Mr. Chairman and Members of the Housing and Health Committee.

I beg to submit my report for the year 1971.

The Registrar General's estimate of the mid year population for 1971 shows an increase of nearly 1,000 over the corresponding figure for last year.

The Census 1971 Advance Analysis covering the North Riding shows that the proportion of people of pensionable age is now approximately 25% of the total population. The significance of this figure is underlined in this Analysis by figures indicating that 80% of these people are economically "inactive". A reappraisal of the needs of the Medical and Social services in this area is clearly called for.

At the other end of the population spectrum the deaths of children under 1 year of age and the still births vary slightly from year to year but show no sign of a downward trend.

Two further items among the statistics should be mentioned. The number of illegitimate births as a percentage of total births (15%) has only been exceeded once and that was in 1945.

The second item refers to the figures provided by the Consultant in charge of the Special V.D. Clinicat St. Mary's Hospital. The first table shows a further increase in the number of new cases from Scarborough.

Finally, my report as usual contains information obtained from a number of departments of the Corporation and outside sources. I am grateful to the officials and others concerned who accede to my annual requests for information promptly and without complaint.

Food Poisoning

There was one general outbreak and ten sporadic cases of food poisoning during the year. There were also 28 other incidents of suspected food poisoning which proved to be due to virus infection.

Tuberculosis

There were no deaths from Pulmonary Tuberculosis during the year. 7 new cases were notified compared with 13 in 1970.

The Mass Radiography Unit was located at the St. Mary's Hospital, Dean Road and sessions were held from 6.15 to 7.30 p.m. on the 2nd and 4th Monday evenings each month.

672 Males and 925 Females attended the evening sessions and a further 81 Males and 193 Females were examined at other sites in Scarborough during the year. Altogether 42 cases were referred to The Chest Clinic and their own Doctors.

MISCELLANEOUS

(1) THE MEDICAL BATHS

REPORT BY THE SUPERINTENDENT FOR 1971

The Establishment continues to provide a service for the administration of skilled physical treatment on the recommendation of general practitioners and consultants in the area. Treatment has been administered to men, women and children in all walks of life, but the bulk of the work done being concerned primarily with the diseases of degeneration, the average age of the patients tends to be somewhat advanced. In the summer season, the majority of patients attending are visitors either coming to Scarborough to combine holidays with intensive treatment, or, being suddenly afflicted whilst away from home are able to get immediate attention.

The fees charged are within the means of all classes of the community, but there has been some diminution of demand no doubt due to the unstable economic circumstances of the times.

(2) WATER SUPPLIES

The Water Engineer kindly provided the following information for inclusion in this Annual Report.

The Water Supply of the Borough of Scarborough is satisfactory both in quality and quantity; and does not show plumbosolvent properties. During the year work commenced on the extension and renewal of small diameter mains.

New schemes completed during the year included 597 yards of small diameter mains to serve new properties and 1,882 yards of mains renewals.

Bacteriological Tests

A total of 630 samples were taken from the distribution system, (mostly from consumer taps). Of these 5 were found on the initial sampling, to be unsatisfactory but on subsequent re-sampling all were proved to be satisfactory. In no case was there any indication that the water supplied was anything but wholesome.

Chemical Analyses

16 samples were taken for chemical analysis during 1971.

Total hardness of Irton Water was 198 p.p.m. of which approximately 26.3% was permanent hardness.

Total hardness of Cayton Water was 274 p.p.m. of which approximately 38.7% was permanent hardness.

Total hardness of Osgodby Water was 270 p.p.m. of which 43% was permanent hardness.

Mains Supply

Only 2 dwellings within the Borough do not have a mains water supply. This is due to topographical reasons. At 31st December, 1971, a total of 16,124 dwellinghouses, flats etc., were connected to the mains. It is estimated that a population of 7 has not a mains water supply, the rest of the population of the town being supplied from public water mains.

I am indebted to the Borough Engineer for the following information relating to Sewerage and Housing.

(3) SEWERAGE

Only 10 houses in the Borough are not connected to sewers.

(4) HOUSING

During 1971, 12 new houses were built by the Corporation and 129 new houses and flats were built by private enterprise. In addition 81 new flats were developed by private enterprise by conversion and 4 by the Corporation.

(5) LABORATORY FACILITIES

The Public Health Laboratory Service at Hull provides laboratory services for the Health Department, submitting reports on pathological specimens, samples of milk, ice-cream and water.

(6) BYELAWS

During the year no new Bye-laws were brought into force.

(7) NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948 - SECTION 47, AND NATIONAL ASSISTANCE (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1951.

It was necessary during the year to implement this section on five occasions. This section relates to the compulsory removal to hospital or other institution of persons not receiving proper care and attention in their own homes.

Two elderly gentlemen and three elderly ladies were moved, four into hospital and one into St. Mary's Home for the elderly. The three ladies died shortly after admission to hospital. The two gentlemen have now been transferred to other homes for the elderly.

(8) NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948 - SECTION 50

During 1971 arrangements were made for the burial of one person under this section. This was an elderly lady for whom funds were not available to arrange burial.

DOMICILIARY MIDWIFERY AND HOME NURSING

Eleven nurses are employed full-time in the Borough by the County Council on Home Nursing duties. Two whole-time midwives and one combined duties nurse (i.e. midwifery and home nursing) are also employed full-time.

