Chairman and Members of the Selby Rural District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my Thirteenth Annual Report on the health of the Selby Rural District and the work of the Public Health Department during 1959.

93 live births were registered, giving a Birth Rate of 13.8 per thousand population (Adjusted Birth Rate 15.0). The aggregate rate for W.R. Rural Districts was 17.6 and for England and Wales 16.5.

The Infant Mortality Rate was 43.0 (4 deaths). The W.R. Rural Rate was 24.0 and the National Rate was 22.0, a new low record.

66 deaths occurred, giving a Crude Death Rate of 9.8 (Adjusted Death Rate 10.6). The W.R. Rural Rate was 9.4 and the Rate for England and Wales 11.6. Of these deaths 24 (36.3%) occurred at the age of 75 years or over, and of these 17 were over 80 years of age and two over 90 years. Births exceeded deaths by 27.

143 cases of notifiable infectious disease occurred, 138 being measles.

Immunisation against the following diseases is freely available through the Public Health Service and general practitioners: diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, poliomyelitis, smallpox, and, for selected cases, tuberculosis. The use of a triple antigen for the first three has reduced the number of injections necessary. Vaccination against poliomyelitis is now offered to all between the ages of 6 months and 40 years and supplies of vaccine are adequate.

In conclusion, I record my thanks to the Members and Officers of the Council for their co-operation during 1959.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR 1959

Water Supply.

Mains water is supplied to all parishes by the Council, which is the water undertaker for the whole of the District.

Water is purchased in bulk from Selby Urban District Council, and is obtained from deep boreholes in the red sandstone at Brayton Barff, which is situated in the Selby Rural District.

Chlorination is carried out at the source, but no other treatment has been found necessary.

A mains extension scheme involving $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles of 4 inch main has been laid in the parishes of Cawood and Wistow; this has had the effect of providing a ring main to the two villages, and relieving the annual complaints of water shortage and lack of pressure.

Sewerage,

Satisfactory sewerage systems exist in the parish of Barlow, and in part of Carlton, where a new disposal plant has been installed. Only about one third of the village of Carlton has been sewered, but the disposal works are designed ultimately to deal with the whole village and with the village of Camblesforth.

The Thorpe Willoughby sewerage scheme is to be commenced early in 1960. A disposal plant formerly used in connection with a Service establishment has been acquired for this purpose.

A new scheme is also in course of preparation for Brayton, where a large amount of new building is proceeding.

The five small disposal plants at Council housing sites have been well maintained and are functioning satisfactorily.

The Council possess an 800 gallon mechanical cesspool emptying vehicle, and a free service for domestic tanks is maintained, there being a charge for emptying all other types of tanks.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

House refuse is collected throughout the district by direct labour.

It has been found necessary during the year to replace one of the existing 7 cubic yard collection vehicles with an 18 cubic yard Karrier Dual tip vehicle. It is intended that this vehicle will carry out the bulk of the refuse collection, the other 7 cubic yard vehicle being used for ashpit collection.

Disposal is effected on four tips at widely dispersed points and every endeavour is made to keep the tips in satisfactory condition. A search is now being made for alternative sites for tipping, as the existing tips are being rapidly filled.

Housing and Public Health Inspections.

Routine inspection of house property is carried out as circumstances permit and complaints are investigated without delay.

Remedies are effected largely by a personal visit to the owner and, in appropriate cases, informal notices are served. No circumstances have arisen which have necessitated statutory action by the Council.

Food Inspection.

The standard of cleanliness in food shops has been maintained at a satisfactory level, and no action has been necessary apart from verbal advice. There are no ice cream manufacturing premises in the district, but a number of traders are licensed to sell prepacked ice cream.

The three dairies in the district subject to the Council's supervision have been well maintained.

There are five licensed slaughterhouses in the district, all of which are kept in a satisfactory manner. Inspection of all food animals slaughtered for human consumption is regularly carried out, and during the year the following number of carcases have been inspected: Bullocks and Heifers, 240; Cows, 2; Sheep, 145; Pigs, 149; Calves, 4.

Owing to the comparatively small amount of meat condemned, it is not an economical proposition to salvage it, and by arrangement with the Superintendent at Selby Baths, this material is destroyed by burning in the Baths furnace.

Rodent Control.

In conjunction with our neighbours, Derwent R.D.C., a full-time Rodent Operative is employed, and devotes one-third of his time to the Selby Rural District. The West Riding County Agricultural Committee have now discontinued their scheme to treat farm premises, and this work is now done by the Council's operative, on an annual contract basis.
