

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1967.

There has been a new departure on this occasion and for the first time the Annual Reports of the Medical Officer of Health and the Public Health Inspector have been combined to form one comprehensive report. It was considered that this new arrangement would enable the various figures and statistical tables to be more readily comprehended.

The year under consideration has been a difficult one for the Public Health Department. In August, Mr. John Pardoe, the Additional Public Health Inspector, became ill and we were without his services for the remainder of the year. As a result a very heavy burden was placed upon Mr. Brown, and I am most grateful to him for the efficient way in which he kept the department running during this very difficult time.

The statistics contained in this report show that 1967 was a healthy year for Samford, and there has been no great cause for anxiety. Much of the credit for this happy state of affairs is due to the Public themselves, and there is no doubt in my mind that people are becoming more and more knowledgeable in matters concerned with health and the prevention of illness. Also they do not hesitate to seek medical advice when anything seems to be amiss.

The Public Health Department and its staff are also responsible for the satisfactory state of health in this Rural District. Much of their work is routine and painstaking and not very spectacular, but it does much to promote good health and to prevent suffering and disease.

I should like to conclude by expressing my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their support and encouragement during the past year.

I am also most grateful to the staff of the Public Health Department, and to the Clerk, Officers, and other staff of the Council for help and assistance.
