To The Chairman and Members of the Selby Rural District Council,

Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my Seventeenth Annual Report on the health of the Selby Rural District and the work of the Public Health Department during 1963.

100 live births were registered, giving a Birth Rate of 14.9 per thousand population (Adjusted Birth Rate 15.8). The aggregate rate for W.R. Rural Districts was 18.8 and for England and Wales 18.2.

The Infant Mortality Rate was 20.0 (2 deaths). The W.R. Rural Rate was 23.2 and the National Rate 20.9.

60 deaths occurred, giving a Crude Death Rate of 8.9 (Adjusted Death Rate 9.3). The W.R. Rural Rate was 10.2 and the Rate for England and Wales 12.2. Of these deaths 20 (33%) occurred at the age of 75 years or over, and of these 13 were over 80 years of age and 2 over 90 years. Births exceeded deaths by 40.

105 cases of notifiable infectious disease occurred, 98 of these being measles.

In late April a child patient transferred from Selby War Memorial Hospital to Yearsley Bridge Hospital was found to be suffering from Paratyphoid-B infection. As a result of this notification other cases of undefined diarrhoea in the area were investigated bacteriologically and two cases, one in Carlton and one in Hirst Courtney, were discovered. There was no common source of infection uncovered but about that time sporadic cases of Paratyphoid-B infection were occurring in York and the North Riding. There was a suggestion that the infection might have been introduced into the area by infected Chinese liquid egg used in the preparation of confectionery. The usual precautions were taken and no secondary cases occurred.

Cancer.

It is pleasing to report that deaths from malignant neoplasms continue to be appreciably below the national level. There can be no satisfaction, however, about the fact that four out of the six male cancer deaths were due to lung cancer. In the last ten years nineteen residents of the District have been lost through this cause. The heavy cigarette smoker continues at considerable and increasing risk. "Do-it-yourself" is popular these days, but there is nothing clever nor heroic about this "do-it-yourself" death.

Whilst it is probably futile in the face of skilful and affluent advertising to warn against the danger of cigarette smoking, I do so in the hope that many will note the risk and enjoy their cigarettes less, and a few may have the will-power to actually reform.

In general the Rural District has a good health record and the introduction of sewerage schemes should induce more town residents to take advantage of rural health as building progresses.

In conclusion, I record my thanks to the Members and Officers of the Council for their co-operation during 1963.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR 1963.

Water Supply.

The Pontefract, Goole and Selby Water Board are the water undertakers for the District. The water used in the Selby Rural Area is obtained from deep boreholes in the red sandstone at Brayton Barff. The water is chlorinated at the source; no other treatment has been found necessary. Bacteriological examinations of the water supplied have proved satisfactory.

All but two properties in the District are supplied with piped water from the public mains, but certain properties, particularly some of the older terraces of houses, share a standpipe with their neighbours. This is shown in the following table:—

Sewerage.

Satisfactory sewerage schemes now exist in the parishes of Barlow, Thorpe Willoughby, and part of Carlton.

Sewerage schemes for the parishes of Brayton, Camblesforth and the remainder of Carlton have commenced this year, and it is anticipated that they will come into operation in the latter part of 1964. With these schemes completed the most urgent need for sewerage and sewage disposal will be at Hambleton, where the Town Dike is now heavily polluted. The Council own a sewage disposal works at Thorpe Willoughby, which can be renovated and used for sewage pumped from Hambleton.

The five small disposal plants at Council housing sites have continued to function satisfactorily.

The Council's 800 gallon mechanical cesspool emptier continued to be fully employed, maintaining a free service for domestic tanks and on a rechargeable basis for all other types of tanks.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

A weekly collection of dustbins and pails has been maintained throughout the district. Refuse being collected by direct labour with a Karrier 18 cubic yard Dual Tip and a 10 cubic yard Karrier Side Loading refuse vehicle. The large amount of private development in the district has increased considerably the work of the refuse collectors and the service is now fully extended and overtime has to be worked at holiday time.

Disposal is now effected on three tips, Cawood, Wistow and Carlton. The Wistow tip is now practically filled, and the need for another tip has become very apparent, but the Council have had some success in negotiating for a nearly worked out sand quarry in the Gateforth parish, and it is hoped that 1964 will see the completion of the purchase and the necessary planning consent being granted.

The Council have made every endeavour to keep the tips in a satisfactory manner, and whilst indiscriminate use of the tips by unauthorised persons may assist in keeping the countryside tidy, the thoughtless way in which these persons deposit their refuse does not make the Council's task any easier.

Housing and Public Health Inspectons.

The routine inspection of house property is carried out whenever possible and complaints are investigated without delay.

It has been found possible to effect remedies by a personal visit to the owner, or by an informal notice, and it was not necessary to issue any statutory notices during the year.

The Council have granted 26 applications for Standard Grants during the year, the majority of them to owner occupiers.

Six owners have taken advantage of the increased grant of £20 under the Public Health Act to convert existing pail or earth closets into water closets.

Two houses have been demolished during the year, both having been previously represented as unfit, and the families rehoused.

Food Inspection.

Food traders have maintained the standard of cleanliness in their shops at a satisfactory level, and it has not been necessary for any action to be taken, except for verbal advice.

There are no ice cream manufacturing premises in the district, but a number of traders are licensed to sell pre-packed ice cream.

The four slaughterhouses in the district have all been maintained in a satisfactory manner, and all food animals slaughtered for human consumption have been inspected, but to achieve this some overtime has had to be worked, as all the slaughtering is carried out outside working hours.

The very small amount of meat it has been found necessary to condemn indicates the healthy, high quality animals the butchers in the Rural Area are buying for slaughter. For the second year in succession no tuberculosis was discovered in the slaughterhouses.

Rodent Control.

The Council now have 90 contracts with farmers in the district. Treatment is given free to private dwellings, but a charge is made for any work done on business premises.

It has been found that the majority of the complaints from private dwellings stem from the practice of throwing bread and scraps out for the birds, and although a commendable practice during a hard winter, householders should appreciate that the food should be placed out of the way of all vermin, who generally do not inhabit areas that are without a readily available food supply.
