SEWAGE & SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

Willington.

The six earth closets at the Council Houses in Castleway Lane, Willington, have been converted to water-closets and connected to the Willington Sewage Scheme, completed during the war.

All properties required to be connected to the public sewers by the Local Authority have been connected, and the Sanitary Inspector is negotiating with the remaining owners for the foul drainage from their properties to be also connected.

Mickleover.

The scheme submitted to the Ministry of Health for the diverting of a portion of the foul sewage from the Boundary Sewage Works to the Findern Sewage Works to relieve the former, together with the diversion of the storm water to a storm tank will be carried out immediately the Ministry's approval has been obtained.

Coton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston, Walton, and Cauldwell.

The Pessall brook, into which the sewage and storm water flows, has been cleared out, regraded, and fenced by the War Agricultural Committee on behalf of this Council, thus preventing ponding and nuisance from sewage. A comprehensive sewage scheme is being prepared to treat the sewage from the above properties as a post-war scheme.

Castle Gresley.

The storm overflow constructed to abate the nuisance from flooding to Messrs. Bonas Bros. Tape Factory in Burton Road, has now been completed and is working satisfactorily in times of storm.

WATER SUPPLY

Overseal and Woodville.

The yield from the Council's Smisby well is insufficient for the demand, and they purchase water from the Swadlincote and Ashby Joint Water Board, whose supply in turn is inadequate. In order to ensure an adequate supply to the village of Overseal the Council now purchase water in bulk direct from the South Staffordshire Waterworks Company through a meter on that Company's trunk main passing through Overseal.

Proposals for an adequate supply of water for Woodville are being submitted to, and discussed with, the Ministry officials.

These proposals will be considered by the Minister as a post-war project.

Hartshorne, Ticknall and Hatton.

The yield and quality of the water supplying the above parishes is satisfactory.

It is proposed to install an automatic pump at Ticknall in the near future to ensure an adequate supply to the village.

All the Council's public water supplies are chlorinated before distribution to the public.

HOUSING.

Advanced Preparation of Housing Sites.

It is expected that work will commence on the construction of the streets and sewers under the advanced preparation of housing sites in the parishes of Willington, Hatton, Repton, Woodville and Linton on the 1st July, 1945. The number of houses to be erected in the Council's first and second year programme is 446, of which 248 will be allocated to the above five sites, the remainder being distributed amongst various parishes within the Rural District.

Private Development.

No plans for houses were submitted to the Council for consideration as private development during the year ending 31st December, 1944. Several plans have been submitted to the Council for alterations or additions to existing dwellings during the year.

STAFFORDSHIRE EXPLOSION.

A serious explosion occurred in the area of an adjoining authority on 27th November, 1944, which caused damage to adjacent property within this Council's area.

An arrangement was made between the R.A.F. and this authority to inspect and repair the properties affected, and this is being carried out

POST-WAR SCHEMES.

The Council have a very progressive post-war programme which includes the design and construction of sewerage and sewage disposal schemes, water schemes, and a large housing programme, including the construction of housing estates, roads and drainage, preparations of which are now in progress.

WATER SUPPLIES.

During the year 26 samples of water from private sources have been sent for analysis, 9 were examined chemically and 17 bacteriologically.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

A complaint was received from occupiers of dairy farms in the parish of Egginton of the fouling of their water-course used for the watering of cattle, from the American Camp at Hilton.

The matter was taken up energetically by the Council with the Army authorities, which resulted in the improvement of the sewage collecting area of the Camp, and the abatement of the gross pollution in the stream.

ERADICATION OF BED BUGS.

Two complaints were received with regard to this pest during the year in the Southern District. Notices were served on the owners of the properties concerned, and immediate action was taken by them to deal with the infestations.

Heat-treated milk is produced in bulk at the Wilts United Dairies Ltd., Egginton Branch, and a sample of this milk was taken monthly for phosphatase test and plate count and B. Coli tests.

'Accredited' milk licences are granted by the County Council, and have resulted in many improvements in the sterilizing arrangements at farms.

