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

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SECTION I.

NATURAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE DISTRICT.

SITUATION.—The Rural District of Selby is situated in the West Riding of the County of York, and embraces an area of considerable extent. It lies in a South-Easterly direction, and extends from the Village of Cawood on the North, to the River Aire on the South; and from the Village of Little Fenton on its North-Western extremity, to a point on the River Aire opposite to the Village of Airmyn on the South-East, with the exception of a portion lying in the Northern half of the District, which includes the Market Town of Selby, and forms the Selby Urban District. On the North and North-East its boundary is formed by the River Ouse, on the South and South-West by the River Aire, and on the West it is in part contiguous to the Pontefract Rural District, and in the remaining part to the Rural District of Tadcaster.

EXTENT.—In extent the District comprises an area of 82,922 acres, containing 19 Villages, and a total population of 6,313; and it has a gross rateable value of £70,833.

Physical Features.—The entire District is low-lying and flat, being a part of the great Plain of York. At two places only does it attain a height of 100 feet, the average altitude of the whole District being only 18 feet above sea level. On one of these elevations, in the Parish of Brayton, are situated the Pumping Station and Reservoir in connection with the Water Works of the Selby Urban Council; and on the other at Gateforth a disused mansion has been converted into a Sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculous patients from the City of Leeds.

Drainage.—The District is drained by the River Ouse on its Northern and North-Eastern borders, and on the South and South-West by the River Aire. Running through the Centre of the District is the Selby Canal, which serves as a connecting water-way between the Ouse and the Aire, and forms a part of the Drainage of the District.

Geology.—The District lies on the new red sandstone, of which there is a considerable outcrop in the West. Inclining towards the East the sandstone lies at a greater depth, the upper strata consisting of clay overlying beds of gravel and sand.

Social Features.—The population is almost wholly occupied in agriculture. There are several Villages of some extent within the District, notably Cawood in the North, Hambleton on its Western side, and Carlton in the South.

SMALL-POX HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATION.

THE PONTEFRACT, TADCASTER, AND SELBY JOINT HOSPITAL.

SITUATION.—Sherburn-in-Elmet—8 miles from Selby.

Accommodation.—Up to the middle of the year this consisted of 14 beds,—in two large and six small wards. In August last a re-adjustment of the constituent authorities was effected, the Wetherby Rural Authority leaving, and the Hemsworth Joint Hospital Board joining the combination. In order to provide the additional accommodation for the increased population (Hemsworth possessing a population of 50,000 and Wetherby 14,600), the Hospital is being enlarged by 10 beds, and the work is now in progress. On an estimate of one bed per 5,000 population, the Hospital accommodation should now suffice under ordinary conditions for approximately 100,000 population. The capacity allowed per bed is 144 sq. ft., with 12 ft. linear between beds.

From the above Table it will be seen that there are 1,440 houses with a rental not exceeding £26 per annum.

In 1919 the Medical Officer of Health personally surveyed the Housing Conditions in the Rural District, and laid a Special Report upon the subject before the District Council. The District Council was advised that they should build 128 houses, and at a subsequent Meeting of the Council it was decided that this number should be increased to 134.

The Building Scheme was ultimately abandoned, and no houses have been erected.

General Housing Conditions.—In the Survey of 1919, 61 cases of overcrowding were discovered—35 legal and 26 moral—and it is hardly likely that the conditions are any better to-day in view of the fact that no material attempt has been made to provide further housing accommodation. The Sanitary Inspector reports that there is a shortage of houses in the Villages of Brayton, Camblesforth, Wistow, and Cawood; and during the past year the Camblesforth Parish Council sent a communication to the District Council, in which they pointed out the scarcity of houses in that Parish.

Many of the cottages are deficient in bedroom accommodation no less than 41 % of the total number being provided with two bedrooms only.

The Housing Inspector reports that the general character of the defects consist of leaking roofs, dampness, etc., and that these defects are generally due to the negligence of owners for years past. He also states that many owners are financially unable to carry out the necessary repairs.

Housing Deficiency.—Of the 30 houses built in the District during the past five years, 7 were built without any financial aid, and two were Almshouses, erected as a War Memorial, and are occupied by aged people. Even supposing that the balance of 21 houses are all occupied by bona-fide residents of the villages, they do not go very far towards the total of 134 which the District Council considered necessary in 1919.

Practically speaking, the real difficulty in the solution of the Housing Problem in the Rural Districts is the question of rents. The workers on the land are entirely unable to pay the rents which are demanded for new class property. I am, however, convinced that much of the existing insanitary property can be made much more healthy and habitable if only the necessary attention is paid to it.

HOUSING CONSOLIDATED REGULATIONS, 1925.

Section 29 of these Regulations reads of follows ;-

"Records of the Inspections of Houses made under and for the purposes of Section 8 of the Act, shall be prepared under the direction and supervision of the Medical Officer of Health, and shall be kept by the Officer of the Local Authority making the inspection."

The Card Index System has been adopted for recording the results of the inspection, and the cards are filed in the Office of the Sanitary Inspector.

Section 28 of the Regulations also reads:-

"The Inspections under and for the purposes Section 8 of the Act shall be made by the Medical Officer of Health or by an Officer designated by the Local Authority, but acting under his direction and supervision, and the Officer making the inspection of any house shall examine the state of the house in relation to the following matters, namely:—

- 1. The arrangements for preventing the contamination of the water supply.
- 2. Closet accommodation.
- 3. Drainage.
- The condition of the house in regard to light, the free circulation of air, dampness, and cleanliness.
- The paving, drainage, and sanitary condition of any yard, or outhouses belonging to or occupied with the house.
- The arrangement for the deposit of refuse and ashes.
- The existence of any room which would by virtue of Subsection (1) of Section 8 of the H.A. be a house so dangerous or injurious to health as to be unfit for human habitation.
- 8. Any defects in other matters which may tend to render the house dangerous or injurious to the health of the habitant.

Under these Regulations the Council is responsible for the systematic inspection of some 1,400 houses.

Reference to the Sanitary Inspector's Table at the end of this Section shows that 26 houses were inspected during the past year.

In the Annual Report for the year 1924, the Medical Officer of Health dealt very fully with the matter of the milk supply of the Rural District. It was pointed out that 80 % of the cowsheds were deficient in light and ventilation; 14 % of the cowsheds were overcrowded, and 33 % possessed defective drainage.

In the summary of the work done during the past year, it is shown that 2 sheds have been provided with new floors, 1 with increased cubic space per cow, and 3 with increased light and ventilation.

I must repeat the statement made in the Report for the year 1923:—
"It is obvious, therefore, that much work remains to be done in this direction before the necessary improvement in the milk premises in the Rural Area is obtained."

Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1925.

—The object of these Regulations is to prevent, so far as possible, any person who is aware that he is suffering from Tuberculosis of the respiratory tract from entering upon or continuing in any employment or occupation in connection with a dairy which would involve the milking of cows, the treatment of milk, or the handling of vessels used for containing milk.

No action has been called for under these Regulations during the year.

PUBLIC HEALTH (PNEUMONIA) REGULATIONS, 1919.

Primary Pneumonia ... 5 cases were notified.
