Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year ended 31st December, 1956

To the Chairman and Members of the Scarborough Rural District Council -Mr. Chairman, My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1956.

As will be seen, the vital statistics for 1956, are, on the whole satisfactory. As usual small variations in actual numbers produce large changes in the rates.

The table of causes of death shows nothing unusual, while notified infectious diseases show a marked decline.

The Council's water supplies have, in general, been satisfactory. Two supplies in Staintondale, as will be seen from the Public Health Inspector's Report, have produced a number of unsatisfactory samples. It is to be hoped that the Council's supply will soon be available for this area.

I have pleasure in acknowledging the continued interest and encouragement of the Committee and the help and co-operation I have received from Mr. Foulkes and the other officials of the Council.

National Assistance Act 1948

Again no action was required during the year 1956 on behalf of the Rural District Council under Section 47 of this Act, nor under Section 50.

Section 47 deals with the compulsory removal to hospital or other institutions of persons in need of care and attention, and not receiving it from any other person. Section 50 refers to the burial by a Local Authority of any person for whom no arrangements have been made.

The following part of this Report was prepared by Mr. Foulkes, the Public Health Inspector viz:

HOUSING

Thirty houses were built by private enterprise during 1956.

Twenty-eight houses were re-inspected under the Housing Acts, and two unfit houses were rendered fit during the year as a result of formal action under the Public Health and Housing Acts. No houses were demolished.

WATER SUPPLIES

Ø Denotes information supplied by Council's Water Engineer.

Samples were taken from the water supplies within the Council's area periodically and submitted for analysis. With the exception of two private supplies the results, on the whole, have been satisfactory.

(i) Ayton

Forty-three samples of water taken from the supply after chlorination proved to be satisfactory when submitted to bacteriological examination, and 44 Lovibond tests gave satisfactory chlorine residuals. The Thornton Varley Spring was again used to augment the supply during the summer months, and no shortages occurred. Twelve samples of water taken from this spring (before chlorination) all proved to be highly satisfactory.

Two hundred and ninty-three yards of 3" water main were laid in the
 north eastern and north western sectors of Betton Rise, East Ayton, and
 connected to the Council's water main in Racecourse Road, in order to supply
 a proposed new housing development.

(ii) Burniston and Cloughton

The supply was maintained satisfactorily and a sample taken from this source proved to be highly satisfactory.

Work commenced on the laying of 2,350 Yds. of 4" water main to connect the Cloughton mains to be Stainton Dale mains at Bridge Farm, Stainton Dale, in order that the Parish of Stainton Dale (including the village of Ravenscar) can be supplied from the Scalby U.D.C: Bulk supply.

A new private borchole was sunk at Cloughton, and samples taken from this source eventually proved to be highly satisfactory after some initial unsatisfactory samples.

One sample of water taken from a new private borehole for chemical analysis proved to be satisfactory.

Water Supplies (Cont.)

(iii) Snainton, Brompton and Sawdon

Forty-three samples of water taken from this supply after chlorination proved to be satisfactory upon analysis. Of 4 samples taken from the unchlorinated supply 2 were highly satisfactory and 2 unsatisfactory upon analysis.

Work commenced upon the sinking of a borehole at Nettledale Lane, Snainton, with a view to providing an alternative source of supply to the Troutsdale Springs.

(iv) Hutton Buscel, Wykeham and Ruston

Of 43 samples of water taken from this private supply, 41 were satisfactory and 2 unsatisfactory upon analysis.

(v) Ravenscar

Of 35 samples of water taken after chlorination, 35 were satisfactory and 2 unsatisfactory upon analysis. One sample of the unchlorinated water proved to be satisfactory.

(vi) Stainton Dale

Of 34 samples of water taken from the unchlorinated Stainton Dale Private Supply for analysis, 7 were highly satisfactory, 5 satisfactory, 2 suspicious and 20 unsatisfactory. Of 24 samples of water taken from the Parish Well at Stainton Dale, which is also not chlorinated, 2 were highly satisfactory, 1 satisfactory and 21 unsatisfactory.

(vii) Harwood Dalo

Of 2 samples of water taken from private sources, 1 was highly satisfactory and the other unsatisfactory upon analysis.

(viii) Cayton, Seamer, Irton and Lebberston

The Scarborough Corporation supply to these parishes was satisfactorily maintained.

(ix) Gristhorpe

The Filey U.D.C. supply to the above parish remained satisfactory.

(x) General
An analysis of the results of all water samples taken during the year is given at Appendix 'B'. Numbers of Dwelling Houses and Population on public water mains are given at Appendix 'C'.

DRAINAGE

(i) Soamer Regional Sewerage Scheme

Fifty-three further premises have been connected to the Seamer Regional Sewerage System, and samples taken of the effluent from the 'Sewage Works have proved to be satisfactory.

(ii) General

Sewerage schemes for the parishes of Gristhorpe, Lebberston, Hutton Buscel, Wykeham and Ruston, Brompton and Sawdon, Snainton, and Burniston and Cloughton, are still in abeyance.

CAMPING

The 44 licensed camping sites within the District were kept under observation, and with one exception the conditions prevailing at these camping grounds were found to be satisfactory. The unsatisfactory conditions prevailing at the one camp had not been rectified by the end of the camping season as promised by the proprietor, and renewal of this licence for the year 1957 was refused when application was made to the Health and Housing Committee in December 1956.

TIPS

Conditions on all the Council's tips have been fair, and the tips have been disinfested frequently.

FOOD HYGIENE

No special Clean Food Campaign was introduced within the Council's Area, although the comparatively few food premises were included in regular tours of inspection. The Food and Drugs Act 1955 and Food Hygiene Regulations 1955 came into operation on the 1st January 1956.
