To the Chairman and Members of the Council

My Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honor to present the annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1961.

There has been a substantial increase in the population from 16,500 to 17,500. This may be partially accounted for by the fact that 1961 was a boom year and the number of people living in this District was raised at the same time. It is noted in years in which there is no Census the Registrar General arrives at the estimated population by a process of 'dead reckoning' in which the number of persons being born and moving in and out, is utilized.

In the course of death, pneumonia accounted for 17 deaths last year which was about double the figure for 1960.

There were 11 deaths from influenza in 1961, one of these occurring outside the local District. There were 2 deaths from influenza in 1960. The influenza group of cases also doubled from 11 to 22. In contrast with the rest of the country there was an epidemic of measles and unfortunately one death occurred.

A few cases of tuberculosis were notified and 5 cases recovered.

The notification and vaccination figures are shown in greater detail than in previous years. It will be seen that many parents are now having their children immunized against tetanus, a very wise provision in a rural area.

The milk sampling figures were very satisfactory. 73 samples of milk were taken and no abnormalities or harmful organisms were found.

To the Chairman and Members of the Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1961.

There has been a substantial increase in the population from 16,580 to 17,800. This may be partially accounted for by the fact that 1961 was a Census year and the number of people living in this District was arrived at by counting heads whereas in years in which there is no Census the Registrar General arrives at the estimated population by a process of 'dead reckoning' in which the number of persons dying, being born and moving in and out, is utilised.

The standardised Birth Rate has fallen from 19 to 15.78 per 1,000 population. It is a little below the national figure of 17.4.

Still births increased from 1 to 7 and the number of children dying under the age of 1 year rose from 2 to 7.

Five of the latter occurred under the age of 4 weeks and one was due to congenital malformation.

The Death Rate for Samford rose from 9.39 to 10.21 per 1,000 and the Death Rate for England and Wales rose from 11.5 to 12.

In the causes of death, Pneumonia accounted for 17 deaths last year which was about double the figure for 1960.

Motor vehicle accidents took toll of 7 lives, one of these occurring outside the Rural District. There were none in 1960. There were 2 suicides and 1 infanticide. The miscellaneous group of causes also doubled from 13 to 24. In common with the rest of the country there was an epidemic of measles and unfortunately one death occurred.

4 new cases of tuberculosis were notified and 8 cases recovered.

The immunisation and vaccination figures are shown in greater detail than in previous years. It will be seen that many parents are now having their children immunised against tetanus, a very wise precaution in a rural area.

The milk sampling figures give cause for great satisfaction. 73 samples were taken and no tuberculous or brucella organisms were found.

I will conclude by recording my appreciation of the help and support given to the Department by the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee.

I must also thank the staff of the Public Health Department, particularly Mr. Good and Mr. Brown, and Mr. Pardoe who has assisted me in the preparation of this report. Also the Officers and Members of all other Departments for their co-operation during the year under review.
