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

## To the Chairman and Members of the Selby Urban District Council.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my second Annual Report on the health of the District and the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1948.

The general health of the town was reasonably good, but there was a moderate increase in the number of notifiable infectious cases. The increase was almost entirely due to measles, which was prevalent in the Autumn, although scarlet fever showed some increase too.

There were no cases of poliomye litis, and for the second year in succession no case of diphtheria was notified. Ten new cases of tuberculosis were notified in comparison with fifteen in 1947.

It has been difficult to obtain accurate full records of the immunisation state of the child population, but this year I am able to include in the Report figures which show that almost 80% of children under 15 years of age have been immunised. The percentage for children under five years is still too low, and there must be numbers of mothers who have not accepted immunisation as a normal routine procedure in safeguarding their children.

It will be seen from the Vital Statistics that there has been a marked fall in the Birth Rate from 22.4 in 1947, a record year, to 16.6 in 1948; the Rate for the W.R.C. was 18.5 and for the country 17.9. The Death Rate was lower, but is still slightly above the general Rate for England and Wales. The Infantile Mortality Rate fell from 52 to 34, being equal to that for the whole country. There were no Maternal Deaths during the year.

The 5th July, 1948, saw the introduction of the National-Health Service Act, 1946, but as the Part III services were administered already by the West Riding County Council, little change occurred in the M. & C.W. routine. Dr. W. Bertram Hill continued as Medical Officer at the Child Welfare Centre. Monthly specialists' clinics for Pædiatrics (diseases of children) and Orthopædics (deformities) were established in Goole to serve the Division, and a weekly session for remedial exercises conducted by a physiotherapeutist is now held in Selby.

Four changes which occurred call for comment, however. The Joint Isolation Hospital, which has served the District continuously and well since November, 1905, passed under the control of the Regional Hospital Board. During this period the Hospital admitted approximately 906 patients from the Urban District, 470 from the Rural District, and a considerable number from Riccall R.D., and on occasion cases from Goole Borough and Tadcaster R.D.

The District Nursing Association disbanded after having provided an adequate home nursing service for many years on a voluntary basis. The Home Nursing Service continues under the adminstration of the County Council..

The Ambulance Service for the town had been provided most efficiently by the St. John Ambulance Brigade, supported by voluntary subscription. Since the 5th July, the Brigade has operated the Service as agents of the County Council.

It is fitting now that these three services have passed from the control of the Council and the voluntary organisations of the township, that an appreciation of the successful efforts of all workers, past and present, should be recorded.

The fourth change was the inauguration of a Home Help Service to provide domestic assistance to mothers during the lying-in period and for cases of chronic sickness recommended by the doctors of the town.

Reference to the Sanitary Inspector's Report will show the great amount of work carried out by the Health Department. Although the total number of visits is slightly lower than in 1947, there has been a very creditable increase in the number of sanitary improvements effected during 1948.

The number of housing applicants interviewed was twice as many as in 1947, reaching a total of 1,858. This is unsatisfying and often disagreeable work, particularly as there is a persistent impression in the town that Mr. Little has the final say in the allocation of Council houses. The answer to the problem still remains authority to build more houses, and until sufficient houses are provided, the Health Department has to carry this burden to the detriment of its normal sphere of work.

As reported elsewhere in the Report, one aged and infirm person was dealt with under Section 47 of the National Assistance Act, 1948.

Finally, I would express my thanks to the Members and Officers of the Council for their co-operation and consideration, and to the Voluntary Workers at the Clinic for valuable assistance.

## NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948. Section 47.

On the 13th December, an Order of the Court was obtained under Section 47 of the Act for the removal of a male found to be aged, infirm and living in insanitary conditions, and unable to devote to himself, and not receiving from other persons, proper care and attention.

The Order was for a period of three months, and the man was removed to Brook Lodge Institute, Selby. On the 24th December he was removed to St. John's Hospital, Goole, where he has been retained on renewal of the Order at three monthly intervals.
