To the **Chairman and Members of the Selby Urban District Council.**

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my ninth Annual Report on the health of the Urban District and the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1955.

There were 150 live births registered, giving a Birth Rate of 14.7 per thousand population (Adjusted Birth Rate 14.9). An increase of 8 in the number of births still gives a rate below the Aggregate County Rate for Urban Districts of 14.8 and the National Rate of 15.0.

112 deaths, giving a Crude Death Rate of 11.0 (Adjusted Death Rate 10.5), improved again on the previous year. The aggregate County Rate was 12.5 and the Rate for England and Wales 11.7. Births exceeded deaths by 38.

Five infants died under the age of one year, giving an Infant Mortality Rate of 33.3. The National Rate was 24.9, a new low record.

Infectious diseases notified totalled 148, and of these measles accounted for 129. No case of diphtheria has occurred in the town for nine years. If this freedom is to be maintained, immunisation of children at six months of age, with a refresher injection before starting school, must be widely accepted as a routine procedure by all parents.

Deaths from tuberculosis over the last fifty years have shown a steady decline so that the rate for the most recent quinquennial period is only about one-eighth of that for the first five years of the century. The less rapid decline in the number of new cases of pulmonary tuberculosis indicates that much remains to be done before the disease is under control.

A scheme which enables all school children aged thirteen years to be tested, with the consent of parents, and if necessary vaccinated against tuberculosis with B.C.G. vaccine, became operative during the year. 71.3% of the children tested required vaccination.

The Government restriction on expenditure has led to the scheme for building a Permanent Clinic for the Child Welfare, School Health and Dental Services in Selby being deferred indefinitely.

In conclusion, I wish to record my appreciation to the Members and Officers of the Council for their interest and assistance during 1955, to the Voluntary Committee at the Clinic and to the W.V.S. for their services in the distribution of welfare foods.

Rat Infestation of Sewers.

The sewers have been treated on two occasions. The method of treatment is as follows: A 10% baiting test is placed in the inspection chambers, this gives an indication which sections are rat infested. The infested sections are then treated with Zinc Phosphide and from the amount of this poison taken it would seem that a large number of rats were killed.

Water Supply.

All houses are provided with piped water from the Council's deep wells at Brayton. During the year one sample has been taken at the New Pump House at Brayton for chemical analysis, whilst eight other samples have been taken for bacteriological examination. Four of these samples were taken at the New Pump House and the other four from the town's mains. All samples taken were found to be satisfactory.
