Preface

Madam Chairman, Lady & Gentlemen,

I present herewith the Annual Report on the Health of the District during 1969. Included in this Report is the Report of your Public Health Inspector.

Births exceeded deaths by 10 persons, but the Registrar General estimated the total population dropped by 10 persons, which means that 20 persons must have moved out of the Area. The Standardised Birth Rate at 19.2 per thousand well exceeds the National Rate of 16.3 and the Standard Death Rate at 7.1 per thousand is well below the National Rate of 11.9.

Cancer claimed 7 victims (27% of the total deaths), diseases of the heart and circulation claimed 12 deaths (46% of deaths) whilst only 3 persons died of infections of the chest or lungs (11%) One of these latter deaths was due to influenza.

Very few public health problems arose but concern was expressed at the practise of storing live crabs in crates in near proximity to sewage outfalls in the Estuary. This problem will not arise after the Council's sewerage scheme is carried out.

I wish to thank Members of the Council and my colleagues on the staff for all their help during the year.

I have the honor to acknowledge the Annual Report on the Health of the District during 1930. Included in this Report is the Report of your Public Health Inspector. Births exceeded deaths by 10 persons, but the Registrar General estimated the total population dropped by 10 persons, which means that 20 persons must have moved out of the area. The Standard Birth Rate at 19.2 per thousand well exceeds the National Rate of 16.7 and the Standard Death Rate at 7.1 per thousand is well below the National Rate of 11.9.

Gender showed 7 victims (73% of the total deaths), diseases of the heart and circulation claimed 12 deaths (48% of deaths) whilst only 3 persons died of infections of the chest or lungs (12%). One of these latter deaths was due to influenza.

Very few public health problems arose but concern was expressed at the prospect of starting live crops in order to make it more probable to average outside in the future. This problem will not arise after the Council's average scheme is carried out.

I wish to thank Members of the Council and my colleagues on the staff for all their help during the year.

## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

### 1. HOSPITALS

Salcombe is served mainly by the Plymouth and District Hospital Management Committee. There are large general hospitals at Plymouth and the South Hams Hospital at Kingsbridge, which is a general practitioner hospital, has 13 beds. Maternity beds and Geriatric beds are provided at Broomborough hospital, Totnes, under the Torquay Hospital Management Committee.

### 2. COUNTY COUNCIL HEALTH SERVICES

Under the National Health Service Act, 1946, the Devon County Council provides the following services:-

Domicillary midwives, home nurses, health visitors, supervisory care of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five, an ambulance service, vaccination and immunisation procedures, home help service, and the care of persons suffering from illness or mental disorders, and the after care of such persons.

### 3. LABORATORY SERVICES

Bacteriological examinations of pathological specimens and samples of milk, water and ice-cream, are carried out by the Public Health Laboratory at Plymouth. The chemical analysis of water is undertaken by Public Analysts at Exeter.

### 4. MEDICAL AND DENTAL SERVICES

There are three general medical practitioners and one dentist at Salcombe.



## GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

### 1. HOSPITALS

Salisbury is served mainly by the Plymouth and Dartmouth Hospital Management Committee. There are three general hospitals at Plymouth and the South Devon Hospital at Kingsbridge, which is a general practitioner hospital, has 15 beds. Maternity beds and Geriatric beds are provided at Broomborough Hospital, Totnes, under the Torbay Hospital Management Committee.

### 2. COUNTY COUNCIL HEALTH SERVICES

Under the National Health Service Act, 1946, the Devon County Council provides the following services:-

Domiliary midwives, home nurses, health visitors, supervisory care of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five, an ambulance service, vaccination and immunisation programmes, home help services, and the care of persons suffering from illness or mental disorders, and the after care of such persons.

### 3. LABORATORY SERVICES

Bacteriological examinations of pathological specimens and samples of milk, water and ice-cream, are carried out by the Public Health Laboratory at Plymouth. The chemical analysis of water is undertaken by Public Analysts at Exeter.

### 4. MEDICAL AND DENTAL SERVICES

There are three general medical practitioners and one dentist at Salisbury.

#### WATER SUPPLIES

The whole of the Salcombe Urban District received water supplied by the South West Devon Water Board. Regular samples of the supply are taken by the Board to ensure its wholesomeness. There has, therefore, been no cause for any action to be taken by the Department in this connection.

#### SEWERAGE & SEWAGE DISPOSAL

There has been no change during the year with reference to the disposal of sewage. The existing arrangements are as follows:-

The condition of the foreshore along the Salcombe side of the Estuary is most objectionable and results in complaints being made, from time to time, to the Council. During the year further progress has been made regarding the new sewage disposal arrangements, and it is hopeful that financial assistance may be available under the provision of the Rural Water Supplies and Sewage Act. There is every possibility that a start will be made on the scheme during the summer of 1970.