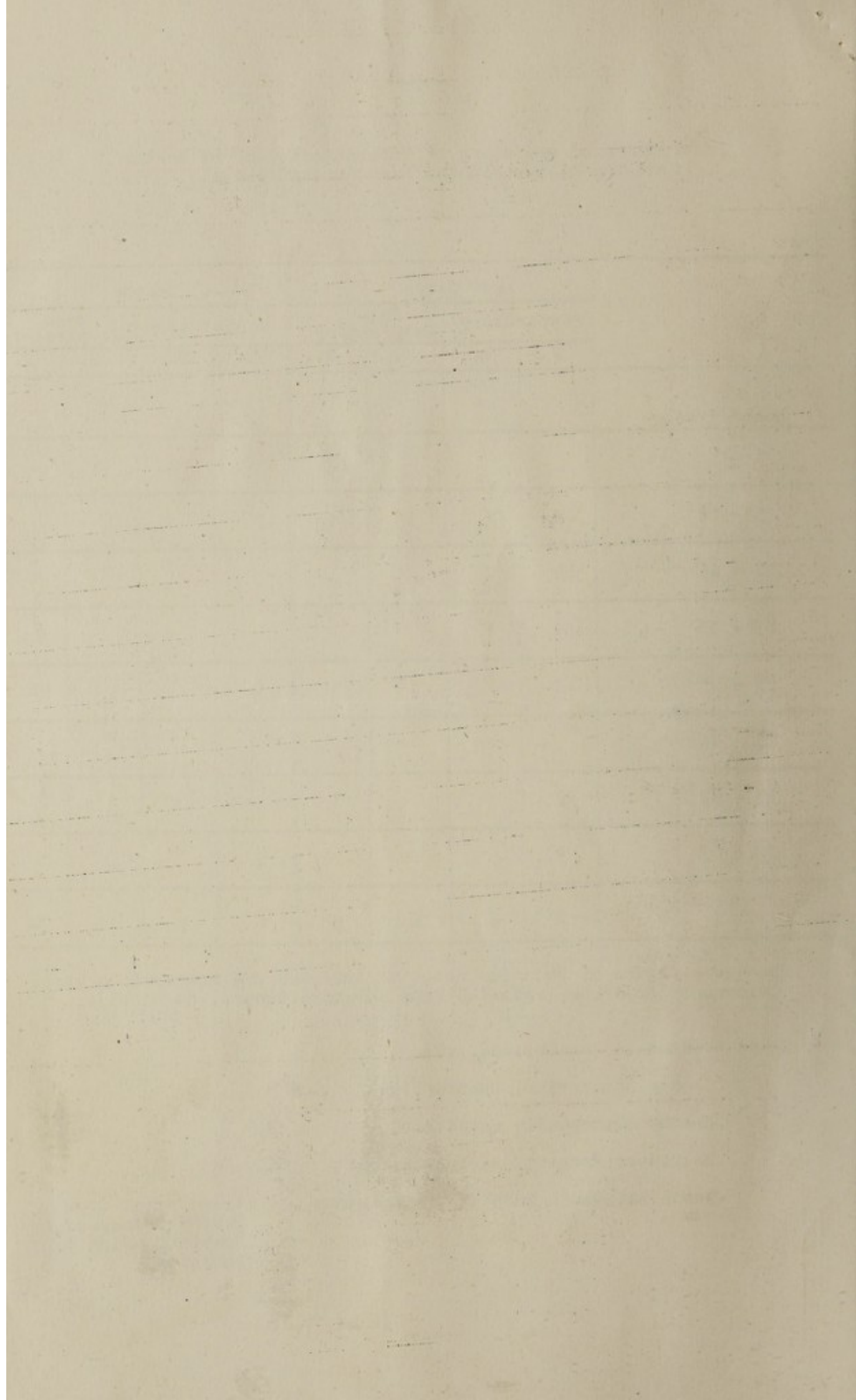

Immunisation is carried out by medical practitioners for the District Council. By the end of December 1944, 1,267 infants under 5 years of age had been fully immunised, as well as 3,380 children of school age. The actual percentage of children permanently resident in the district who were immunised cannot be exactly determined, owing to the fluctuating numbers of evacuees who were coming and going into the area. It is roughly estimated that 70 per cent of the infants, and 80 per cent of the school children, have been fully immunised.

During the last three years, 1942 - 1944, only 17 cases in all, Diphtheria, have been notified, and no deaths have occurred. Most of them were extremely mild cases, and they tended to occur in persons over school age. For a similar three-year period, 1933 - 1940, the number of cases notified was 77, with 4 deaths.

The Alum Precipitated Toxoid used for immunisation is supplied by the Council free to all medical practitioners undertaking the work.
