Re-adjustment of the boundaries of the Rural District due to the incorporation of the Eastfield Estate in the boundaries of the Borough of Scarborough, with effect from 1st April 1953.

The above table shows the principal Vital Statistics for the last 4 years. They have been arranged in this way so that members can more easily appreciate the trends indicated. The figures themselves, where small populations are involved, can be misleading. For the same reason the actual numbers are given as well as the rates.

In spite of this however, in Infant Mortality Rate of NIL must always give rise to great satisfaction, however misleading it may be. We may be saved from complacency by remembering that there were 3 Still-Births during the year and these after all, are only infants whose deaths occurred before birth.

The low birth-rate and the falling population are effects, primarily of economic factors and therefore concern the Public Health workers only indirectly. However slight these trends may be, they can hardly be regarded as indicating a healthy and thriving community. No one with the interests of the district at heart, can regard them with equanimity.

Infectious Diseases

Little change in the type of infectious diseases notified, took place during the year. Fewer cases of measles occurred - 23 against 49 in 1953. Fewer cases of Whooping Cough were notified. No cases of Diphtheria, the Enteric Group of Fevers, or of Infantile Paralysis were notified during 1954.

National Assistance Act, 1948

Again no action was required during the year 1954 on behalf of the Rural District Council under S.47 of this Act, nor under S.50. S.47 deals with compulsory removal to hospital of persons in need of care and attention. S.50 concerns the burial by a Local Authority of any person for whom no other arrangements have been, or are being, made.

Water Supplies

The Rural District is favoured with an abundance of water. Unfortunately, owing to the geological pecularities of the area, all sources are subject to more or less surface contamination. This fact and the scattered population groups which have to be served, has led to the provision of a number of small supplies, public and private, all of which have to be supervised closely. The present position is expensive to maintain and unsatisfactory. The Water and Sewerage Committee have given long consideration to the problem and it is to be hoped that as a result of their deliberations, some at least, of these small unsuitable supplies will soon be eliminated.


Food Hygiene

No special Clean Food Campaign was introduced within the Council's area, although the comparatively few food premises were included in regular tours of inspection.

Camping Sites

Caravan holidays are becoming more and more a part of the social pattern. With the increase in use of caravans, the Sanitary Inspector's work of supervision has extended and the higher standard of sanitation and amenities asked for by the Committee is being achieved.

HOUSING

During 1954 the Council erected 2 new houses; a further 29 were built under private enterprise.

The allocation of new Council houses under the points system continued in operation. Applications presenting some medical aspect were referred to the Medical Officer of Health. The 342 houses on sites owned by the Council have been surveyed and reports on numbers of occupants and conditions of cleanliness and decoration submitted to the Council.

During the year 133 houses were surveyed under the Housing Act, 1949. Of these, 62 were satisfactory in all respects, 26 had minor defects, 10 required repairs or structural alterations, 25 were found to be suitable for improvement under the Housing Act, 1949 and 10 were unfit. One case of overcrowding was found and the tenant was re-housed in a Council House.

Five dwellings were demolished as a result of informal procedure under Sec. 11 of the Housing Act, 1936. Twenty-three unfit or defective houses were rendered fit during the year as a result of informal action under the Public Health and Housing Acts.

FATER SUPPLIES

A constant watch was maintained upon the water supplies within the Council's area, samples being taken weekly and submitted for analysis. The shortage of water to the houses on the Racecourse Road, East Ayton, was remedied by the provision of a link main. The Snainton water supply from Troutsdale was carried forward to Brompton, and the old Brompton Supply cut off.

(i) Ayton

49 samples of water were taken from the chlorinated supply and submitted for bacteriological examination. Of these, 47 were Class I and 2 were Class IV. In addition 52 samples of unchlorinated water from this district were submitted for analysis. 80 Lovibond tests were made in connection with the chlorinated supply. The Thornton Varley Spring was temporarily incorporated into the village supply during the dry season, all samples from this source proving satisfactory, and the water supply to the villages of East and West Ayton was satisfactorily maintained.

(ii) Burniston and Cloughton

The supply was maintained satisfactorily. Two complaints were received regarding discoloration of the water.

Brompton

94 samples of water were taken from the chlorinated supply and submitted for bacteriological examination. Of these, 92 were Class I and 2 were Class IV. 141 Lovibond tests were made. The water supply to Brompton is now derived from the Snainton mains.

(iv) Hutton Buscel, Wykeham and Ruston

47 samples of water were taken from this private chlorinated supply, of which 41 proved to be Class I and 6 Class IV. 75 Lovibond tests were made. The supply was more satisfactory towards the end of the year, when alterations were made in the method of chlorination.

(v) Ravenscar

59 samples of water were taken from this chlorinated supply, of which 52 were Class I, 1 was Class III and 6 were Class IV. The quality of the water improved considerably towards the end of the year. 57 Lovibond tests were made, and the supply was maintained satisfactorily.

(vi) Staintondale

51 samples of water were taken from this private, unchlorinated supply, of which 24 were Class I, 5 were Class II, 3 were Class III and 19 were Class IV. Users of water from this supply have been notified that all water used for drinking should first be boiled.

(vii) Snainton

88 samples of water were taken from the chlorinated supply, of which 83 proved to be Class I and 5 were Class IV. 115 Lovibond tests were made. In addition 39 samples were taken from springs and collecting chambers before chlorination.

General

An analysis of the results of all water samples taken during the year are given at Appendix 'C'. Numbers of Dwelling Houses and Population on public water mains are given at Appendix 'B'.

DRAINAGE

(i) Seamer Regional Sewerage Scheme

Seventy further premises have been connected to the Seamer Regional Sewerage Scheme, and samples taken of the effluent from the Sewage Works have proved to be satisfactory.

(ii) General

Sewerage schemes for the purishes of Gristhorpe, Lebberston, Hutton Buscel, Wykeham and Ruston, Brompton and Sawdon, Snainton and Burniston and Cloughton are still in obeyance.

CAMPING

The 29 licensed camping sites within the District were kept under observation, and the conditions prevailing at two of the larger camps were improved considerably by the provision of lavatory accommodation, drainage and piped water supplies, and the reduction in the size of the camping area on both grounds. On each camping ground the caravans are restricted to one large field.

TIPS

Conditions on all tips have been fair, and disinfestation has taken place frequently.

FOOD HYGIENE

No special Clean Food Campaign was introduced with the Council's area, although the comparatively few food premises were included in regular tours of inspection.

There are 76 food premises within the area, comprised of the following types of business:

There are no premises within the District where ice-cream is manufactured by means of Heat Treatment, but one person manufactures ice-cream by the Cold Mix Method. Twenty premises are registered for the sale of pre-packed ice-cream.

There are 11 registered dairies within the District.

20 milk retailers premises were inspected during the year, 35 premises were inspected in connection with the preparation of food stuffs, and 20 inspections were made of premises used for the manufacture or sale of ice-cream.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES

Licences were granted to 5 applicants in respect of slaughter houses within the Council's area, and the premises have been inspected regularly in addition to the visits made in connection with the inspection of meat.
