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

To The Chairman and Members of the Selby Rural District Council.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my twentieth Annual Report on the health of the Selby Rural District and the work of the Public Health Department during 1966.

There appears to be a steady increase in the population of the District in recent years. The Registrar General estimates that the population is now 973 more than at the census of 1961. Recent development has led to the influx of new families, and this is reflected in the increased number of births.

159 live births were registered, an increase of 25, giving a Birth Rate of 21.2 per thousand populaton (Adjusted Birth Rate 23.5). The aggregate rate for W.R. Rural Districts was 18.4 and for England and Wales 17.7. The Birth Rate is the highest for forty years. I am happy to record, also, that the Infant Mortality Rate was nil for the first time; that is, no babies died in the first year of life. Also there were no stillbirths, so the Perinatal Mortality Rate was also nil. The Infant Mortality rate for the W.R. rural districts was 19.0, and the National Rate the same.

80 deaths occurred, giving a Crude Death Rate of 10.7 (Adjusted Death Rate 11.8). 35 (43%) deaths occurred at the age of 75 years or over, and of these 27 were over 80 years of age and 6 over 90. Births exceeded deaths by 79.

64 cases of notifiable infectious disease occurred, 48 of these being measles.

It became possible in November, after a long delay due to a shortage of trained laboratory technicians, to start sessions at the Selby Clinic for cancer smears to detect those women at risk from cancer of the neck of the womb. The response from the women of the Rural District was unexpectedly good, and I imagine the support given to the test by Women's Institutes had something to do with it. At the time of writing most of those registered have been tested, but there are several hundred still hesitating to apply. The scheme is open to all married women 21 years of age and over. The test takes only a few minutes and is carried out by experienced women doctors in a modern, well-equipped clinic.

Finally, I must record my thanks for the continued support by the Members and Officers of the Council during 1966.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR 1966.

Water Supply.

The Pontefact, Goole and Selby Water Board is now the water undertaker for the whole district.

Water is obtained from borehole's in the red sandstone at Brayton Barff, and is chlorinated at the source, but is not otherwise treated.

No complaints have been received during the year regarding either the quality or the adequacy of water, although it is becoming apparent that the growing number of dwellinghouses in certain parts of the district will necessitate an increased supply.

It is understood, however, that the Board are well aware of this problem and have proposals in hand to meet it.

Sewerage.

Main sewerage systems are now serving the parishes of Thorpe Willoughby, Carlton, Camblesforth, Barlow and Brayton, while a scheme for Hambleton and minor improvements to the plant at Thorpe Willoughby are awaiting approval by the Ministry.

A scheme is in the process of being worked out for the parish of Drax, and it is hoped this will be completed in the near future.

Sewage treatment plants are maintained at Thorpe Willoughby, Carlton and Burn.

It is the Council's policy to lay the branch drains to private property from the sewer to the boundary of the property, but not to carry out any drainage work on private land. This, unfortunately, has resulted in comparatively few connections being made to the new sewers, with the inevitable continuation of pollution of dikes and watercourses. With the absence of any legal amendments to the Public Health Acts, serious consideration will have to be given to the whole of the drainage work, including connections on private property, being done at the cost of the Council.

Refuse Collection and Disposal,

House refuse is collected weekly throughout the district by motor vehicles and is disposed of by tipping on three Council owned tips. Every effort is made to adhere to the recommendations of the Ministry of Health on controlled tipping, but owing to the remote situations of the tips, and their indiscriminate use by members of the public, control is extremely difficult.

Housing and Public Health Inspections.

The routine inspection of house property is carried out whenever possible and complaints are investigated without delay.

Generally it has been possible to effect a remedy by a personal visit to the owners or agents of property, or on a few occasions by an informal notice. It was not necessary to issue any statutory notices during the year.

The Council have granted Standard Grants to basically sound house's with a life expectancy of at least 15 years. The grant is for the purpose of providing the dwelling with five basic amenities, i.e. bath or shower, w.c., wash hand basin, hot water supply, and a food store. The majority of applications were from owner occupiers.

Some other owners have taken advantage of providing a w.c. in place of an existing pail or earth closet with the £20 Public Health Act Grant.

No houses have been demolished during the year, but three house's which were to have been demolished have had their life extended, but can now only be used as farm storage buildings.

Food Inspection.

Food traders have maintained the standard of cleanliness in their shops at a satisfactory level, and it has not been necessary for any action to be taken except for verbal advice.

There are no ice cream manufacturing premises in the the district, but a number of traders are licensed to sell prepacked ice cream.

There are also a number of fried fish shops and manufacturers of preserved foods registered under the Food and Drugs Act in the district.

The four slaughterhouses in the district have all been maintained in a satisfactory manner, and all the food animals slaughtered for human consumption have been inspected.

One sheep carcase was condemned during the year and also small amounts of liver affected by liver fluke and abscesses. Small amounts of lungs and hearts were affected by pneumonia and pericarditis respectively. All the condemned meat was satisfactorily incinerated in the furnace at Selby Baths.

The very small amount of meat it was been found necessary to condemn indicates the healthy, high-quality animals the butchers in the Rural area are buying for slaughter. For the fifth year in succession no tuberculosis was discovered in the slaughterhouses.

It was necessary during the year to condemn a number of badly bulged and burst tins of food, as well as some tins of foreign food due to decomposition.

Rodent Control.

The Council now have 89 contracts with farmers in the district. Treatment is given free to private dwellings, but a charge is made for any work done on business premises. Refuse tips are treated regularly, and no infestation of even medium proportions has been discovered during the year.

New Housing.

The rate of development in some of the parishes is still progressing at an enormous rate, and has the appearance of continuing for some time to come.

action. No notice of any accidents have been reported during the year.

Factories Acts, 1937 to 1959.

There has been an increase of mechanical factory activity in the district compared with previous years, due to the increase in Civil Engineering works and building, notably at the Power Station in Drax parish. This comparatively high figure will no doubt stay with us until this type of activity begins to dwindle or until one firm takes the responsibility of completing the work.
