To the Chairman and Members of the Selby Rural District Council. Gentlemen.

I have the honour to present to you my second Annual Report on on the health of the District and the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1948.

The health of the District was reasonably good, but there was an appreciable increase in the number of infectious cases notified. This was due primarily to measles, which was troublesome towards the end of the year, and secondarily, to a sharp outbreak of scarlet fever in Cawood betweent he end of October and mid-December. Altogether nineteen cases occurred in that parish and it was found advisable to close the school for two weeks.

No cases of poliomyelitis were reported during the year, and for the second year in succession the District was free from diphtheria.

A provisional table showing the percentage of immunised children according to existing record cards is included in the Report. A figure of 45% is quite inconsistent with the figure of 77% recorded in the Annual Report for 1946 and also with the intensive campaign carried out by Dr. W. Bertram Hill. Obviously the records are incomplete and will have to be amplified by information from other sources. It will be seen from the Vital Statistics that there was a substantial

It will be seen from the Vital Statistics that there was a substantial fall in the Birth Rate from 19.3 to 17.2; a similar fall was general throughout the country. The Death Rate was down slightly and the Infantile Mortality Rate at 29 well below the new record of 34 for England and Wales.

On the 5th July, the National Health Service Act, 1946, came into operation, but as the Part III services were already administered by the West Riding County Council, little change occurred.

Monthly specialists' clinics for Pædiatrics (diseases of children) and Orthopædics (deformities) were established in Goole to serve the Division, and a weekly session for remedial exercises conducted by a physiotherapeutist is now held in Selby.

A Home Help service to provide domestic assistance for mothers during the lying-in period and for cases of chronic sickness recommended by the doctors was inaugurated.

The Joint Isolation Hospital was transferred to the Regional Hospital Board after continuous service since 1905. Approximately 470 cases from the Rural District were admitted to the Hospital during that period.

The whole of the District south of Selby town has never had the services of a Home Nurse. Free nursing in the home is provided for under the new Act, but this essential service is in abeyance, and likely to remain in abeyance, until accommodation for a nurse is available.

I would draw your attention to the Sanitary Inspector's remarks under Sewerage. In my opinion adequate sewage disposal plants for the larger villages are an urgent necessity.

Requests for permission to use temporary or moveable dwellings are becoming more frequent and will continue to be made until the acute housing shortage is alleviated. The strict attitude of the Council to these requests is commendable, and every effort should be made to keep this type of dwelling to the absolute minimum.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Members and Officials of the Council for their co-operation and consideration during 1948.

REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1948.

Water Supply.

The Selby R.D.C. is the water undertaker for the whole of the District. Water is obtained in bulk from the Selby Urban District Council's deep wells at Brayton Barff, and is of excellent quality. Temporary hardness is 8.4° (Clarke's scale), and permanent hardness 9.8° (Clarke's scale), and chlorination is carried out at the source. No samples were taken by the R.D.C.'s inspector during 1948, but samples taken by the Urban District Council were satisfactory in all cases.

Approximately 98% of the population has a public water supply laid on to or within a reasonable distance of their houses. The Council have under consideration extensions of its mains to supply 9 farms and 10 houses, and the County Agricultural Committee has been invited to contribute towards the cost of the works.

850 yards of 3" Asbestos Cement pipes were laid during the year to augment the supply to Gateforth Sanatorium. Since the work was done no further complaints have been received.

Sewerage.

There are no sewage disposal works in the district with the exception of the plants solely dealing with sewage from service establishments. Sewage is dealt with by retention in septic tanks and thence into open dykes, and in the more built-up parts of the district, notably at Brayton and Carlton, nuisances are created by this means. The whole of the district has been surveyed by Consultant Engineers, and schemes for sewerage and sewage disposal have been prepared.

Approximately 54 yards of sewers have been relaid at Hambleton and West Haddlesey during the year.

Scavenging.

On December 1st, 1948, the Council undertook the collection of house refuse within the whole district. Two 'Karrier' seven cubic yard motor refuse collectors have been acquired, each manned by a crew of three men.

Refuse is tipped on six tips in the district, and every endeavour is made to comply with the recommendations of the Ministry of Health on Controlled Tipping.

Housing and Public Health Inspections.

It is regrettable that due to pressure of other duties it has not been possible to devote the requisite amount of time to the survey of Working-class houses as recommended in the Hobhouse Report, but the more urgent defects are being dealt with chiefly by informal action. One Statutory Notice was served during the year, the terms of the notice being complied with.

Food Inspection.

Regular inspections have been carried out at milk producing farms, which are kept generally in a satisfactory state. Several defects have been remedied without resort to statutory action. Food shops also are kept in a satisfactory condition.

No meat for sale is slaughtered within the area, but the slaughter of cottagers' pigs is carried on, on a fairly substantial scale. No legal facilities exist for the inspection of these carcases, and one wonders what proportion of this meat is, in fact, unfit for human consumption.

Rodent Control.

The Council do not employ a rodent operative, but rat destruction at the refuse tips is let by contract to the County Agricultural Pests Department, which regularly carries out inspections and treatment.

Disinfection of Premises.

Upon receipt of a notification of a notifiable infectious disease, the premises are visited and disinfected by means of formaldehyde. Three such disinfections were carried out during the year.
