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

VITAL STATISTICS.

POPULATION 5,703

BIRTH RATE.

78 births—37 males and 41 females—were registered, furnishing a birth rate of 13.6 per 1,000 population, compared with a rate of 14.4 for the previous year.

The rate for England and Wales is 15.1.

Still Births.—There were 2 still births, furnishing a still birth rate of .35 compared with .60 for England and Wales.

DEATH RATE.

65 deaths—32 males and 33 females—were registered, furnishing a death rate of 11.3 per 1,000 population, compared with a rate of 11.9 per the previous year.

The rate for England and Wales is 11.6.

In order that the death rate of the area may be comparable with the crude death rate of the country as a whole, the Registrar General has supplied a comparability figure of .86 by which the crude death rate must be multiplied, i.e., $11.3 \times .86 = 9.7$.

INFANTILE MORTALITY RATE.

The Notification of Births Act, 1907-1915.

The above Act is administered by the County Council, and a Health Visitor is resident in the town of Selby, who is responsible for the home visiting under the Act.

Three infants died under one year of age.
