To the Chairman and Members of the Selby Urban District Council. Ladies and Gentlemen.

I have the honour to present to you my eleventh Annual Report on the health of the Urban District and the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1957.

There were 156 live births registered, an increase of 20, giving a Birth Rate of 15.2 per thousand population (Adjusted Birth Rate 15.2). The West Riding County Birth Rate for Urban Districts was 16.1, and for England and Wales 16.1.

110 deaths occurred, giving a Crude Death Rate of 10.8 (Adjusted Death Rate 10.6). The aggregate County Rate was 12.4, and the Rate for England and Wales 11.5. Births exceeded deaths by 46.

Seven infants died under the age of one year, six of them in the first week of life, giving an Infant Mortality Rate of 44.9. The National Rate was 23.0, a new low record.

The incidence of notifiable infectious disease was again very low, only 27 cases being reported.

It is now possible to offer protective immunisation against six infective diseases. Parental response is fairly good but should be better. It is to be hoped that the time will come when diphtheria, whooping cough, poliomyelitis, smallpox and tetanus in an unprotected child will be regarded by an enlightened public as indicative of parental neglect. Protective vaccination against tuberculosis is limited at present to children between 13 and 14 years of age, and contacts of cases of the disease.

During the year combined antigen came into use for immunisation against diphtheria and whooping cough, thus reducing the number of injections from five to three. Triple antigen, including tetanus antigen, also became available. Tetanus (lock-jaw) is an uncommon but frequently fatal disease which can follow the infection of even the smallest wound of the skin. Prevention is the only certain cure.

Vaccine against poliomyelitis became available in increasing quantities during the year and the vaccination of 282 of the 1.150 registered children was completed. Canadian and American Salk vaccine is available to supplement the inadequate, and in no way superior or safer, supply of British vaccine.

The evidence of a direct relationship between heavy smoking and cancer of the lung and bronchus remains as significant as described in my last Annual Report, but the general public, not having the will power to do anything about it, ignores the evidence. The middle-aged and elderly say it is too late in any case, and the adolescents feel time is on their side and a cure will have been discovered by the time they reach the cancer age!

In the District during the seven years 1951-57, 18 males and 4 females died of this form of cancer.

In conclusion, I take this opportunity to express my thanks for the continued support of the Members and Officers of the Council during 1957, to the Voluntary Committee at the Clinic, and to the W.V.S. for their assistance in the distribution of welfare foods.

Rat Infestation of Sewers.

The sewers have been treated on two occasions. The method of treatment is as follows: A 10% baiting test is placed in the inspection chambers, this gives an indication which sections are rat infested. The infested sections are then treated with Zinc Phosphide and from the amount of this poison taken it would seem that a large number of rats were killed.

Water Supply.

All houses are provided with piped water from the Council's deep wells at Brayton. During the year 11 samples were taken for bacteriological examination. All samples were satisfactory.
