To the Chairman and Members of the Selby Rural District

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the Annual Report on the health of the District and the work of the Health Department for the year 1969. The report is not really of my work but that of my predecessor, Dr. Appleton, who as the first Divisional Medical Officer, contributed greatly to the development of the Health Services of this Division, and to whom, I am sure, you would wish me to extend your thanks.

Vital Statistics

192 live births were registered, an increase of 4, giving a Birth Rate of 19.8 per thousand population (Adjusted Birth Rate 23.4). The aggregate rate for the W.R. Rural Districts was 17.2 and for England and Wales 16.3. There were two stillbirths. Two infant deaths occurred, giving an Infant Mortality Rate of 10.4. These two deaths were due to congenital heart disease and haemolytic disease of the newborn. The Perinatal Mortality Rate was 15.5 compared with the National figure of 23.4.

99 deaths occurred, giving a Crude Death Rate of 10.2 (Adjusted Death Rate 12.9). 44 (44.4%) deaths occurred at the age of 75 years and over, and of these 11 were due to ischaemic heart disease and 6 to cerebrovascular disease. Births exceeded deaths by 93.

Infectious Diseases

8 cases of infectious disease were notified during the year.

The current epidemic of measles (1970) is widespread throughout the country, and must be accounted for, at least in part, to the withdrawal of one source of Measles Vaccine for a long period last year (1969). Since the re-introduction of vaccine, applications have been slow. This is a disease which could be erradicated with a high rate of vaccination.

Cervical Cytology

During the year 94 women from Selby Urban and Rural Districts had the cancer smear test. No abnormal smears were found.

Three women died of cancer of the breast and none of these had attended the clinic for cytology. A breast examination is given to all women at this Clinic and these two tests form a very practical part of preventive medicine.

Family Planning

At the time of writing, the Leeds Branch of the Family Planning Association have just informed me that a clinic will start in the County Clinic, Raincliffe Street, a venue which the County Council has already approved. Clinics will be held weekly on Thursday evenings at 6.30 p.m. from 1st October, 1970. Dr. Eileen M. R. Bell-Syer will be the doctor-in-charge.

This clinic will give advice on all modern methods of contraception, although the intrauterine device is only inserted in the larger clinics. Patients will still have to attend York for insertion but can be supervised at Selby. Advice is also available on infertility and other marital problems, and pre-marital couples may attend.

Mental Health

At the present time the extensions to the Rawcliffe Training Centre are now well on the way to completion and it is hoped to occupy the main adult workshop in the Autumn. Renovations to the existing building will start when the change-over has been effected and arrangements made to cater for the junior department during this difficult period.

Nurseries and Child Minders Regulation Act, 1948 as amended by the Health Services and Public Health Act, 1968

People who wish to care for children of others during the day have to be registered either as child minders or have their premises registered as a nursery. This applies to all kinds of day care, including play groups, nursery groups and looking after children in one's own home. The applicants have to meet certain standards before the County Council will register them.

There are in the Rural District four sessional care play groups and one child minder's group; the latter is not yet operating.

Sessional Care—Age Groups 2½ to 5 years.

Child Minder—Age Group 0-2½ years.

Mrs. M. F. K. Gray, 4 Lynton Close, Brayton. Registered for four places.

These groups not only allow certain mothers to go out to work but provide a very useful introduction for young children to learn to play with others before they reach school age. They also give many young mothers a very necessary relief from the constant care that young children demand.

In conclusion, I wish to record warm thanks on behalf of my predecessor and myself for the support of the Members and Officers of the Council, the loyal services of the Public Health and Divisional Health Staffs, and the help given by voluntary workers at the clinics.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR 1969

Water Supply

The Pontefract, Goole and Selby Water Board supplies water to the whole district, from deep bore-holes in the red sand-stone at Brayton Barff, where chlorination is carried out. The Board have schemes in hand for improvements throughout the area.

The Board carries out regular sampling of the water for chemical and bacteriological analysis. No complaints were made to this department which necessitated additional

sampling of the supply.

Sewerage

Satisfactory sewerage schemes are provided in the parishes of Barlow, Brayton, Camblesforth, Carlton and Thorpe Willoughby. A new pumping station was provided at Thorpe Willoughby during the year, to replace the overloaded ejector station. Improvements are also proposed at the treatment works, as an interim measure until the joint disposal works with Hambleton, is provided.

Ministry of Housing and Local Government approval has been received for a scheme for the sewering of Hambleton, and a new disposal works to serve Hambleton and Thorpe Willoughby. Tenders for this work will be received early in

the ensuing year.

The scheme for Drax is well advanced, and negotiations for routes of mains are in progress. Preparatory work is also being carried out for a scheme for West Bank Estate, and associated extensions to the Carlton and Camblesforth sewerage system. A preliminary survey of Wistow and Cawood is complete, and detail preparation work will be undertaken in due course.

In the parishes not served by main sewers, further properties have been provided with septic tanks, with the aid of grants. The Council operates a free emptying service for domestic tanks.

Refuse Collection and Disposal

A weekly collection of household refuse is made throughout the district, collection of bulky household articles such as furniture, being made on request. Disposal is by tipping on the 3 Council owned tips, and whilst every effort is made to adhere to Ministry of Health recommendations on controlled tipping, the remote situation of the tips and indiscriminate use by members of the public, makes control extremely difficult.

Two abandoned vehicles were removed from the public highway during the year, in accordance with the provisions

of the Civic Amenities Act. A number of vehicles have also been disposed of on Council tips by members of the public.

Housing and Public Health Inspections

Routine inspection of house property is carried out whenever possible, and Council owned properties are regularly inspected for condition and repair. Complaints are investigated without delay.

It has been found possible to effect remedies by a personal visit to the owner, or an informal notice, and it was not necessary to issue any statutory notices during the year.

The Council have granted 12 applications for Standard Grants during the year, including one for conversion of one dwelling into two. One application under the 1969 Housing Act was approved for damp-proofing a house already having standard amenities, and 3 grants were made for conversion of earth closets to water closets under the Public Health Acts.

Four houses were represented as unfit during the year.

Food Inspection

Food traders have maintained the standard of cleanliness in their shops satisfactorily, and no action has been necessary other than verbal advice.

There are no ice-cream manufacturing premises in the district, but a number of traders are licensed to sell pre-

packed ice-cream.

The three slaughterhouses have been maintained in good condition, although only one has been operating regularly. All the food animals slaughtered for human consumption have been inspected.

A small amount of carcase meat, and amounts of offal were condemned during the year. Condemned meat is buried

in sealed containers on the refuse tip.

The small quantities of meat condemned indicates the high quality of the animals slaughtered in the district, and also the effect that inspection of 100% of carcases throughout the country is having on disease control.

Rodent Control

There are now 97 farmers in the district who have contracts with the Council for control work. Treatment for private dwellings is free, but a charge is made for any work

done on business premises. Refuse tips and other possible reservoirs of infestation are inspected and treated regularly, and only infestations of small proportions have been discovered.