HEALTH VISITING

Eight whole-time Health Visitors/School Nurses operate in the Borough, their duties including visiting children from the age of 2 weeks until 15 years of age. A steadily increasing proportion of their time is spent in the care of the aged. In addition they attend the various clinics, follow-up notifications of infectious diseases, visit tuber-culosis patients at home, investigate social conditions relating to applications for service of Home Helps, boarding out of children or adoption of children. A Health Visitor is also employed whole-time for the domiciliary visiting of diabetic and special clinic patients.

HOME HELP SERVICE

Home Helps are available (on application supported by Medical evidence) to render temporary assistance in the homes of applicants in the following categories, viz:-

- (i) Women having domiciliary confinement;
- (ii) Persons requiring help because of sickness or pregnancy of housewife or her absence in hospital;
 - (iii) Other cases of acute illness, particularly of children where there is a number of healthy children to be cared for, and
 - (iv) Aged persons or chronic sick persons.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

An Ambulance Depot (open day and night) is maintained at Dean Road, Scarborough, where Ambulance Service facilities are available on request by Hospital Medical Staff, General Practitioners, Police Officers and, in cases of sudden emergency, members of the public.

AFTER-CARE OF TUBERCULOSIS AND OTHER ILLNESS

By arrangement, the Scarborough and District Council of Social Service provides, on behalf of the North Riding County Council, after-care facilities for tuberculosis patients as well also for those suffering from other illnesses.

Additional bedding, clothing etc., can be provided and loan of sick room equipment obtained, on recommendations by doctors and or district nurses.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR, 1971.

I have pleasure in submitting my seventeenth Annual Report on the work of the Public Health Inspectors.

Mr. J.A. Mann, Public Health Inspector, joined the Department in March, filling the post previously held by Mr. Kaye who left in December, 1970. Mr. C. Ewing, Student Inspector, passed the Diploma Examination of the Public Health Inspectors Board in November.

During the year, the Inspectors co-operated with the North Riding County Council Planning Department in the survey of the central area of the town. Information submitted on the condition of hundreds of houses in the central area was required for the preparation by the County Planning Officer of his Report on "Scarborough Town Centre - Report One".

There was a marked increase in the number of properties infested with rodents, particularly mice, during the year when a record number of complaints was received. The up-to-date methods of baiting, using all the range of poisons available, are employed, but many infestations are proving difficult to eradicate. Some experts are suggesting that immunity to certain poisons is developing. Certainly all health authorities are hoping for a break-through in the development of new poisons to fight the menace. A large number of premises in Scarborough have a "proofing" problem. This means that holes occur in floors, skirting boards, woodwork, plaster and brickwork, allowing the rodents to move from one part of the building to another. I appealed through the local Press to all builders, plumbers and other contractors, including the Gas and Electricity Boards, to ensure that any building structures they have to break through were left in a rodent-proof condition. Central heating installations have caused countless problems, allowing rodents new access to premises. Owners are advised to check that this proofing is properly completed.

ACTION IN CONNECTION WITH UNSATISFACTORY

HOUSING CONDITIONS

1,503 visits were made under the Housing and Public Health Acts to ascertain the fitness of houses for occupation.

Clearance and Closing Procedure

One Closing Order was made and the tenant rehoused by the Corporation.

Two houses, subject to Closing Orders, were thoroughly repaired and reconditioned, and the Orders revoked. Seven sub-standard houses were demolished by the owner in connection with a school planning programme.

House Repair and Improvement Procedure

The survey of houses continued during the year, houses in certain streets being systematically inspected as to condition of repair. Notices were sent to owners where defective structural conditions were found, and all owners were informed of the Improvement Grant procedure in the cases of houses which were found to be lacking in the required amenities - a bathroom with bath, washbasin and internal water closet, a hot water installation and a sink.

Houses in Asquith Avenue, Barry's Lane, Beaconsfield Street, Ewart Street, Harcourt Avenue, Mill Lane, Milton Avenue, Mount Cottages, Mount View Avenue, Quarry Mount, Rosebery Avenue, Salisbury Street, Seamer Road and Seamer Street were inspected, and the following is a summary of the survey undertaken:

During the year, nine tenants of houses were rehoused by the Corporation on the owners undertaking to recondition the properties before re-occupation. 11 houses were reconditioned on outstanding undertakings.

Eighty nine houses, which were the subject of application for Improvement Grants, were inspected. Twenty six houses were in good structural condition; the remainder required some repairing and twenty seven of those were satisfactorily repaired during the year.

74 complaints regarding miscellaneous items of disrepair and dampness were investigated. The following is a summary of action taken under the repairs sections of the Public Health and Housing Acts.

51 applications for Qualification Certificates under the Housing Act, 1969, were dealt with.

Overcrowding

Two cases of overcrowding were investigated. One tenant was re-housed by the Corporation and the other case was abated by a reduction in the number of occupants of the premises.

Hotels and Boarding Houses

Inspections were again carried out of premises for which application had been made to advertise in the Scarborough Holiday Guide, comprising hotels, boarding houses and holiday flatlets. Twenty one complaints from visitors alleging unsatisfactory conditions in accommodation were investigated.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The two rodent operatives dealt with 937 complaints of infestation received during the year. 5,300 visits were made to dwelling houses, business premises etc.

The Corporation Tip and allotments, and the Harbour and piers were subject to regular inspection and baiting. The sewers in the Borough were treated four times during the year, the poison used being fluoroacetamide.

The Public Health Inspectors are responsible for special inspection of premises found to be infested. They generally supervise the work of the rodent operatives, taking charge where defective drains or building structures are found. Routine visits to food premises include a survey for rodents and other insect pests. Fifteen notices involving structural defects etc. were complied with.
