Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year ended 31st December, 1963

TO:- The Chairman and Members of the Scarborough Rural District Council.

Madam Chairman, My Lord and Gentlemen,

Years of more or less disappointment have made me wary of indulging in print, any great enthusiasm over one year's vital statistics. The next year's figures usually bring one back to reality with a jolt.

This year, however, the temptation is overwhelming. There can surely be little wrong with the health of a community in which the birth rate is well above the national average and the death rate well below. In these two figures are measured the essentials of human existence.

There is little else to note in the first section of the report. The two cases of paratyphoid mentioned, occurred in one family and there were no secondary cases. It was not possible to determine the source of the infection.

I acknowledge with thanks the continued help of the Council's officials and the courtesy and consideration of the Committee.

#### National Assistance Act, 1948, S. 47

Again it was not necessary during the year to take action on behalf of the Authority under this Section which deals with the compulsory removal to hospital or other institutions of persons in need of care and attention and not receiving it from any other person.

The following part of this Report was prepared by Mr. W.G.G. Lewis, the Public Health Inspector, viz:-

### HOUSING

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Development by private enterprise continued to expand during 1963 and 204 new houses were completed, compared with 170 in 1962. No new dwellings were erected by the Council.

At the end of the year the Council resolved to make its first clearance area. This is situated at Cloughton and contains thirteen dwellings as well as a number of other buildings. It is proposed to re-develop the site and erect twelve old person's bungalows.

### HOUSING (CONTINUED)

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During the year three unfit houses were closed and twentyseven repaired as a result of informal action. No houses were demolished.....

Applications for grant under the Housing Repairs and Rents Act, 1954, during 1963 were as follows:-

Twenty-one applications for a discretionary grant and eight applications for a standard grant were approved. This makes a total of 199 grants approved by the Council since the Act came into force. The fact that the regional sewage disposal scheme should shortly be completed is expected to result in a considerable increase in grant applications during the coming year.

#### WATER SUPPLIES

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In addition, 23 tests were made of the chlorine content of the private chlorinated supply supplying Wykeham, Ruston and part of Hutton Buscel. On two occasions these tests revealed a breakdown in the chlorination plant, which was immediately rectified.

DRAINAGE

## (i) General

During the year work has progressed on the regional sewage disposal scheme and has been largely completed, apart from house connections, in Snainton, Brompton, Sawdon, Ruston, Wykeham and Hutton Buscel. The Osgodby Lane area at Cayton was completed and it is hoped to start work at Burniston and Cloughton early in 1964.

The extensions to Seamer Sewage Disposal Vorks have been completed.

## (ii) Connections to the Sewer

During the year 204 new houses were erected and of these 195 were connected to the Council's sewers, in addition 167 existing properties were connected, some by private individuals and some by the Council. The number of houses not connected to the sewer at 31.12.63 was 1,477.

During the year 170 visits of inspection were made and some site operators required to carry out work. The general standard of the sites in the area is good and the majority of the site operators are co-operative.

## REFUSE DISPOSAL

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Total

The Council has operated a refuse collection service throughout the majority of its area, providing a fortnightly collection in the more developed parishes and a monthly collection in the more remote and scattered areas, the disposal being by means of controlled tipping at Brompton, West Ayton and Burniston, . The cost of providing this service during 1963 was £5,884.

## REFUSE DISPOSAL (CONTINUED)

The number of new dwellings erected has resulted in the service running late and a large amount of overtime being worked but it is anticipated that the Council's decision to purchase a tractor and a covered trailer will relieve the position for another year after which the purchase of an additional vehicle becomes inevitable in order to maintain the service. The purchase of a tractor with a dozer blade will also do much to ensure that the tips can be properly maintained.

The new depot building to house the refuse and other vehicles at Seamer Sewage Works was completed by the end of the year,

FOOD HYGIENE

No special Clean Food Campaign was introduced within the Council's area, but 52 visits were made for the purpose of checking compliance with the Food Hygiene Regulations.

There are no premises in the Rural District where ice-cream is manufactured by means of heat treatment.

# SLAUGHTERHOUSES

The licences of the five slaughterhouses within the Rural District were renewed upon application by the owners, and the premises have been inspected regularly in addition to the visits made in connection with the inspection of meat. All premises were found to be satisfactory. The licensee of one slaughterhouse has given notice that he intends to convert his premises to a shop during 1964. A 100% inspection was carried out of animals slaughtered in the Rural District.

#### 1958 Regulations

A survey was made of all slaughterhouses and notices served upon the owners with respect to the defects found. All premises now comply with the above-named regulations.
