To the Chairman and Members of the Selby Urban District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my eighth Annual Report on the health of the Urban District and the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1954.

There were 142 live births registered, giving a Birth Rate of 13.9 per thousand population (Adjusted Birth Rate 14.0). A decrease of 25 in the number of births gives a rate below the aggregate County Rate for Urban Districts of 14.7 and the National Rate of 15.2.

113 deaths, giving a Crude Death Rate of 11.1 (Adjusted Death Rate 10.4), improved again on the previous year. The aggregate County Rate was 12.7 and the Rate for England and Wales 11.3. Births exceeded deaths by 29.

Three infants died under the age of one year, giving an Infant Mortality Rate of 21.1. The National Rate was 25.5, a new low record.

Infectious diseases notified were only 13, the lowest number ever recorded. With not more than two notifications for any one disease it would appear that Selby was virtually free from the more serious infections during the year. A mild form of influenza was very prevalent during November and December, a high proportion of school children being affected.

No case of diphtheria has occurred in the town for eight years, but it is still necessary to warn parents that this satisfactory state of affairs will continue only so long as the majority of children are immunised against the disease.

The sale of National Welfare Foods was transferred on the 28th June, 1954, from the Ministry of Food Office to the Local Health Authority through the Divisional Health Offices. The local branch of the W.V.S. very kindly undertook the issue from its Headquarters on three afternoons a week, and the Foods are also available at certain times from the gatehouse of the Brook Lodge Institution.

Approval has been secured for the building of a Multiple Clinic in Selby for use by the M. & C.W. Services and the School Health and Dental Services. Unfortunately difficulty is being encountered in finding a site large enough and central enough for the purpose.

The Mass Radiography Unit visited Selby during the year and 1,596 persons availed themselves of this free health examination. 7 cases of inactive tuberculosis and 5 other conditions were found.

Finally, I wish to record my thanks to the Members and Officers of the Council for their co-operation during 1954, to the voluntary workers at the Clinic and the W.V.S. for their services.

Rat Infestation of Sewers.

As in previous years, the sewers were treated twice. First a 10% baiting test in the inspection chambers to determine which sections, if any, were rat infested. Where infestation was found, poisoning with Zinc Phosphide was resorted to. The very good takes of poison would seem to indicate that a large number of rats were killed.

Water Supply.

All houses are provided with piped water from the Council's deep wells at Brayton. During the year six bacteriological samples were taken, two from the swimming baths and four from the towns mains. These were analysed and all were satisfactory.