BALBOISE URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

ANNUAL REPORT of the Public Health

WATER SUPPLIES

The whole of the Balboise Urban District received water supplied by the South Devon Water Board. Regular supplies of the supply are taken by the Board to ensure its wholesomeness. There has, therefore, been no cause for any action to be taken by the Department in this connection.

SEWAGE & SEWER DISPOSAL

There has been no change during the year with reference to the disposal of sewage. The existing arrangements are as follows:-

The condition of the forebank along the Balboise side of the Estuary is most objectionable and results in complaints being made, from time to time, to the Council. During the year further progress has been made regarding the new sewage disposal arrangements, and it is hopeful that financial assistance may be available under the provision of the Rural Water Supplies and Sewers Act. There is every possibility that a start will be made on the scheme during the summer of 1929.



## REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The collection of domestic and trade refuse throughout the district has been satisfactorily maintained throughout the year. Refuse is collected weekly from all the premises in the area and daily, twice or three times per week, from hotels and business premises, on request.

The use of paper sacks has continued and these and their holders are supplied to many hotels, shops, etc., in the district. They have considerably improved the collection service and conditions under which refuse is stored prior to collection.

The existing arrangements whereby refuse is tipped at Molescombe Quarry, in conjunction with adjoining Authorities, has continued very satisfactorily. The volume of refuse is increasing annually and requests for additional collections put a considerable pressure in the existing arrangements, particularly during the summer months. During the year periodic collections of bulky refuse were made, when requested.

## FOOD AND DRUGS ACT

Routine inspections are made throughout the year of food premises in the district and, where necessary, informal action is taken to ensure compliance with the Food and Drugs Act and the Food Hygiene Regulations.

The standard of food hygiene, is, on the whole, satisfactory. Seasonal staff are engaged during the summer months at hotels and other business premises, many of whom have no previous knowledge or experience of food hygiene. It is not possible to inspect all the hotels and guest-houses during the year, the many duties carried out by your staff usually results in Food & Drugs inspection being considerably cut down but, when possible, inspections are made. Advice is given to food handlers and improvements obtained.

Routine inspections of food shops and restaurants are also made as often as possible and it is pleasing to note the co-operation one receives from many of the occupiers of these premises.

Samples of ice-cream are taken from the retail suppliers - these were quite satisfactory but advice on cleaning and sterilisation has been given when necessary.

Small quantities of unsound food have been condemned after being voluntarily surrendered. This is mainly tinned foods which have been obviously unfit.



## HOUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The collection of domestic and trade refuse throughout the district has been satisfactorily maintained throughout the year. Refuse is collected daily from all the premises in the area and daily, twice or three times a week, from hotels and business premises, as required.

The use of paper sacks has continued and these and their holders are supplied to many hotels, shops, etc., in the district. They have considerably improved the collection service and conditions under which refuse is stored prior to collection.

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Small quantities of unsound food have been condemned after being voluntarily surrendered. This is mainly tinned foods which have been obviously unfit.

## OFFICES ,SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT

Reinspections have been made of premises covered by the provisions of this Act, from time to time. Shops and Offices in Salecombe usually employ very few staff and any contraventions of the Act are dealt with on an informal basis.

## PUBLIC HEALTH ACT - STATUTORY NUISANCES

It is pleasing to note that very few complaints are made to the Council of statutory nuisance. Any matter which is reported is usually dealt with on a personal and informal basis and results in the nuisance being abated with the least possible delay.

It has not been necessary to take any formal action in this respect.

## CARAVAN SITES CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960

There is only one licensed camping site within the Urban district and the conditions imposed in granting the licence have now been complied with. Periodical inspections are made to ensure that the camp is maintained in a satisfactory manner. There are 40 caravans and 10 tents.

Practically the whole of the Urban District is within an area covered by an Article 4 Direction under the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act and regular inspections of the district are carried out to ensure camping is not taking place within the areas covered by the Direction.

## HOUSING

The Housing conditions of the district are satisfactory - there being no unfit houses.

The construction of 16 new dwellings, 10 being one bedroom flats for elderly people, continued during the year- and most will be completed by early 1970. The number of persons on the Council waiting list will be considerably reduced, and it is not expected that there will be a need for further Council house development in the foreseeable future.

## OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY HUNDREDS ACT

Representations have been made of premises covered by the provisions of this Act, from time to time. Shops and Offices in the various hundredly areas by law staff and my conversations of the Act are dealt with on an informal basis.

## ARTICLE 10 - STATUTORY INSPECTIONS

It is pleasing to note that very few complaints are made to the Council of statutory nuisances. Any matter which is reported is usually dealt with on a personal and informal basis and results in the nuisance being abated with the least possible delay.

It has not been necessary to take any formal action in this respect.

## CARAVAN SITES CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960

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Practically the whole of the Urban District is within an area covered by an Article 4 Direction under the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act and regular inspections of the district are carried out so that any camping is not taking place within the areas covered by the Direction.
