, in the following parishes:-

Repton (2) V Ticknall (2) 1 Rosliston (2) (3 Hilton (4)

Willington (2) Netherseal (2) Coton-in-the-Elms (2)

The two houses at Coton-in-the-Elms and the two at Netherseal are practically completed. The remainder are now occupied.

Private Development.

No plans for houses were submitted to the Council for consideration as private development during the year ending 31st December 1943.

BRITISH RESTAURANT.

Woodville.

The Council have converted a portion of the old Wesleyan Schools, High Street, Woodville, into a British Restaurant, which is now open and working satisfactorily.

POST-WAR SCHEMES.

The Council have a very progressive post-war programme, which includes the design and construction of sewerage and sewage disposal schemes, water schemes, and housing. These schemes are hoped to be carried out at the first opportunity after the war.

Small-pox.- No cases.

Scarlet Fever. - Notifications - 67 (including 3 Non-Civilians).

Removed to Hospital - 33. Deaths - Nil.

The type of disease continues mild. The average period of residence in Hospital is about 28 days. Anti-scarlatinal serum is supplied to practitioners on request.

Immunisation is carried out by medical practitioners for the District Council. During the year under review, 303 children under 5 years were fully immunised, and 209 children of school age, a total of 512. It is estimated that 80% of school children and 70% of infants under 5 are now immunised in the District. No deaths have occurred during the last 3½ years.
