To the **Chairman and Members of the Selby Urban District Council.**

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my Fourteenth Annual Report on the health of the Urban District and the work of the Public Health Department for the year 1960.

There were 156 live births registered, an increase of 8, giving a Birth Rate of 15.2 per thousand population (Adjusted Birth Rate 15.2). The West Riding County Birth Rate for Urban Districts was 16.5 and for England and Wales 17.1.

174 deaths occurred, giving a Crude Death Rate of 17.0 (Adjusted Death Rate 16.1). The aggregate County Rate was 12.2 and the rate for England and Wales 11.5. Deaths exceeded births by 18.

It is an unpalatable fact to have to record that the 1960 Death Rate was the highest for 60 years. Although deaths from diseases of the heart and circulation were slightly below the mean for the last ten years, there was a sharp rise in deaths from respiratory diseases and cancer, and deaths from cerebral thrombosis and cerebral haemorrhage were the highest recorded. This high mortality has produced, for only the second time this century, an excess of deaths over births.

Six infants died under the age of one year, all of them in the first week of life, giving an Infant Mortality Rate of 38.5. The National Rate was 21.7, a new low record.

POLIOMYELITIS PREVENTION.

There was a steady demand for vaccination in the age groups 6 months to 26 years, but the extension of the offer to those up to the age of forty years was disappointing. It is estimated that 72% of the population at risk has now been protected. The incidence of poliomyelitis throughout the country, particularly in the West Riding, was light, and no cases occurred in the District.

MENTAL HEALTH ACT, 1959.

This Act, which became fully into force on the 1st November, is based on two new concepts. Firstly, that there should be as little formality and no stigma attached to going into a mental hospital for treatment than into a general hospital. The Act provides for the detention, with many safeguards of patients' rights, of the minority who must be detained in their own interests and the safety of others. Secondly, that those who need some treatment but do not need to be in hospital shall be looked after in the general community. The Act is a great step forward in the treatment of the mentally disordered, but its full implementation will take time.

As part of the Local Health Authority's scheme an Occupation Centre for the training of 40 severely subnormal children and 20 adults is being built at Rawcliffe and should come into use in 1961.

Finally, I record my appreciation of the continued support of the Members and Officers of the Council during 1960, and my thanks to the Voluntary Committee at the Clinic, and to the W.V.S. for the distribution of welfare foods.

Rat Infestation of Sewers.

The sewers are treated twice each year. The method of treatment is as follows: A 10% baiting test is placed in the inspection chambers, this gives an indication as to which sections are rat infested. The infested sections are then treated with Zinc Phosphide and from the amount of this poison taken it would seem that a large number of rats were killed.

Water Supply.

All houses are provided with piped water from the Council's deep wells at Brayton. During the year 3 samples were taken for bacteriological examination. All were satisfactory.

Clean Air Act.

Nine smoke observations were made, each of 30 minutes' duration. Interviews with stokers were held regarding methods of firing.

Five letters were sent out to various factories, drawing attention to heavy emissions of smoke. Interviews were also held with the respective managers.

Market Stalls and Vehicles.

Fifty verbal warnings were given for minor infringements of Byelaws. In all cases the matter complained of was rectified.

Public Baths.

The water fed to the baths is from the town mains and is chlorinated in the Pumphouse at Brayton Barff. Breakpoint chlorination of the swimming water is also carried out at the Baths before the water enters the bath. The swimming water is changed every 4 hours. Two samples were taken for bacteriological examination and both were classed as satisfactory.
