### Prevalence of and Control over Infectious Diseases

#### SCARLET FEVER.

33 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during 1942 as against 15 for 1941.

All cases were admitted to hospital and all recovered.

#### DIPHTHERIA.

During 1942, 27 cases of Diphtheria were notified as against 26 in 1941, 2 deaths occurred.

#### CONTROL OF INFECTION.

All cases were notified by telephone and removed without delay to your hospital.

As in the past eight years the throats of all 'contacts' were swabbed in order to detect any 'carriers' and injections of anti-toxin offered free of charge.

Sixteen injections of anti-toxin were given to Diphtheria 'contacts' mainly children, and 145 throat swabs taken.

Control of infection - continued -

All 'carriers' discovered were warned as to their condition and 'swabbed' until free from infection.

DIPHTHERIA PROPHYLAXIS.

Under a Ministry of Health Circular asking Local Authorities to secure the immunisation of as many children as possible, in order to meet the increased risks which inevitably arise out of wartime conditions, this Council prepared a scheme whereby children of and under school age could be immunised by Medical Practitioners of the Area at clinics set up in the schools within the district.

Under this scheme, which commenced in August 1941, 2,663 children between the ages of 1 and 15 years were immunised during 1942.

The whole of the organisation, supervision and advertisement of this scheme is carried out by your Public Health Department.

THE ISOLATION HOSPITAL.

Ninety two cases were admitted to your Isolation Hospital during 1942, as against 71 in 1941.

Eighty one of these cases came from the Sedgefield Rural District, the remaining eleven being non-civilians, or brought in from outside the district.

CANCER. During 1942, Cancer was given as the cause of death in 43 cases.

NOTIFICATION OF TUBERCULOSIS.

This continues to be satisfactory. No cases of wilful neglect to notify occurred during the year. There were 14 deaths from all forms of tuberculosis, all of which were notified during life.
